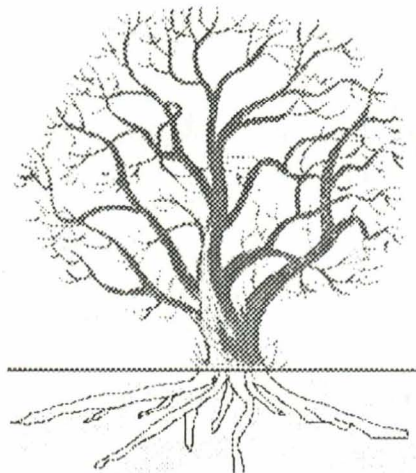

## National Conference of Palatines to America

It is not too early to start planning to attend the 1997 National Conference of Palatines to America, to be held in Fort Wayne, Indiana on 11-13 June. Sponsored by the Indiana Chapter on the theme of German genealogical research, it will be held during the city's Germanfest, and just two blocks from the excellent genealogical research collection of the Allen County Public Library.

### **Abraham Lincoln, His Relatives**

(An early letter of Abraham Lincoln's dated April 1, 1854, was published in the St. Louis Globe-Democrat Oct. 4, 1883, via the Chattanooga Times. This version was copied from the St. Louis Genealogical Society, Vol. XXVIII, No. 4, 1995.)

From the Chattanooga Times. . . Dr. Lincoln of this city, a cousin of Abraham Lincoln, has in his possession a letter to his father by his relative in 1854, which sheds some light on the illustrious statesman's family history. Dr. Lincoln's father was at the time living in the upper East Tennessee county. The fame of Abraham Lincoln was becoming national at that period. Dr. Lincoln's name was Israel, and all his relatives bore Biblical names. When the name of Abraham Lincoln reached his ears he wrote him, feeling confident that he was a relative, and the following was his response.

Springfield, Ill., April 1, 1854. .My Dear Sir - On yesterday I had the pleasure of receiving your letter of the 16th of March. From what you say there can be no doubt that you and I are of the same family. The history of your family, as you give it, is precisely what I have always heard, and partly know, of my own. As you have supposed, I am the grandson of your Uncle Abraham and the story of his death by the Indians, and of Uncle Mordecai, then 14 years old, killing one of the Indians, is the legend most prominent of all others imprinted upon my mind and memory. I am the son of grandfather's youngest son Thomas.

I have often heard my father speak of his Uncle Isaac, residing on the Watagua (I think), near where the States of Virginia, North Carolina, and Tennessee join. You see now to be some hundred miles or so west of there.,

I often saw Uncle Mordecai and Uncle Josiah, but never in my left resided near either of them. Uncle Mordecai died in 1831 or 1832 in Hancock County, Illinois, where he had been recently removed from Kentucky and where his children had also removed and still reside, as I understand. Whether Uncle Josiah is dead or living I cannot tell, not having heard from him for more than twenty years. When I last heard from him he was living on Big Blue River, Hancock Co., Indiana, I think, and where he has resided ever since before the beginning of my recollection.

My father, Thomas, died the 17th of January, 1851, in Coles County, Illinois, where he had resided twenty years. I am his only child. I have resided here and hear-about twenty-three years. I am 45 years of age, and have a wife and three children, the oldest is 11 years. My wife was born and raised in Lexington, Ky., and my connection with her has sometimes taken me there, where I have heard the old people of her relatives speak of your Uncle Thomas and family. He is dead long ago, and his descendants have gone to some part of Missouri, as I recollect what I was told.

When I was in Washington (sic) in 1848, I got up a correspondence with David Lincoln, residing at Sparta, Rockingham County, Va., who, like yourself, was a first cousin of my father, but I forgot, if he informed me, which of my grandfather's brothers was his father.

With Col. Crozier, of whom you speak, I formed quite an intimate acquaintance for a short one, and when you meet him again, I would thank you to present him my respects.

Your present Governor Andrew Johnson, was also at Washington while I was, and told me of there being people of the name of Lincoln in Carver County. I can no longer claim to be a young man myself, but I infer that as you are of some generation of my father you are some older. I shall be very glad to hear from you again. Very truly your relative.

### **Fire Warning for all Genealogists!**

There is a potential firebomb in your house! Fire marshals across the country have been alerted that between 1889 and the mid 1950s, all film contained nitric acid. This means ALL FILM - negatives, slides, home movies. With age, this film will self-combust, especially in attics and basements.

This is a very real danger, but there are some things you can do. You can have each piece of film tested - or test it yourself using a special pen from an archival products company. Your best with old film is to have new copies made on modern film. The old film should be destroyed - very carefully because nitric acid fumes are toxic.

### **Clean Those Old Photos - Safely!**

PEC-12, available from Photographic Solutions, will clean "goo" like ballpoint ink, finger oils, grease pencil, smoke, soot, and adhesive residue from old photos. All you have to do is spray a little PEC-12 on a soft cloth and gently rub the surface of the prints. It is archival and will not degrade print or film. It is available from most camera stores.

## Two Disinherited by Mrs. J. A. Logan

Washington, DC, March 15

The will of Mrs. John A. LOGAN, widow of Gen. LOGAN, filed here for probate, disinherits her two granddaughters, Mary Louise DESANCAJ and Edith Josephine DILWORTH

Mrs. LOGAN declared that she once had a great affection for them, but they "completely ignored the existence of myself and their aunt, Mary Logan TUCKER, and have treated me with such unpardonable indifference that I cannot forgive them or allow them to share with their brother, John A. LOGAN III, in my affections or benefactions."

Calumet Place, the home of Gen. LOGAN, is given to her daughter, Mary Logan TUCKER, and her grandson, John A. LOGAN III, during their lives, and is to descend to John A. LOGAN IV. The library, manuscripts and copyrights of Gen. LOGAN and the deceased are given to Mrs. TUCKER, and at her death to John A. LOGAN III.

In the event of the grandson's death, the library is to go to the State Historical Society of Illinois, to be known as the Logan Library. A collection of curios, on the death of Mrs. TUCKER, is to be placed in Logan Memorial Hall in the capitol in Springfield.

The daughter is directed to burn all the private letters of Gen. LOGAN and of his widow and the publication of any extracts is expressly forbidden. Badges, family silver and copies of coats of arms are given to the grandson. Certain presents and wall tapestry are left to Edith A. LOGAN, her daughter-in-law with the regret that the testatrix has nothing more valuable to give in recognition "of never failing kindness and generosity."

## What are Death Initials?

The following initials often appear on old death certificates: d.s.p. = died without issue (decessit sine prole); d.s.p.l. = died without legitimate issue (decessit sine prole legitima); d.s.p.m.s. = died without surviving male issue (decessit sine prole supersita); d.s.p.s. = died without surviving issue (decessit sine prole supersita); d.u.n.m. = died unmarried; d.v.p. = died in the life time of his mother. ## Homestead Records

There are seven states (these states not identified) where homestead records were cross indexed by landowner names. If your ancestor acquired land under the 1862 Homestead Act, or bought it from the government, his application is probably on file. Files include a four page questionnaire filled out by the homesteader listing names of family members and other personal information. Write: Civil Archives and Records Service, GSA Washington DC 20409. Give your ancestors full name and any other pertinent information.

## Tracing Your Civil War Ancestor

To start you should read Tracing Your Civil War Ancestor by Bertram Hawthorne Groene. It lists address and a wealth of other information which you will need to know in your search. If your ancestor was a Confederate soldier, Confederate Research Sources: A Guide to Archive Collections will be helpful.

See if your library knows about the American Genealogical Lending Library (PO Box 244, Bountiful UT 84011). For three dollars a roll, you can read the microfilm at your public library and they have military records for the Civil War and an index to the pension records found in the National Archives.

When you find out which unit your ancestors served in, you will need to write to the National Archives and ask for NATF Form 80. The address is: National Archives and Records Administration, General Reference Branch (NNRG-P), 7th and Pennsylvania Avenue, NW, Washington DC 20408. When you get the form, fill it out and send it in. When the records are located you will be notified and told how much money to send in to receive the records.

Once you receive the records, or know the unit your ancestor served in, there are many ways to find more information about the unit. The most complete guide to regimental publications and personal narratives is Charles E. Dornbusch's Military Bibliography of the Civil War. These three volumes list books and articles about each regiment, north and south. These volumes are not expensive and are a very valuable source.

When you know your ancestor's regiment, another source for your Union veteran is Frederick Dyer's A Compendium of the War of the Rebellion. This outlines the histories, commanders, and movements of all the regiments in the Union army. This has been reprinted by Morningside Bookshop, PO Box 1087, Dayton OH 45401, and costs \$125. The story of this book and Mr. Dyer's devotion to his task is an amazing story in itself.

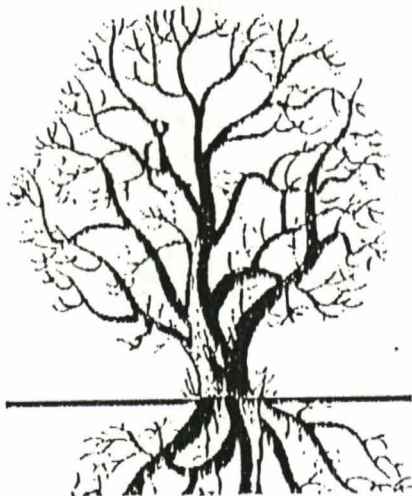

## Doing Stone Rubbings

A trip to an old cemetery to do stone rubbings needs to be carefully planned. Our old family cemetery might be cleaned just before memorial Day. To be prepared to go, I take boots, brushes, even garden cutting tools. The shears are necessary to cut the briars and vines which sometimes grow over the stones.

Use the stiff brush to clean the lichens, vines, and dirt from the stone. Be aware of poison ivy, and be watchful for snakes.

Take with you rice paper from an art store, or Pellon from a fabric shop. On the rice paper you may use a soft lead pencil, crayon, or charcoal. If you are doing a delicate design, paper and graphite pencil or colored pencil are best.

If the cemetery is unknown to you, always ask permission. Wander about to see the types of tones, some markers, especially sandstone are very fragile. Even scrubbing may do some damage. Slate, marble, or granite are probably the best to start with. Look for those that have decorations and inscriptions, these seem to be the best for rubbing.

Measure your material to be larger than the marker and fasten it with masking tape. Rub the surface lightly to see the design and lettering. You can then rub it until you get your print the right density in rubbing.

Roll your rubbing on a cardboard tube after you have removed the tape from your drawing.

It is helpful to carry a cloth bag to carry your tools and paper rollers in. You may want to take a kneeling pad also. I have a garden foam pad that is great for this. Early stones are wonderful for rubbings.

Try some new art work, in your spring outings.

## **Genealogical Research Through Free Queries in Newspapers** by George H. Miller

Newspaper genealogical columns which accept free queries can be a most valuable source in researching your family history.

The best source for this information is a copy of the Newspaper Genealogical Column Directory, second edition, by Anita Check Milner, published by Heritage Books, Inc., Suite 300, Maureen, Bowie, MD 20715.

This directory may be in your local genealogical shop for about \$7.50 a copy, or you may order it from the publisher for \$9.50 postpaid. Columns carrying free queries are listed by state and county and indicate counties covered. Several have limits of thirty five or fifty words, but some are unlimited. Once you select the column you are aiming for and have reviewed the ground rules, you are ready to start writing.

### **Civil War Photos**

If you are looking for Civil War photos of your ancestors, contact the United States Military History Institute. The staff will check the card files for name and/or regiments and send copies (limit 10 per patron) of what they have, along with copy costs.

## Looking for Your Elusive Patriot?

There are several sources where you might find your family military history. There are four types of military histories. There are service records, pension records, disability records, and claim records. Military histories are found in daybooks and diaries made by specific soldiers or officers.

Sources to consult are the DAR Patriot Index of National Daughters of American Revolution. This publication has material for both men and women who provided services to the Revolutionary effort between 1774 and 1783. There is an alphabetical listing which provides nationality and death data for the individual. It also provides spouses, rank, area of service, and the state from which the patriot served. If a soldier received a pension, a "PNSR" appears after his name. If his children received a pension, a "CPNS" will appear, a widow "WPNS" is used.

There are two major indexes to consult on pensions, "The Index of Revolutionary War Pension Application," and the "Genealogical Abstracts of the Revolutionary War Pension Files." If you find information in either resource you can request and view the pension papers from the National Archives. These resources can often be found in many state libraries.

Another source is "Pierce's Register" (published by Baltimore Genealogical Pub. Co.). This work provides the certificate number, the veteran to whom the certificate was issued and the amount of the claim.

The fourth source is called "The American Genealogical Bio-Graphical Index to American Genealogical, Biographical and Local History Materials" (Middletown, Conn. The Godfrey Memorial Library, 1952). This was originally published as the American Genealogical Index, known by many as the "Rider Index." There are more than 180 volumes in its reprinted forms. Some historical topics include: Historical Register of Virginians in the Revolution, Soldiers-Sailors, 1775-1783; Rolls and Lists of Connecticut Men in the Revolution, Muster and Payrolls of the Revolutionary War and 600 Revolutionary Soldiers Living in Georgia in 1827-8. These topics are just a few of those that can be found in this publication.

Another guide might be "US Military Records: A Guide to Federal and State Sources, Colonial America to the Present" by James C. Magler.

The National Archives published "Military Service Records: A Select Catalogue of National Archives Microfilm Publication" (Washington DC National Archives Trust Fund Board, 1985).

The US Federal Government has published many reports on historical data and military operations, soldiers, veterans and financial obligations. Many of these are available from the Library of Congress.

**From Gordon D. Johnson, Editor of Whiteside County Genealogical News**

I don't know how many times someone has told me they were stuck and I find out they haven't looked at the census. If your ancestors lived in the US between 1850 and 1920, you need to look at the census. There is so much information there. Yes, I know the common lines: there are so many mistakes, they missed my people, or I looked but I didn't find out anything. Well, try again! Nine times out of ten you are missing important information.

First, when you search a census, you need to look at the film at least twice. I have even found things the third time I looked.

I like to use census indexes, it is nice to have a book that is the census of that county you are looking at. And I would have to say that the Soundex for the US Census, 1880-1920, is of great value and is a time saver. BUT, always, always go back to the original. Look at the hand writing yourself and see if you agree with the indexes. There are many reasons to look at the original yourself, as you will see through your own experience.

A few of the things you can learn from the census are: place of birth of parents & grand-parents, month & year of birth, were they naturalized, number of children dead and alive, could they read or write, and much more.

---

### **Census Findings**

Scholars have used censuses in detailed historical research for years. Some of these findings may prove interesting to genealogists:

1. It's estimated five to ten percent of the population is missed in each census with urban lower classes overlooked more often than rural middle classes.
2. Data on wealth, personal property, and real estate have proved to be extremely accurate.
3. "Age heaping" or the tendency of census takers to report ages to the nearest year ending in "0" or "5" was frequent.
4. Two thirds of those recorded in the 1920 census are native born of native parents.
5. Religious affiliation is never asked.
6. "Free colored Person" category of the 1840 census could include persons of any race or nationality that did not appear "white" to the census taker.
7. Compared to the information contained on the 1910 census, we learn from the 1920 census the mother tongue of both the mother and father and the year of naturalization, if applicable. (Re: Sandusky, OH Kin Hunters via BCGS Vol. VI:5)

The commonly held notion of colonial American family life - that many generations lived together and shared farm and household chores - is far from the truth. Few people lived long enough to see their children grown, let alone their grandchildren. Data compiled in 1790 by Dr. Benjamin Rush, the prominent physician, indicates that of 100 people born in a given year in Philadelphia, more than one-third died before the age of 6 and only one-quarter lived beyond the age of 26. The life expectancy at birth for Americans was 34.5 years for females and 36.5 years for males when George Washington became President in 1789.

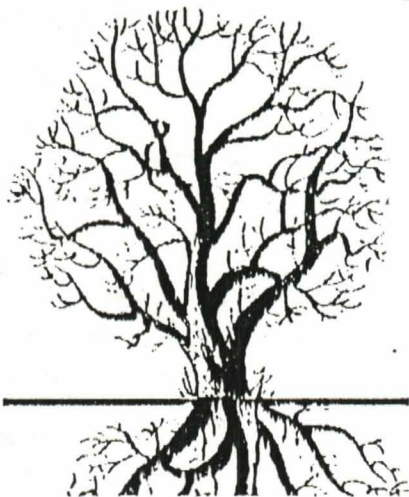

## **Tips for Preserving Scrapbooks**

Scrapbooks are a much beloved and often used means of saving photographs, newspaper clippings, pamphlets, documents, and the other assorted items which document the interests and activities of individuals, families, and organizations. While each is a unique item, scrapbooks share many common characteristics which cause problems.

Materials and techniques commonly used in scrapbooks present real preservation challenges. Album and scrapbook pages are almost always made of low-quality paper that will embrittle over time and contribute to discoloration of the items placed in the scrapbook. The binding structure is often unable to adjust to the bulge caused by overloading the scrapbook, with detached covers a common result. Vinyl plastic commonly used in modern scrapbooks and albums is damaging over time to photographs. Items are often attached to scrapbook pages with harmful tapes and adhesives. Staples and pins, also used for attachment purposes, often rust over time and contribute to years of poor quality scrapbook pages. So what should you do with scrapbooks that you treasure and want to maintain in good condition over time?

### **Tip #1**

An archival quality storage box provides a high quality storage enclosure for scrapbooks. These can be obtained from archival supply sources. Scrapbooks should be stored spine down or flat in the box, depending on box design and scrapbook size.

### **Tip #2**

Shelving small and medium-sized scrapbooks on open book shelves between books of similar size will help to prevent warp and distortion of the scrapbooks.

### **Tip #3**

Scrapbooks with loose or detached covers can be tied up (package style), preferably with flat cotton tape, to reduce damage. Place the bow knot at the foreedge of the scrapbook to prevent pressure indentations on the covers.

### **Tip #4**

Wrapping loosely bound or damaged scrapbooks with acid-free paper provides better protection than tying up alone, and is helpful even if the item will be boxed.

### **Tip #5**

Flat storage of scrapbooks is best if they contain pamphlets and similar multiple-page items attached to scrapbook pages or heavy artifacts (e.g., buttons, medals, etc.) loosely attached to the pages.

### **Tip #6**

Handle scrapbooks carefully; they are complex physical structures. Bindings and brittle pages can break and scrapbook contents can easily become detached or torn. If making a photocopy, be very cautious about applying pressure that could break the binding of the scrapbook.

### **Tip #7**

Generally it is wiser to leave the scrapbook as you inherited it rather than to try to improve on its construction methods. Attend to storage and handling; contact a conservator if you want to address repair problems.

## North Carolina Marriages

In early North Carolina, marriage bonds were relatively expensive. At the same time marriage banns could be published in the local church at less expense. Therefore, about three-fourths of the early marriages were preceded by church banns rather than by marriage bonds. As a result of this, many early North Carolina marriages will not be found among the existing marriage bonds. Records of marriage banns do not exist in most cases.

## Did You Know?

The magnetic photo albums, the kind with the sticky backing and a clear plastic overlay is very destructive. The chemical reaction from the plastic will eventually cause deterioration and discoloration. If you are using this type, you should consider removing your heritage prints, the ones you want to hand down to the children, from the albums. If you have trouble getting pictures out of these, first put the album in the refrigerator overnight. The cold seems to make the material more willing to separate without destroying your print. There are archival quality plastic print holders available that use acid free paper and mylar plastic. Remember, though, that GLAD FOOD BAGS are made from mylar and are safe to use and cheaper!

## How Tombstones Started

The practice of putting a stone on a grave arose not from piety but from fear; its origin was not respect for the dead but the motive was of self-protection. Even after all precautions had been taken, the living were still afraid that the dead person might return and act against his former community. To make absolutely sure he stayed in his tomb, they weighted the soil down with a stone.

A later development was the worship of graves. The tombstone was looked on as a home for the spirit. Later on people were no longer worried about getting defiled, but became concerned that the grave may be desecrated. They placed stones on the grave to prevent animals from digging up the body. 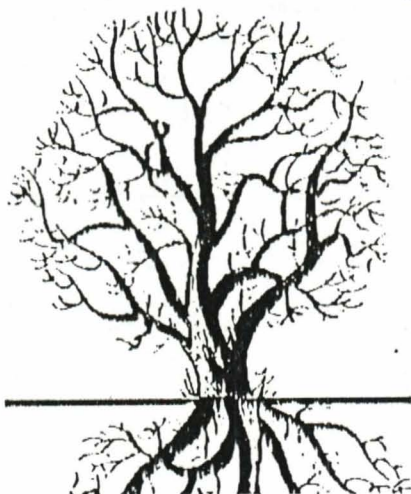

### Civil War Records Update

The Allen Co. Public Library, Fort Wayne, IN, and the Family History Center, Salt Lake City, UT, will be the two national data centers for the Civil War Soldiers Systems Names index Project co-sponsored by the National Park Service, the National Archives and several genealogical societies. The Civil War Soldiers System will include a computerized data base that will contain the names and basic facts on more than three million soldiers. This modern version is a follow-up to a 5.5 million name General Index Cards file created by the US War Department a century ago. Volunteers from all over the country will input data through their computers at home or at regional centers.

Curt Witcher, manager of the Historical Genealogy Dept. of the Allen Co. Public Library and current president of the Federation of Genealogical Societies, explains that each record in the data base will contain the name of the soldier and any variations in the name, the company and unit names, whether Union or Confederate, his rank in and his rank out. Witcher emphasizes that volunteers need not be a member of a genealogical society to participate. To volunteer, write to the Federation of Genealogical Societies, Civil War Soldiers Index, PO Box 3385, Salt Lake City UT 84110-3385. Indicate your computer experience and available equipment.

The idea for the project developed as a result of the frustration among attendants at Civil War sites who were frequently asked questions by visitors about how to trace ancestors who served in the war. Joseph Reidy of Howard University is heading a project to identify blacks who served in the US Navy during the Civil War. The Center for the Study of the Civil War at Shepherd College, Shepherdstown, NV, plans to add expanded information on 50,000 West Virginians who served in the Civil War. Other enhancements are planned as funds and volunteers become available.
