PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

October 1934

This was a visit to the office of the Logan County Circuit clerk. Brenda Jones, local member and employee in the office, explained the materials available in the office for research. Members were allowed to go into the storage vault and examine the various records and see what would be helpful for their own particular research.

NOVEMBER, 1934

This was our annual dinner meeting. The program was given by Jack and Emily Gordon, local members, who spoke on "Scottish Clans". They were both in full Scottish dress. Emily explained the attire of the Scottish highlander and Jack did the "modeling". There are seven yards of fine Scottish woolen material pleated into the kilt and it weighs almost seven pounds. Ladies wear kilt skirts. They showed slides of the many Scotch plaids that are used and worn by the various clans. There are seven different groups to which one can belong, and man and wife do not have to wear the same plaid if each belongs to a different clan. They explained that "highland games" are gatherings of Scotch people for the purpose of enjoying their Scotch heritage. Jack also played several numbers on the bagpipe and explained the various parts and working of the instrument. This was an excellent program.

December, 1934

No meeting this month.

January 1935

Officers for 1935 installed by Emily Gordon. Mildred Devanny spoke on "Emigration into Ohio". Ohio was known as the "passing through" state because people passed through this state on their way to Indiana and Illinois. Land grants are the basis of Ohio research. Groups of people from the same state went to the same land grant as these grants were designated for certain purposes. The Western Reserve area was for people coming from Connecticut and Massachusetts. Trumbull County was settled by New Englanders. Immigrants came from Pennsylvania, New York, Maryland, New Jersey, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Vermont, Virginia and Kentucky in that order. The Virginia Military Land was the first grant (1774) and Virginia claimed this portion for payment for Revolutionary War soldiers. Certain lands were designated for schools and colleges. The "fire lands" were designated as suffrage land for those who could prove that they had been burned out. The Donation tract was for those who could not afford to buy land. People from New Jersey came into Greene and Clinton counties, following the National Trail. The Refuge Tract was for Canadians who had been forced to leave their homes. The important thing to remember is that certain people came into certain sections for a certain reason. Mrs. Devanny told of various research sources for the land grants, sale of lands, birth, death and marriage records. Cemetery records are scarce in Ohio but the DAR is working on them. Much information which she gave can be found in the Illinois State Historical library in Springfield. This was a very informative program on early Ohio history and present research sources.

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DEATH NOTICES FOR LOGAN COUNTY RESIDENTS

July 17, 1840

These death notices were gleaned from the Sangamo Journal beginning with 1838 and going through 1850. They were copied to help fill some of the gaps in records created by the courthouse fire of 1857. There is no further information available.

Apr. 25, 1838

Died--In Middletown, Sangamon Co., on the 21st inst., Mr. Wm. Glenn, jr., merchant of that place.

Sept. 20, 1839

Died--At Lake Fork, Logan Co., Ill., on the 14th inst., Mr. Charles Turley, aged 51 years.

Apr. 3, 1840

Another Revolutionary Patriot Gone. Died in Logan County on the 16th inst., Mr. William Patterson, aged about 83 years. He was one of that little band who faced the dangers of war, to achieve our country's Independence. At an early period of the war, and also of his life, he joined the American army, and took an active part in many of the most trying events of our revolutionary struggle. He was interred with martial honors on the 18th. Thus, has another Revolutionary Patriot been called to join his companions, who are fast accumulating around the throne of God.

June 5, 1840

Died--On the night of the 16th of March, 1840, at his son's residence in Logan County, Illinois, after an illness of eight weeks, William Patterson, Sen., a Revolutionary soldier, in the 83rd year of his age, leaving numerous posterity to mourn his loss.

Oct. 2, 1840

Drowned in Sugar Creek, 24th of Sept., John Braugher, aged 50.

Nov. 13, 1840

Died--In Vevay, Indiana, on the 24th October, while on his way on a visit to Virginia, Mr. John Latham, of Logan County, Ill., aged 28 years.

Apr. 8, 1842

Died--In Logan Co., Ill., of measles and inflammatory fever. Henry Clay on the 17th, Daniel Webster on the 22nd, Frances Ann on the 29th ult.--the three youngest children of G. W. Turley, Esq.

Mar. 18, 1842

Died--Near this city, on Tuesday last, Mr. John Lanterman, aged about 50 years--one of our most worthy citizens.

Aug. 31, 1843

Died--On the 20th August, on Sugar Creek, in Logan County, Ill., Mr. John Davis, formerly of Pittsburg, Penn., leaving a wife...

Died--Near Lake Fork, Logan Co., on the 6th of Feb., Mrs. Sarah Robinson, aged 52. On the 7th near the same place, John Dyer, aged 24.

July 17, 1849

Died--In Logan Co., Ill., May 1, 1849, of congestive typhoid fever, after a long illness, aged 19 years; son of Zebulon and Minerva Adams.

Apr. 30, 1850

Died--In Mt. Pulaski, 17th inst., of puerperal fever, Mrs. Amanda Harper, consort of Dr. J. D. Harper and eldest daughter of Mr. Pressley Saunders--aged 19 years.

July 16, 1850

Died--In Eminence Precinct, Logan County, on the 11th inst. of Asiatic Cholera, Mrs. Ryan, aged 42 years, wife of Rev. Wm. Ryan of the Christian church. She was attacked on Tuesday, the 7th, and on Monday was convalescent; but took a relapse and died on Tuesday at 1 o'clock p.m.

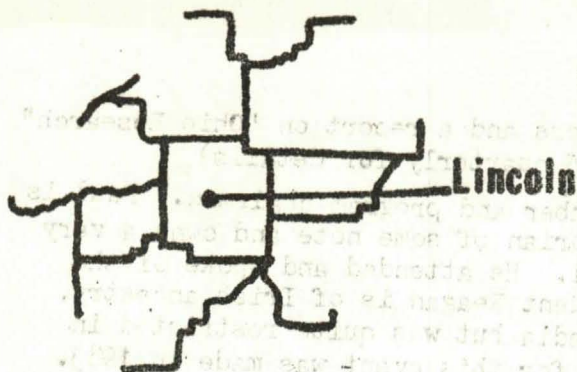

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

January--This was the installation of new officers and a report on "Ohio Research" by Mildred Devanney. (See January 1985 quarterly for details)

February-- Presented by Paul Gleason, local member and program chairman. Paul is a Junior High history teacher and historian of some note and owns a very large collection of historical material. He attended and spoke of the 1985 presidential inauguration. President Reagan is of Irish ancestry. Paul also represented the local news media but was quite restricted in his activities there. His reservation for this event was made in 1983. He showed slides and had on display many inaugural items. He reported the experience was expensive but worth it. Good program.

March----Nova Coseboon, society president, gave the program on "Research in North Carolina". Many immigrants from Pennsylvania went to North Carolina to take up land grants, these included German, English and Scotch Irish. The three main religious groups were the Church of England, German Lutheran, and Scotch-Irish.

North Carolina had no towns until 1706. Albemarle county was the first and was established in 1663. Germans were an early group coming into North Carolina from Pennsylvania; the Scotch-Irish settled in the north-western section and the Quakers in Rockingham county. Others who did not approve of slavery moved on and went into Ohio and Indiana.. The first census taken was in 1810.

Newspaper on microfilm are available at the State Archives, land grants are in the office of the Secretary of State. No birth and death records before 1913. Quaker church records from 1680 are found in Raleigh; Baptist records at Winston-Salem; Episcopal records at the University of North Carolina; Lutheran records at Salisbury, and Methodist are at Duke University. Military records are available for the War of 1812, Mexican, Spanish-American and Revolutionary wars. The North Carolina state library is located at Chapel Hill.

Fires during the Civil War destroyed many records.

What is an obituary to the genealogist?

An obituary is a death date, a graveyard, a marriage date of that fellow who has been eluding your search for ages. Included in this one single newspaper clipping might be the place and date of birth, the names of the parents, the name of the spouse (spouses), and a little bit of personal history. Usually the article lists the names of survivors, mainly the children, by their married name and place of residence. The church frequented by the family throughout the life of the ancestor may be included. All of these are not a main source of genealogical research, however all are marvelous clues as to where to look next for vital records.

FOR THE BEGINNER

There are many basic research tools used by the genealogist, but the various censuses are, perhaps, the favorites. They serve as a record of migration as well as a source for information on members of the family, ages in a given year, states or countries of birth and a flavor of the area in which they lived.

The Federal Censuses began in 1790. As the need for statistics increased so did the amount of information contained in these records. The data in each census schedule from 1790 to 1840 varied from one census year to another, but the idea was the same. The only names given were that of the heads of the households. The remainder of people living in the households were recorded as males or females in different age groups, including the persons whose names appeared. The ages became more precise as census years went by. By 1830 an individual's year of birth could be narrowed down to a span of five years. In 1840 a column was added to indicate if a Revolutionary War pensioner lived in the household and gave his exact age.

Beginning with the 1850 census and proceeding to the present, each member of the household was listed. Again, the information varied from census year to census year, but it definitely increased in value to the genealogist. The 1850 and 1860 censuses are basically the same with one exception. In addition to listing each person's name, age, state or country of birth, occupation and real estate value of the head of the household, the 1860 added a column for the value of personal property.

The 1870 census was the first to ask if parents were of foreign birth and to give the month of birth for infants under one year of age.

With the 1880 census the genealogist can also identify the state or country of birth for each parent. Also included was the relationship of each person in the household to the head of the household. It is especially important to remember in these censuses listing each person that the status of the household is as it was prior to June 1st. of that year. The age was that of the individual on his/her last birthday. Children born after that date were not included, but individuals who died between June 1st. and the date of the enumeration were listed. As many of these censuses were taken over a period of several months, extending perhaps a couple of months past the census date, it can be confusing for the genealogist unless he keeps this in mind.

Unfortunately, the 1890 census for most states was lost in a fire in the Commerce Department Building. Illinois' was among those destroyed.

The 1900 census was a significant one. For the first time it gave the month and year of birth as well as the age. It asked the number of years married and the number of children born to the wife as well as the number still living. If of foreign birth, the census gave the year of immigration and the number of years the individual lived in the United States.

The 1910 census asked the same questions as the 1900, but dropped the columns for month and year of birth.

At the same time the enumerator was conducting a census of those living in a household, he was also recording deaths for the twelve months prior to the census date (June 1st.). This was done in 1850 through 1880. Although this only covered one year of the ten years between censuses, it pre-dates most recorded deaths. The information contained in the Mortality Schedules included: name of the deceased, sex, age, color, marital status, place of birth, month in which death occurred, cause of death and length of illness.

In Illinois we are fortunate to have some additional censuses. In 1862 a military census was conducted, county by county, including all men 18-45 years of age. This census is especially important to those whose ancestors migrated from the Southern States. Shortly after the 1860 census was conducted there was a mass migration of people, from Kentucky and Tennessee especially, who were fleeing to a safer territory.

The state censuses taken in Illinois are another valuable source of information. These occurred in the years 1800, 1818, 1820, 1825, 1830, 1835, 1840, 1845, 1855, and 1865. There are very few remaining during the period of 1825-1845, but those for 1855 and 1865 are complete. Although these censuses were done much the same as the federal censuses before 1850, listing head of household only and others in age brackets, they still serve as an excellent source for recording migration and identifying families.

The Illinois State Archives has all Illinois censuses, state and federal, for all years mentioned; as well as the mortality schedules and the military censuses. Those through 1855, with the exception of the military census, are indexed.

There is another census schedule worthy of comment-----the Agricultural Schedules taken from 1840-1910. Those for 1890, 1900 and 1910 have been destroyed, but the earlier ones remain and can be found at the Illinois State Archives also. The information contained in these has limited value for the genealogist and is rarely used by them, but it does serve a couple of purposes. It is very discouraging to look through a census where a good half of the pages are difficult to impossible to read. If the people for whom you are searching are likely to be farmers, you might want to use an agricultural census to help locate them. In addition, this census helps to establish worth. If you should find your ancestor with several acres of land and a fair amount of livestock, he just might have a probate record. The agricultural census also serves to fill in gaps in missing land and tax records.

There is always the question: Is a census record good, solid documentation of the facts it contains? No, not by itself. First of all the only requirement necessary for the job of enumerator was the ability to read and write. He didn't have to know how to spell! Secondly, the most knowledgeable person in the household was not always the one interviewed. In fact, it is suspected that, if no one was at home, the enumerator asked the neighbors. Unfortunately, the enumerator was not doing his job with genealogy or accuracy in mind! He was paid by the number of families enumerated. It is reasonable to assume that, when finding no one at home or merely the children, he did not want to make a return trip. There is evidence, too, that everyone did not tell the truth. When following a family through several censuses, we frequently find that the wife does not age by ten years in each successive census year! When children were present in a household from a wife's previous marriage, their last names were not always listed. The same is true of children who were "informally adopted".

Finally, do not "pluck" your family from the census page without regard for the other families living near them. It is advisable to, at least, copy the other families appearing on the same page and, preferably, those on the previous and following pages. If you do not do this, many valuable clues may be lost. Families tended to live in the same area; frequently right next door.

Solution: Subtract the days first, months second, and years last.

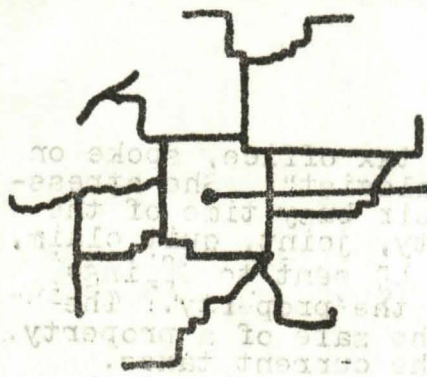

APRIL--Mrs. Marge Coleman, employee in the local tax office, spoke on "Taxes and Tax Forms as related to the Genealogist". She stressed that we not visit the court house during their busy time of the year. There are many kinds of deeds-warranty, joint, quit claim, etc. The county clerk has the deeds. A deed must be sent to Springfield in order to get a real estate loan on the property. The county clerk informs the tax office as to the sale of a property. There must be an agreement as to who pays the current taxes. Make sure the lawyer registers the sale in order to direct the tax bill to the proper person. The tax office must be informed as to the residence of the owner as you are responsible for the taxes whether you receive the bill or not. Deeds should be kept up to date. Some properties are transferred by will. The tax office has plat books which show present and past property owners. Our tax records go back to the 1850s, and the assessor's books must be kept. The early tax books for Logan County are presently in the Lincoln public library and will be microfilmed if a grant becomes available.

MAY--Emily McElhaney, local member, spoke on "Massachusetts Research". Massachusetts received statehood on February 16, 1788, Plymouth being the first established settlement in the U. S. 1602 is the date of the earliest records recorded. The Revolutionary War started in Lexington and Concord and the first battles were fought there. The first census was taken in 1790, but listed only the heads of families. Sources of research include the State Library located in the State House, the Boston Public Library, and the Massachusetts Historical Library in Boston.

JUNE-- Gary Jones, local member and Special Publications chairman, spoke on the post-war life of Abraham Lincoln, the plot for his assassination and the capture of the conspirators. Gary did his own research, wrote his own script and made his own video tape. This was a good program. Gary became interested in Lincoln lore after moving to this area from North Carolina.

FOR THE BEGINNER

One of the most exciting adventures in genealogical research is the trip to the County Courthouse! It can be a very rewarding experience or it can be a disaster. Much hinges on whether or not you have done your homework before embarking on this adventure.

If you will be traveling to another state, it is best to first write a genealogical society in that state (preferably the county in which you plan to research) and ask about their state laws (or local regulations) governing genealogical research. For example: in Illinois anyone who is a card carrying member of a genealogical society in Illinois may view the various indexes. The County Clerk who follows the law exactly will charge you \$5.00 for a certified copy before you are permitted to see the document. Fortunately, many are more lenient and cooperative.

Please remember, when doing courthouse research, to be polite, cooperative and respectful. The county's employees are not there for the purpose of doing genealogical research. The old saying applies here-----"you can catch more flies with honey than with vinegar". Impolite and disrespectful genealogists have been the reason for more stringent laws and regulations.

Your homework should also include acquiring knowledge of the county's history. Records before the county's formation will be kept in its parent counties. Usually, marriage, probate and land records were kept from the time the county was formed. Death and Birth Records came much later.

A good source for "courthouse homework" is the Handy Book for Genealogists published by The Everton Publishers, Inc., Logan, Utah. Besides including a map for each state showing county divisions and a brief history of the state, it also lists each county, the date it was organized, parent county/counties, the present county seat and the zip code. For many counties there will be a brief description of their records and the years these began. It sometimes mentions that there was a fire in the courthouse, but this should be suspect if marriages, probate and land records begin much later than the year the county was formed.

Once you have completed your homework on the county and its courthouse, it is time to turn to your family records. A sure way to become an unpopular researcher with the courthouse staff is to be unsure for whom or what you are searching!

It works well for me to list first the office in the courthouse (Ex.: County Clerk's Office), the type of record for which I am searching (Ex: Marriages), the person(s) for whom I am searching and the time period to be covered. If your family group sheets are up to date and you have located as many census records as possible, you should be able to narrow down dates to within a ten year period.

Once you have arrived at the courthouse, it is necessary to know what to expect or what not to expect from each document. Naturally, we all hope to find details on, at least, three generations! In Illinois the vital records: birth, death and marriage records are found in the Office of the County Clerk. Unless there has been a disaster such as a flood or fire, the marriage records should exist from the time the county was formed. The earlier marriage records are contained in a large ledger and usually contain nothing more than the name of the bride, the name of the groom, the date the license was applied for, the actual date of the marriage, the date the license was returned to the office and the person who performed the marriage ceremony. Occasionally, you will find the name of the father if either was underage. By the latter part of the 1870s many counties were using marriage license applications. Accurately and fully filled in, these can be a gold mine of information. Such "goodies" as the date

and place of birth of each the bride and groom, their present place of residence, names of each of their parents and number of marriages for each can be found in these applications. Remember, that the applications for younger siblings and subsequent marriages may supply the same information as was not available for your ancestor who married before this time period.

Birth and Death Records are not found in most counties until around 1877. However, there are exceptions. The early death records were kept in a large ledger and gave very little information. In Illinois, you can not be certain of finding the standardized death certificate until 1916. In fact, you can not be certain of finding recorded deaths or births until after that date. The chances increase closer to the 1900s. From the late 1870s until 1916, different counties used a variety of forms containing a variety of information. Some earlier certificates gave a surprising amount of information, while other later ones hardly covered the basic facts.

Early Birth Records contained a variety of information, but even the basic facts are informative. One can find the names of the parents (hopefully the mother's maiden name), name of child (if already named) and date of birth. More extensive information is found in the later birth records. Usually the residence of the parents was noted, the number of children born to the mother was given and the birth place of each parent. Again, the standardized birth certificate was not used until 1916.

In smaller counties the Land Records will also be found in the Office of the County Clerk. Four large ledgers will be of interest to the researcher. There is an index to the names of persons who purchased land called Grantee Indexes. This will refer you to a book number and page number where you will find a copy of the actual deed. The index to those who sold land is called the Grantor Index. This, too, will refer you to another book. Land records have many uses. They can tell you the approximate time that your ancestor arrived in the county, the approximate time that he may have moved on and if you might expect to find a will or probate record. When you find that there are several men sharing the same name, be sure to check when they sold their land. When land was purchased the name of the wife was not always included, but her name was always given when the land was sold.

For larger counties, Land Records are kept in the Office of the Recorder of Deeds. It is also very likely that deeds will be found on microfiche.

The Office of the Circuit Clerk, in Illinois, is where you will find wills and probate records. There will be an index book which will then refer you to a box number, book number or microfilm or microfiche number. One word of warning----- if you are allowed to handle the actual probate packets, open only one at a time. This prevents placing papers in the wrong packet. There will be an assortment of documents and papers associated with the probating of an estate. Hopefully, the person will have died testate, meaning that he made a will (the term intestate means without a will). You will want to pay special attention to the document listing all of the heirs of the deceased. It will explain their relationships and give their address at that time. When a sale of personal property takes place, a list of the items sold and their buyers should be found in the packet. This list of names usually represents relatives and close neighbors. The earlier probate records may not contain as much information, but be sure to examine each piece of paper for clues. There may be no list of heirs, but usually anyone receiving a portion of the inheritance was asked to sign a receipt.

Lastly, most county offices charge a nominal fee for photocopies. Take advantage of this, as you will wish you had once you are back home trying to understand the notes that you have made!

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DID YOU KNOW? Until 1875, in England, there was no penalty for failure to register a birth. Parents were given 6 weeks (42 days) to register; after 6 weeks and up to 6 months the birth could be registered on payment of a fine. After 6 months, with very few exceptions, a birth could not be registered.

The following death notices were abstracted from the Sangamo Journal, Illinois Daily Journal and the Illinois State Register. There were no newspapers in Logan County during this period - 1838 to 1850.

Died--in Middletown, Sangamon Co., on the 21st inst., Mr. Wm. Glenn, jr., merchant of that place.--Sangamo Journal 4/25/1838.

Died--at Lake Fork, Logan Co., Ill. on the 14th inst., Mr. Charles Turley, aged 51 years.--Sangamo Journal 9/20/1839.

Another Revolutionary Patriot Gone. Died in Logan County on the 16th inst., Mr. William Patterson, aged about 83 years. He was one of that little band who faced the dangers of war, to achieve our country's Independence. At an early period of the war, and also of his life, he joined the American army, and took an active part in many of the most trying events of our revolutionary struggle. He was interred with martial honors on the 18th. Thus, has another Revolutionary Patriot been called to join his companions, who are fast accumulating around the throne of God.--Sangamo Journal 4/3/1840.

Died--On the night of the 16th of March, 1840, at his son's residence in Logan County, Illinois, after an illness of eight weeks, William Patterson, Sen., a Revolutionary soldier, in the 83rd year of his age, leaving numerous posterity to mourn his loss.--Illinois State Register 6/5/1840.

Drowned in Sugar Creek on the 24th September, John Braugher, aged 50.--Sangamo Journal 10/2/1840.

Died--In Vevay, Indiana, on the 24th October, while on his way on a visit to Virginia, Mr. John Latham, of Logan County, Ill., aged 28 years.--Sangamo Journal 11/13/1840.

Died--In Logan Co., Ill., of measles and inflammatory fever, Henry Clay Turley on the 17th; Daniel Webster on the 22nd and Frances Ann on the 29th ult., the three youngest children of G. W. Turley, Esq.--Sangamo Journal 4/8/1842.

Died--Near this city (Springfield), on Tuesday last, Mr. John Lanterman, aged about 50 years--one of our most worthy citizens.--Sangamo Journal 3/18/1842.

Died--On the 20th August, on Sugar Creek, in Logan County, Ill., Mr. John Davis, formerly of Pittsburg, Penn., leaving a wife.--Sangamo Journal 8/31/1843.

Died--Near Lake Fork, Logan Co., on the 6th of Feb., aged 52, Mrs. Sarah Robinson. On the 7th near the same place, John Dyer, aged 24.--Sangamo Journal 3/6/1845.

Died--In Logan Co., Ill., May 1, 1849, of congestive typhoid fever, after a long illness, Horace Meeker Adams, son of Zebulon and Minerva Adams.--Sangamo Journal 7/17/1849.

Died--In Mt. Pulaski, 17th inst., of puerperal fever; Mrs. Amanda Harper, consort of Dr. J. D. Harper and eldest daughter of Mr. Pressley Saunders; aged 19 years.--Illinois Daily Journal 4/30/1850.

Died--In Eminence Precinct, Logan County, on the 11th inst., of Asiatic Cholera, Mrs. (Frances) Ryan, aged 42 years, wife of Rev. Wm. Ryan of the Christian Church.--Illinois Daily Journal 7/16/1850.

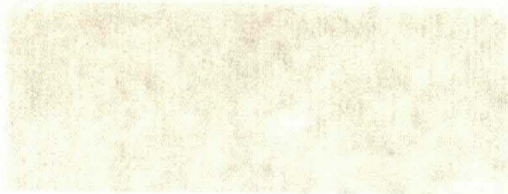

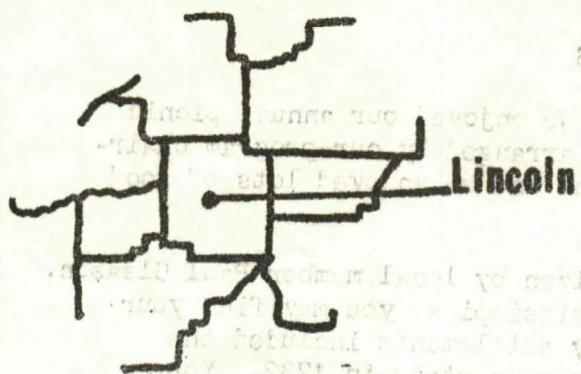

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

JULY--There was no official meeting this month. We enjoyed our annual picnic at Kickapoo Creek Park in Lincoln. It was arranged by our program chairman, Paul Gleason. It was a lovely evening and we enjoyed lots of good food, fun and fellowship.

AUGUST--Our program on "Georgia Research" was given by local member Paul Gleason. Many Georgians moved into Alabama and Mississippi so you may find your family there instead of in Georgia. Early settlements included the Carolinas as well as Georgia. Georgia became a state in 1732. Your ancestors in Georgia may have been in English jails for non-payment of debts. They were not criminals. Georgia was also home to religious refugees. Georgia research is difficult and in some instances almost impossible to trace. Wealthier people were often found in memorials rather than in the records. The land records are often a good source of information. Many records were lost during the Civil War.

SEPTEMBER--A program on "Kentucky Research" was given by Mildred Devanny. Our Virginia and Carolina ancestors came through Kentucky. Kentucky was at first a part of Fincastle County, Virginia. In 1790 the first three counties were divided into nine counties and Kentucky now has 120 counties. Kentucky's towns grew out of what was first a 'station'. The first white men came from Maryland, Pennsylvania, Carolina and Tennessee through the Cumberland Gap around 1750. Kentucky stands at the mid-point of genealogical research as it was the "passing through" state. There were few people in Kentucky prior to the Revolutionary War. Scotch-Irish and Germans were early pioneers. Mrs. Devanny gave a list of many books as being excellent research sources and all can be found in the Illinois State Historical library. Marriage records are sometimes hard to find in Kentucky.

FOR THE BEGINNER

For those researching ancestors and relatives in Logan County, as well as in other Illinois counties, the Illinois State Archives is a must. If you have not discovered by now that genealogists are not too popular in Illinois, take this as a warning. However, hospitality is only second to the wonderful facilities at the Illinois State Archives. The staff is not only helpful but made up of genealogists who understand research problems. They are happy to help you by mail or in person.

The Archives has a large microfilm collection. Most important to an Illinois researcher is their census records. They have, on microfilm, every federal census for every Illinois county from 1810 - 1910. In addition, they have the 1880 Soundex, 1900 Soundex and the 1910 Miracode. The Illinois State Censuses provide additional help in locating a family in a particular time period. These censuses are on microfilm, but the actual census is also available.

Let me tell you, once you have done census research at the Illinois State Archives you will be spoiled when researching in other state archives. All census records (federal and state) are indexed from 1810 - 1855. These are found in an enormous card catalogue that is quickly running out of room!

The 1860 Illinois federal censuses are in the process of being indexed. Although it is far from complete, many counties are on cards and available for use.

The Archives does not, as a rule, keep Vital Records. However, they have copies of many of the records microfilmed by the L.D.S. church. These are primarily for the southern counties. Those for other counties are now kept in I.R.A.D. depositories and are available for use at the Archives through interlibrary loan. The only statewide death records at the Archives are the mortality Schedules for 1850 - 1880. These are also on microfilm.

Another valuable tool is being developed at the Archives. They are in the process of putting all Illinois marriage records, through 1900, on the computer. This will be of particular use to the genealogist who cannot locate the county in which his ancestors were married. These records will be available in bound print-outs.

The only land records available are those of the ten federal land district offices in Illinois. These include only the first purchase of land from the government. These are available in bound volumes of computer print-outs.

The Illinois State Archives has indexes to all men serving in Illinois units during the Indian Wars, Blackhawk War, Mexican War, Civil War and Spanish American War.

Although their collection does not include every county history printed, they have at least one for each county. Many of these are indexed in the card catalogue index.

The Illinois State Archives is located adjacent to the visitor's parking area off College Street. It is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. and on Saturday from 8:00 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. If you are a first time visitor to the Archives you will be asked to fill out an application for a pass. You are asked to deposit purses, briefcases, coats, etc., in a locker. Notebooks and writing instruments may be taken to the reading room and microfilm room.

If a visit is impossible, the Archives staff will do limited research by mail. Please limit your requests to one or two items at a time. When requesting a census search include the year and complete names. Keep in mind that their index is only complete through 1855, so you will need to include the county for those years of 1860, 1870 and 1880.

Microfilms of the state and federal censuses are also available for use by Illinois residents through the inter-library loan system. See your local librarian for this service.

For more information on the holdings of the Archives, consult The Descriptive Inventory of the Archives of the State of Illinois. A copy may be available in a local library or can be purchased from the Illinois State Archives for \$20.

The 1950 Agricultural Census for Illinois listed the name of the farm owner, agent, or manager; number of acres of improved and unimproved land; valuations of farm, farm implements and machinery, livestock, orchard products, market garden produce, homemade manufactures, and slaughtered animals; number of livestock (i.e., horses, asses and mules, milch cows, working oxen, other cattle, sheep, swine; quantity of produce (i.e., bushels of wheat, rye, Indian corn, oats, peas, beans, Irish potatoes, barley, buckwheat, clover seed, other grass seeds, flax seeds; pounds of rice, tobacco, wool, butter, cheese, hops, flax, silk cocoons, maple sugar, cane sugar, beeswax and honey; tons of hay and dew- and water-rotted hemp; bales of 400-pound ginned cotton; gallons of wine and molasses).

Space does not allow the entire census to be printed here. Only the names of those persons or companies engaged in farming are printed.

UPON FINAL APPROVAL BY THE MEMBERSHIP OF THIS SOCIETY, THE EFFECTIVE DATE
OF THE HEREIN CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS SHALL BE _____ 1985.

ARTICLE I

SCOPE OF THE BY-LAWS

- Section 1. The name of this organization shall be "The Logan County Genealogical Society".
- Section 2. The purpose of this organization shall be to encourage the science of genealogy, to assist others gather genealogical information, to preserve and publish material of historical and genealogical nature - all for educational and research purposes.
- Section 3. It is intended that all powers of The Logan County Genealogical Society, Incorporated, conferred upon it by virtue of its incorporation, shall be executed in accordance with the provisions of these By-Laws; and that admission to membership in the Society, the rights and obligations of its members, and the tenure of membership, shall be entirely subject to and depend upon the provisions herein setforth, and the exercise of the authority herein conferred.

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. Qualifications: Any person of good moral character, interested in genealogy, may become a member of The Logan County Genealogical Society in accordance with the provisions of this article.
- Section 2. Application for membership: Application for membership may be made in the form of a written application for membership. This will be voted upon by the membership committee or by the Board of Directors, who upon acceptance, shall present the application to the regular membership, at their regular monthly meeting, for their acceptance or rejection.
- Section 3. Dues: The annual dues for members shall be \$8.00, payable in advance. Family dues shall be \$9.00 annually (family, add \$1.00 for each additional member in excess of two persons). Student dues shall be \$5.00 annually. Contributing membership shall be \$15.00 annually. Life membership shall amount to \$100.00. Dues shall not be prorated.
- Section 4. Charter Members: Persons who were members of this organization prior to December 31, 1978 are Charter Members.
- Section 5. Membership: The membership year shall commence on the first day of January and shall expire on the 31st day of December, following. A member shall be considered delinquent and removed from the membership roll in the event his dues are not received by the end of the third month of the new fiscal year. Membership is effective upon receipt of dues and

the application for membership is approved at a regular meeting of the membership. A family membership shall be considered as a single membership.

- Section 6. Expulsion: The Board of Directors shall act as a committee for the purpose of holding hearings on any member accused of unethical practices. Suspension or expulsion of membership may occur as a result of these hearings. This committee shall meet in executive session unless otherwise requested by the accused.
- Section 7. Member status: All members in good standing and who are the age of 18, shall be active and entitled to vote on all subjects brought before the membership, in all elections held by the regular membership.

ARTICLE III

MEETINGS OF THE SOCIETY

- Section 1. Annual Meetings: An annual meeting shall be held in the month of November of each year for the purpose of giving annual reports to the general membership. All Officers and Committees shall present an annual, operational report at this meeting. An election year shall be held every second year, commencing November 1985. In an election year, the nomination and installation of Officers shall be made. The time and place for said annual meetings shall be determined by the Board of Directors of this Society. The regular membership shall be notified of said annual meetings in due time. The expenses for the annual meeting shall be assumed by the Society. This being at the discretion of the Board of Directors.
- Section 2. Fiscal Year: The Society's fiscal year shall be from November 1 to October 31.
- Section 3. Monthly meetings: Regular monthly meetings of the Society shall be held the third Monday of each month at 7:30 P.M. or at such time and place the Board of Directors shall establish and announce in advance to the regular membership. The purpose of the monthly meetings is to conduct business deemed necessary by the President of the Society and to present programs for membership.
- Section 4. Special Meetings: Special meetings of the Society may be called by the Board of Directors. Notice of such a meeting shall be announced by mail to all members, not less than 10 days prior to the date for which it is called. The call for the special meeting shall specify the matter to be submitted to the membership for consideration and action to be taken at such meeting, and no other business shall be transacted at such meeting.
- Section 5. Quorum: A quorum for the transaction of any and all business at any regular or special meeting of the Society shall consist of not less than ten (10) members, including two Officers. All voting decisions shall be made by simple majority vote.
- Section 6. Order of Business of the Annual Meetings: The order of business of each annual meeting shall be as follows;
- (A) Call to order.
 - (B) Presidents address.
 - (C) Written report of Officers and Committee Chairman to be given to the President.
 - (D) Report of the Nomination Committee in an election year.

- (E) Election of officers and installation in an election year.
- (F) Program.
- (G) Adjournment.

The order of business at regular monthly meetings and at the Board of Directors meetings shall be determined by the President of the Society.

- Section 6. Rules of order: All parliamentary questions shall be decided according to Robert's Rules of Order, revised.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

- Section 1. Eligibility: Any member in good standing, who is 18 years of age or older, shall be eligible to hold office in this Society or to serve on a committee.
- Section 2. Elective Officers: The elective Officers of the Society shall be; President, 1st Vice President, 2nd Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. Such Officers shall serve a period of two years from the time of the installation at the annual, election year, November meeting. No person shall be elected to the Office of President for more than three consecutive terms, provided however, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as prohibiting anyone from subsequently being elected to such office.
- Section 3. Election of Officers: The elective Officers of the Society shall be elected by the members in good standing at the annual November meeting of an election year. Nominations shall be made by a committee appointed by the Board of Directors of the Society. Other nominations may be made from the floor. On a motion to close the nominations, the President shall ask for the members present to vote by a show of hands. A plurality of all votes cast shall be required for the election of a candidate. The results of the election shall be sent within the forth coming quarterly, to each member in good standing. All Officers elected shall serve a term of two years.
- Section 4. Vacancies: In case of a vacancy in any of the offices of the Society, such vacancy shall be filled as follows; In the office of the President, by the succession of the 1st Vice-President. In the event the 1st Vice-President is not available, the 2nd Vice President shall preside as President. In the event the 2nd Vice President is not available, the Recording Secretary shall preside. In the event the Recording Secretary is not available, the Treasure shall preside. Any other events of Vacancies the Board of Directors shall make the appointments.
- Section 5. Removal from Office: Any elective Officer may be removed from office or suspended for definite period by the Board of Directors, upon being found guilty by the Board, of mis-conduct while in office, or neglect of or in-attention to Official duty. An officer who is absent from three consecutive Board meetings without reasonable cause shall be subject to action by the Board as to his or her continuance in office.

ARTICLE V

DUTIES OF DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS.

- Section 1. The Board of Directors: The Board of Directors shall consist of the elected Officers and two Directors consisting of the immediate past President and a former past President.

- Section 2. The Board shall have full power to manage the business affairs of the Society, except as otherwise provided in these By-Laws, but shall exercise its powers in conformity with such definite orders of instructions as shall be given to it by the members of the Society by a majority vote taken in a referendum conducted in the manner provided in Article VII for the adoption of any amendment to these By-Laws. The Board of Directors may be convened in session by the President, or by any four (4) members of the Board of Directors, for the general transaction of business, or for the consideration of such special matters as may be specified in the call for the meeting. A quorum for the transaction of any and all business of the Board of Directors shall consist of not less than four (4) members. All voting decisions shall be by majority vote. The meeting of the Board of Directors shall be monthly, with the President making the decision as to the time and place of such meeting and so notify the Board of Directors, at least five (5) days in advance of such meeting, by telephone or by mail. However the required five (5) day notice may be shortened if it is acceptable to a majority of the members of the Board of Directors.
- Section 3. The Board of Directors shall serve a term of two (2) years, concurrent with the elective Officers.
- Section 4. The Board of Directors shall report at regular membership meetings on major policy changes proposed and new projects, for their approval.
- Section 5. The Board of Directors shall recommend to the regular membership for approval, any expenditures exceeding the allotted budget.
- Section 6. Responsibility of Officers: The elected Officers and Directors at large shall perform the duties as outlined in these By-Laws and those assigned to them in the future. They shall deliver to their successor, all official materials within ten days following the annual meeting. They shall present a written report to the President at the annual meeting. The Officers shall report on the activities of their area of responsibility at each Board of Director and each regular membership meetings.
- Section 7. The President: The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and of the Board of Directors. The President shall appoint, with approval of the Board of Directors, the various special committee's. The President shall have general supervision over all officers and all committees, except the nominating committee. The President shall be authorized to sign checks on the Society's bank account in the absence of the Treasurer. The President shall execute on behalf of, and in the name of the Society, all contracts, deeds and other legal instruments, when so authorized by the Board of Directors.
- Section 8. The 1st Vice President: The 1st Vice President shall preside in the absence of the President and shall have full power to act. In the event the President is incapacitated or is otherwise unable to perform the official duties of the office of President, the 1st Vice President, with the approval of the Board of Directors, shall have the power to adjudge when it is necessary for him to act for the President. The 1st Vice President shall have charge and control of the programs and shall serve as the program chairman.
- Section 9. The 2nd Vice President: The duties of the 2nd Vice President shall be as chairman of the Membership committee, who shall have charge and control of the admission of new members, as otherwise herein provided and shall be responsible for keeping a current and correct list of all members. The committee chairman shall nominate member applicants at each

regular membership meeting. Shall send a list of new members to the corresponding Secretary, the Treasurer and the Quarterly Editor. This committee shall send membership invitations to prospective members and renewal notices to regular members. In the absence of the President, 1st Vice President, the 2nd Vice President shall preside at the regular membership and Board of Directors meetings.

Section 10. The Recording Secretary: The Recording Secretary shall preside as the Registered Agent and have custody of the Official Corporate Seal of the Society. Shall keep an accurate and permanent record of all proceedings of the regular membership and Board of Director meetings and shall read the minutes of the previous regular membership or Board of Directors meetings, and preserve all minutes and reports. The Secretary shall attest all contracts, deeds and other legal instruments, when so authorized by the Board of Directors, when signed by the President or his alternate. In the absence of the President, 1st Vice President or the 2nd Vice President, the Recording Secretary shall preside at a regular membership or Board of Directors meetings. The Recording Secretary shall keep an accurate and permanent, separate record of all articles, so moved upon by the regular membership in addition to the regular recorded minutes. Such records shall be known as "Rules and Regulations".

Section 11. The Corresponding Secretary: The Corresponding Secretary shall attend to the correspondence of the Society. The Corresponding Secretary shall distribute the mail to the Officers. The Corresponding Secretary shall answer all inquiries from outside sources.

Section 12. The Treasurer: The Treasurer shall collect all dues and fees and keep proper books of account showing all receipts, disbursements, and the balance of cash on hand. The Treasurer shall deposit all monies of the Society in a bank designated by the Board of Directors, to the credit of the Society, and shall be authorized to disburse the funds of the Society. The Treasurer shall be responsible for the custody of all security's and assets of the Society, accept the library holdings, subject to the supervision of the Board of Directors. The Treasurer shall present a financial report to the regular monthly membership meetings and an annual report at the annual November meeting, along with a complete statement of the assets and liabilities of the Society. The Treasurer shall serve as chairman of the Finance and Budget Committee. In the absence of the President, 1st Vice President, 2nd Vice President or the Recording Secretary, the Treasurer shall preside at the regular membership or Board of Director meetings. The duties of the Finance and Budget Committee shall be to determine financial requirements and compile the annual budget, which shall be approved first by the Board of Directors, thence by the regular membership, at a regular meeting of the Society. The Treasurer's accounts shall be audited at least thirty (30) days before the end of the fiscal year. An auditing committee, consisting of one member of the Board of Directors and two members at large, who shall be appointed by the President. This committee shall report their findings by a signed statement at the next regular membership meeting. The Treasurer must surrender to the auditing committee, the following items;

1. Checkbooks and cancelled checks and deposit slips.
2. Bank Statements.
3. Ledger or Accounting books.
4. Itemized statements of paid accounts.
5. Accounts receivable.
6. Itemized list of all assets of the Society.
7. All other items concerning the Office of Treasurer.

The accounting must be acceptable to the incoming Treasurer.

Section 13. General Provisions: In addition to the powers conferred and the duties imposed by this article, upon the several Officers of the Society, such Officers shall exercise the powers conferred and perform the duties imposed upon them by the other Articles of these By-Laws. Except as their duties are otherwise provided for, the duties of the various Administrative Officers shall be such as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE VI

COMMITTEES

Section 1. The following committees, with chairmen as designated, shall recommend policy to the Board of Directors and upon approval, shall implement the policy, keeping within their respective, approved budgets. Committee members shall be recommended by the Committee Chairmen, for approval or rejection, by the Board of Directors of the Society. Only those who have consented to serve shall be acceptable to serve on a committee. All committee's and chairmen shall serve concurrently with the appointive, elected Officers of the Society, unless otherwise directed by the Board of Directors.

(A) Historian: The President, with approval of the Board of Directors, shall appoint a Historian. The Historian shall compile and keep a record of the activities, honors and achievements of the Society or its members. Shall surrender all the aforementioned records to a newly appointed Historian or as otherwise directed by the Board of Directors.

(B) Librarian: The President, with the approval of the Board of Directors, shall appoint a Librarian. The Library committee shall select, acquire and maintain genealogical material for the Library. The Librarian shall serve as chairman, who shall also appoint two (2) additional members to this committee. The duties of the Librarian are;

1. Catalogue all materials of the Society's holdings.
2. Keep the material in good repair.
3. Maintain regular library hours and to assist others where possible, with the various holdings of our library.
4. May use voluntary members to assist in the use of the library.

(C) The Quarterly Editor: The President, with the approval of the Board of Directors, shall appoint the Quarterly Editor as Chairman. The duties of the Quarterly Editor shall be to appoint contributing editors, maintain a budget, which shall be approved annually by the Board of Directors and the regular membership. The Quarterly Editor shall be responsible for preparing and mailing the quarterlies, based on policies established by the Board of Directors. The Quarterly publication shall be distributed to all regular memberships. Family memberships shall receive one quarterly per household. The Quarterly publication, known as "The Logan County Genealogical Society Quarterly", shall be published by the Society during Spring, Summer, Fall and Winter. The subscription

rate shall be \$8.00 per year or \$2.00, postpaid per single copy of back issues. Exchange of quarterlies and special publications with other Genealogical or Historical Society's shall be arranged and coordinated by the Quarterly Editor and Librarian. The Quarterly Editor shall be responsible to select articles for publication concerning genealogy and historical items of interest for the membership, based on policies established by the Board of Directors.

- (D) Publications and Project Committee: This Committee shall plan and coordinate projects for the purpose of collecting and preserving genealogical and historical records. They shall determine priorities and recommend prices for special publications. Shall also see that the material is published. Advertise, set up displays and sell publications at various meetings, conferences, etc. This with the approval of the Board of Directors. This committee shall maintain a stock of publications and prepare an annual inventory. Shall answer all inquiries regarding sales of publications. Collect and deposit funds weekly with the Treasurer of the Society. To furnish records of sales to the Treasurer. Make an annual report to the President of all sales and activities of the Committee. Make monthly reports, as requested by the President, for regular monthly membership meetings.
- (E) Public Relations: The Public Relations Chairman shall be appointed by the President, with the approval of the Board of Directors. The duties of this committee or chairman shall be to advertise in the various medias, the activities of the Society. Shall disseminate information concerning the Society and its publications and to prepare a commercial advertising program when necessary.
- (F) Genealogist: The Genealogist shall be appointed by the President, with the approval of the Board of Directors. The Genealogist shall do limited research in answering specific inquiries.
- (G) Auditing Committee: The Auditing Committee shall consist of one member of the Board of Directors and two members at large, appointed by the President, with the approval of the Board of Directors. The Committee shall elect its own Chairman.
- (H) Nominating Committee: The Nominating Committee shall consist of three (3) members chosen at the August meeting of an election year, of the regular membership. There shall be one (1) appointee by the President and Two (2) elected from the regular membership. The committee shall elect its own Chairman. The Nominating Committee shall be given a list of each Officers duties, together with names of members in good standing, and accordingly, select one (1) nominee for each office to be filled. The committee shall report the slate of Officers in the October Quarterly, announcing the November, election year, meeting. Following the nominating committee's report at the November election year meeting, opportunity shall be given for nominations from the floor.

ARTICLE VII

AMENDMENTS AND REVISIONS

- Section (1) A five (5) member committee shall be appointed by the President, with the approval of the Board of Directors, every third year, from the latest revision of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society, to review the same. This Committee shall report its findings to the Board of Directors for their consideration. In the event any changes are recommended, a copy of the same shall be mailed to the regular membership and shall be voted upon at the next regular membership meeting, within one (1) month after the date of mailing. The vote shall be by simple majority of all members present at the said monthly membership meeting.
- Section (2) Any member in good standing, may propose an amendment by submitting the same in writing to the Corresponding Secretary. The proposed amendment shall then be submitted to the Board of Directors for approval before submitting to the regular membership. The proposed amendment, after action by the Board of Directors, shall be mailed to each member, and shall be voted upon at the next regular membership meeting, falling at least one (1) month after the date of mailing.

ARTICLE VIII

DISSOLUTION

- Section (1) Upon the dissolution of the Society, the Officers who serve on the Board of Directors, shall after paying or making provisions for the payment of all liabilities of the Society, offer the assets of the Society to the Illinois State Genealogical Society, or in the event the Illinois State Genealogical Society should not exist, the assets shall be offered to the Illinois State Historical Library, or to an organization or organizations founded and operated exclusively for educational, charitable, religious or scientific purposes, which qualify as an exempt organization under Section 501 (C) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), or as the Board of Directors shall determine.
- Section (2) Any of such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the Logan County Court of Common Pleas, where the Society is located, exclusively for such organization or organizations, as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes under Section 501 (C) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future Internal Revenue Law).

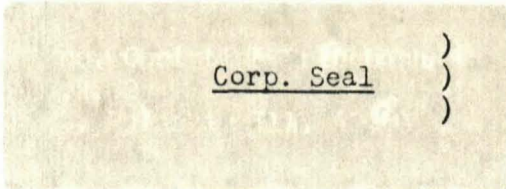
