## Happy 20th Anniversary, Logan County Genealogical Society!

The Logan County Genealogical Society was organized on May 15, 1978 during the Siltenial year of Lincoln and Logan County, but the membership approved an annual date of November 1977, when the first meeting was held, to November 1978. The first officers were: Emily McElhaney, president; Helen Gordy, first vice president; Lester Wickline, second vice president; Emily Gordon, recording secretary; Harriet Milleville, treasurer, and Albertha Koller, newsletter editor.

Meetings were held on the third Monday evening of the month. Meeting places were the Farm Bureau Building, Lincoln Public Library, and St. Clara's Manor. Dues were single \$5.00, family \$6.00, and student \$1.00. Charter members were members who had paid \$5.00 dues by December 31, 1978.

The Constitution and Bylaws was officially accepted on February 19, 1979. The committee for developing this document was comprised of Lester Wickline, chairman, Helen Stephansen and Louise Jeffries. Helen Stephansen wrote the Preamble to the Constitution.

Gleaned from the November 7, 1977 meeting: Mary Fouts, Tazewell County Extension Advisor, presented a program on "Climbing Your Family Tree." Her advice was to "write down facts, keep an organized file, collect family stories in order to search out your roots." She keeps a "search bag" packed and available for when she has an opportunity to seek material at a county clerk's office, at a state historical library, at the state archives or when she goes searching in a cemetery. Her "search bag" contains notebooks of information to be used for recordings, a probe to use in searching for headstones that have been covered with dirt, a magnifying glass, pencils and a roll of paper to do rubbings.

When doing a family diagram, did you ever think to use a window shade? Emily McElhaney suggested this at the June 19, 1978 meeting.

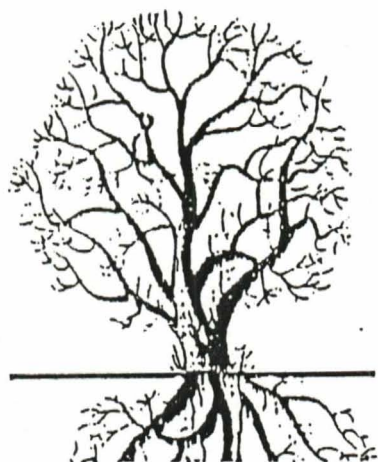

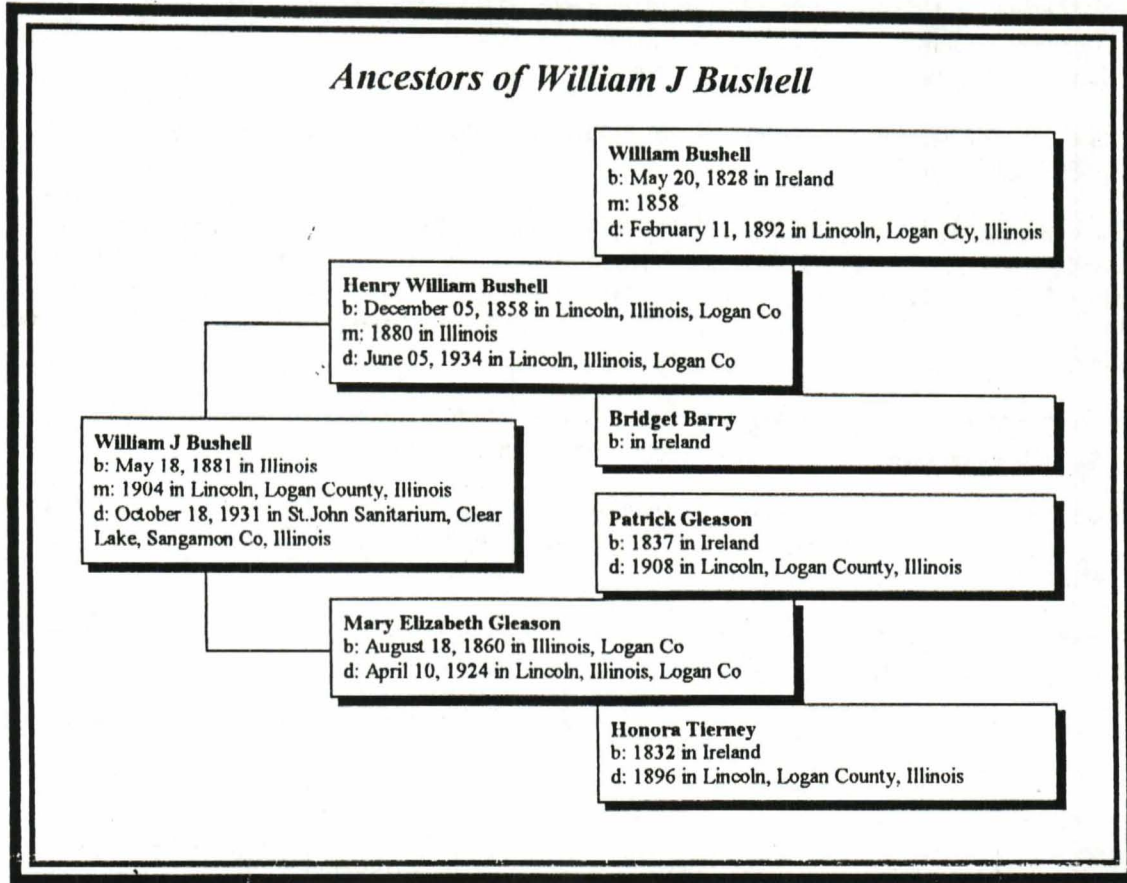

- 8) Thou shall not complain about "Right to Privacy" laws that prohibit you from knowing all of the affairs of your relatives.
- 9) Thou shall accept the fact that some records simply do not exist.
- 10) Thou shall not even be tempted to take original papers. A copy will serve you just as well.

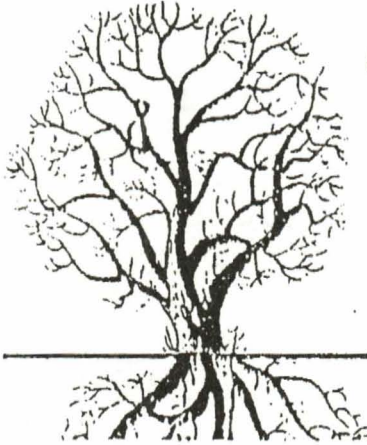

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## Civil War Info

In the Rebellion Record Vol. 16, the president of the confederacy was born out of wedlock. An account reprinted from the Nashville Union has it that old Davis was a man of bad character, a horse trader, a swindler, and a man of very low habits. The newspaper read, "Jeff Davis is his illegitimate son, born some miles distant from his father's home and taken home by him when several years of age."

A Democratic publication in 1863 informed readers that Abraham Lincoln was a son of a man named Inlow, rather than the son of Thomas Lincoln. According to his law partner Wm. Hernden, the president went to his grave believing he was illegitimate.

After Abraham Lincoln was shot in Ford Theater, he was carried across the street to the home of William A. Peterson, a Washington tailor. The room was rented by Pvt. Wm. T. Clark of the Thirteenth Massachusetts Regiment, and it was vacated for the wounded president. Lincoln died on a commandeered bed once occupied by John Wilkes Booth, when a friend of his rented from Peterson.

### Illinois State Archives Billing Policy Revised

As of January 1, 1998, the Illinois State Archives will no longer bill for copies. Instead prepaid \$5.00 vouchers, each containing ten \$.50 credits, must be purchased and sent in with requests.

If the desired record is located and copied, Archives staff will punch the voucher for the appropriate amount and return it with the copy. (Vouchers may not, however, be used to pay bills issued by the Illinois Regionals Archives Depositories or those previously incurred at the Archives.) Valid for two years after purchase, vouchers may be obtained by sending a check to: Illinois State Archives, Norton Building, Springfield, IL 62756.

The Archives is now able to accept credit cards (Visa, Mastercard, and Discover/Novus) as payment for larger bills, such as book purchases, although a \$.40 surcharge is added for this service.

WE ARE SURVIVORS!!!! Consider the changes we have witnessed:

We were born before television, before penicillin, before polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, plastic, contact lenses, Frisbees and the Pill.

We were before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ballpoint pens, before pantyhose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes--and before anyone walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. How quaint can you be?

In our time, closets were for clothes, not for "coming out of." Bunnies were small rabbits and rabbits were not Volkswagens, Designer Jeans were scheming girls named Jean or Jeanne, and having a meaningful relationship meant getting along well with our cousins.

We thought fast food was what you ate during Lent, and Outer Space was the back of the Riviera Theater.

We were before house-husbands, gay rights, computer dating, dual careers and commuter marriages. We were before day-care centers, group therapy and nursing homes. We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yogurt, and guys wearing earrings. For us, time-sharing meant togetherness--not computers or condominiums; a "chip" meant a piece of wood; hardware meant hardware, and software wasn't even a word!

In 1940, "made in Japan" meant junk and the term "making out" referred to how you did on your exam. Pizzas, McDonald's and instant coffee were unheard of.

We hit the scene when there were 5 and 10 cent stores, where you bought things for five and ten cents. Sanders and Wilson sold ice cream cones for a nickel or a dime. For one nickel you could ride a street car, make a phone call, buy a Pepsi or enough stamps to mail one letter and two post cards. You could buy a new Chevy Coupe for \$600, but who could afford one? A pity, too, for gas was 11 cents a gallon.

In our day, cigarette smoking was fashionable. Grass was mowed. Coke was a cold drink and pot was something you cooked in. Rock music was grandma's lullaby and aids were helpers in the principal's office.

We were certainly not before the difference between the sexes was discovered, but we were surely before the sex change. We made do with what we had. And we were the last generation that was so dumb as to think you needed a husband to have a baby!

No wonder we are so confused and there is such generation gap today!  
BUT WE SURVIVED!!!! What better reason to celebrate?

### History of Taps

It all began in 1862, during the Civil War, when a Union Army captain, Robert Ellicombe, was with his men near Harrison's Landing in Virginia. The Confederate Army was on the other side of this narrow strip of land.

During the night Captain Ellicombe heard the moan of a soldier who lay wounded on the field. Not knowing if it was a Union or Confederate soldier, the captain decided to risk his life and bring back the stricken man for medical attention.

Crawling on his stomach through gunfire, the captain reached the soldier and began pulling him back toward his encampment. When he finally reached his own lines, he discovered it was actually a Confederate soldier, but the soldier was dead.

The captain lit a lantern, suddenly caught his breath, and went numb with shock. In the dim light of the lantern he saw the face of the soldier...it was his son! The young man had been studying music in the South when the war broke out, and without telling his father, he had enlisted in the Confederate Army.

The following morning, the heartbroken father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial, despite the young man's enemy status. The captain's request was partially granted.

He asked if he could have a group of army band members play a dirge for his son in the funeral. His request was refused since the soldier was a Confederate. Out of respect for the captain, they said they could loan him one musician. He chose the bugler. The captain asked him to play a series of musical notes found in the pocket of the dead youth's uniform. This wish was granted. The music was what we now know as "Taps."

**Remember When: Armistice Day,  
November 11, 1922**

A patriotic program was held on Armistice Day, November 11, 1922 when a marker commemorating the judicial circuit Abraham Lincoln rode was formally dedicated during afternoon ceremonies sponsored by the Abraham Lincoln Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution on behalf of the Lincoln Circuit Marking Association.

The marker was made in the form of a granite slab bearing the familiar Lincoln circuit tablet in bronze and was located on the lawn at the west door of the Logan County Courthouse.

The marker read:

Abraham Lincoln  
Traveled This Way as He Rode  
the Circuit of the  
Old Eighth Judicial District  
1847                      1859  
Erected 1922

Members of the Grand Army of the Republic, American Legion, the Daughters of the American Revolution and other local patriotic organizations had a share of the program. The honored guest of the event was Mrs. Josephine Wodetski, an original D.A.R. and one of the few surviving members in the nation. She and four little girls were scheduled to do the unveiling.

Lawrence B. Stringer, former Congressman, historian, county judge, and a student of Lincoln history, presided over the celebration which was held indoors in the circuit court room. Legion, G.A.R. and D.A.R. members had special seating within the chamber. Students from the I.O.O.F. home band and the glee club of Lincoln High School.

Reverend H. L. Moore delivered the invocation which was followed by Judge

Stringer's welcoming address. Brief responses and tributes to Lincoln were delivered by Captain A. D. Cadwallader on behalf of the Civil War veterans and the Logan County Bar Association. Lieutenant Harold Shepler, Commander of the Logan Post American Legion, paid tribute to the former president and declared Lincoln's life an inspiration to this and other generations.

Miss Lottie F. Jones of Danville, chairman of the Lincoln Circuit Marking Association, spoke on the history of the marker. It was in the fall of 1914 that a plea was made by Judge J. O. Cunningham of Urbana that the old Eighth Judicial Circuit Trail ought to be designated and special markers established at the courthouse sites in which Lincoln was involved in court. Judge Cunningham at the time was the last living lawyer who rode the circuit with Abraham Lincoln. The counties included in the old Eighth Judicial Circuit were Logan, Sangamon, Tazewell, Woodford, McLean, DeWitt, Piatt, Champaign, Vermilion, Edgar, Coles, Shelby, Moultrie, Macon, Christian, Menard, Mason, and Livingston. Judge Stringer and Miss Julia Pegram were the Logan County representatives on the Lincoln Circuit Marker Association. Abraham Lincoln was the only lawyer to hear cases in all of the aforementioned counties. Other lawyers picked or selected certain counties for specific cases.

The committee in charge of the ceremonies of the placing of the marker included Mrs. Logan Anderson, Mrs. L. B. Stringer, Mrs. J. M. Deal, Mrs. H. S. Oyler, Mrs. Lyman Mangas, and Miss Julia Pegram. The four girls assisting Mrs. Josephine Wodetski in the unveiling of the bronze marker were Amelia Jane Mangas, Mary Caroline Gates, Savilla Latham, and Elizabeth Friend.

Presentation of the marker to Logan County was made by Mrs. A. L. Anderson, Regent of Abraham Lincoln Chapter, D.A.R., and it was accepted for the county by E. E. Dean, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors. The program was closed with the benediction being given by Rev. F. M. Hays, Chaplain of the G.A.R. and a veteran of the Civil War.

The marker was set up by W. D. Gayle of the Lincoln Monument Works. Its cement base was similar to that around the Indian Fountain.

The marker in Lincoln was a result of an idea someone dreamed up. It dated back to years before the outbreak of World War I. A

lady living in Danville, Miss Lottie Jones, originated the idea of marking with monuments the courthouses of the old Eighth Judicial District where Abraham Lincoln practiced law and the trails he followed with his fellow lawyers. For a while the object seemed impossible. With undefeatable energy she gathered up "believers" of the project - most of them patriotic women and members of the D.A.R. It was through the pleas of Judge J. O. Cunningham of Urbana, Illinois, that it all "came together" and Lottie Jones's idea became alive.

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### **By Violence**

#### **Did the Following Logan County People go Through the Coroner's Court into the Hereafter During the Last Twenty-Five Years**

Submitted by Eddie Dirks

The county records show from December 1856 to December 1881, a period of twenty-five years, the following deaths, which on account of being supposed to have been caused by violence, casualty or undue methods, were inquired of by the coroner, together with the jury's verdict and the month in the year when the deaths occurred.

In 1856

Geo. McGee, in December, "Died while in a fit; further cause unknown."

In 1867

There is no record of any coroner's inquest having been held.

In 1858

An unknown child, April, "Drowned in a pond in Lincoln by unknown parties."

In 1859

In March, the remains of Jas. Briggs at the solicitation of Mark H. Lamon, the then prosecuting attorney of this district, was disinterred and a post mortem examination made to determine as to whether or not he had been poisoned. The post mortem proved nothing but a bill of \$19.75 against the county.

In 1860

An unknown man came to his death at Elkhart in November. "Excessive use of ardent spirits."

In 1861

Everybody was busy about the war and no suicides or homicides appear on the record.

Hopstill Ayers, February, "Gunshot wound from a gun, accidentally discharged while held by the hands of her husband."

James Walton, July, "From wounds made by a knife in the hands of unknown parties."

Infant child of a Mrs. Barkey, at Atlanta, in July, "Cause unknown."

An unknown woman, November, remains found in Salt Creek, "By wounds on the head caused by a blunt instrument in the hands of unknown parties."

Jas. Conner, December, "Intemperance."

Wm. Peterson, December, "Struck by a freight train."

In 1871

Infant son of Mrs. D. A. Eisiminger, February, "Unintentionally suffocated."

A male infant, April, alleged to have died from the strokes or pressure at the hands of parties named in the verdict.

John Sutton, April, "Fell from a moving train and was run over."

Thomas Ward, May, "By strangulation or suffocation during intoxication."

Male infant, May, alleged want of proper attention on part of parents named in verdict.

Dennis Kelly, September, "Exposure and Intemperance."

John Armstrong, September, "By being thrown from a horse, breaking his neck."

Matthew McGraw, October, "By being thrown from a wagon by a runaway team."

James T. Cooley, December, "From gunshot wounds at the hands of E. H. and R. M. Wills."

Daniel Conners, November, "By a bullet fired from a pistol held by John Clear. We believe the shooting to have been wilful and malicious."

Benjamin Frank, December, "By hanging himself."

At this point Mr. Boyden become coroner and he has furnished us with the ages of the deceased, an item which the county records do not show.

John Blake, December, aged 41, "By a bullet fired from a revolver held in his own hand."

A. P. Ladue, January, aged 63, "Got out of bed and was too feeble to get back, and was chilled to death."

Arley Harper, February, aged 12, "By falling under a moving C. & A. train, the railroad company not being to blame."

Carrie E. Yelton, aged 3, "By becoming entangled in a rope swing and dislocating her spine."

Eva Schafer, June, aged 3, "By accidentally falling into a corn-sheller, being torn to pieces."

Charles A. Miller, August, aged 20, "By external violence, supposed to have been by a blow from a passing train."

Andrew Koehler, August, aged 52, "Accidental drowning."

John Thornton, August, aged 46, "Ran over by a C. & A. passenger train, the engineer not using due diligence."

William Wilmoth, August, aged 45, "By falling under and being run over by a passenger train, while attempting to climb aboard."

Emil Abel, October, aged 10, "By being thrown and dragged by a runaway horse."

W. J. Engle, November, aged 23, "By bullet fired from a revolver in his own hand."

John Harris, November, aged 34, "By a rupture of an aurismal tumor."

Henry Striggow, November, aged 63, "Hemorrhage from rupture of a blood vessel."

**To Sum Up**

.....During the first twelve of the last 25 years there were no suicides in our country; but of late years people live faster and are governed more by the passions than was formerly the case, and as soon as financial, professional, domestic or social revulsion rolls over the person his Reason pulls on his overcoat and walks out, and the person procures a revolver and with it blows his soul across the abyss into that country about the geography and directory of which there has been so much discussion.

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## The Day Logan County Honored Its World War I Servicemen

Logan County Homecoming Day for the servicemen who served in World War I was held on Wednesday, August 13, 1919. The whole event was chaired by Robert Davis. Committee members were selected from each of the county's townships. The committee members were responsible for the solicitation of food and seeing that it was delivered to the Revere House where the celebration headquarters was located. Donated foods included potato salad, fried chicken, veal loaf, slaw, baked beans, pie, cake, and sandwiches.

Financing for the event was made possible through the efforts of the school youth of the county. The members of the committee in charge of food also worked through the school districts. The trustees of the districts also served as subcommittees for each of the townships.

The welcoming home event was billed as a memorable day for Logan County and with the hearty spirit manifested by the ex-soldiers, sailors, and marines it would become one of the largest events to that date ever held in Lincoln.

The homecoming plans called for the courthouse square to be decorated with streamers running from the dome to the cluster lights. Stores planned to decorated their places of business as well as the streets.

Six Logan County bands were scheduled to play and \$500 was spent on vaudeville acts. There was also to be an ample supply of cigars and cigarettes for the returning men. The noon meal was served at the Chautaugua grounds and during the evening a lunch of assorted sandwiches, cantaloupe, ice cream, and cake was to be served on the same grounds.

Fireworks were planned for the evening at a cost of \$500. To honor the men who died in service flags were to be fired from rockets which had the inscription of their names on them.

Bands involved in the homecoming parade also gave concerts throughout the day at the Chautaugua grounds. They came from Lincoln, Mt. Pulaski, Emden, Hartsburg, New Holland, and Atlanta high schools to honor the more than 1,000 soldiers and sailors who were expected to march in the parade.

Following the fireworks a street dance was held to close the festivities of the day.

The Marriott Troupe was one of the unusual events held that day. There were two ladies and three men scheduled to perform in the afternoon. They did their acts on the torpedoes on the wings of the aeroplane. The plane was mounted on a pedestal about seventeen feet from the ground. The climax to their program included the strapping of a woman to the propeller of the

plane which goes at sixty revolutions per minute. In some fashion the torpedoes are fired and drop to a one foot level with a member of the troupe attached to each one.

The parade held at 11:00 a.m. on August 13 started at the corner of South Kickapoo and Wyatt Avenue. It passed through the downtown area and proceeded west on Broadway to the Baptist Church corner on Ottawa Street. It made a left turn on Ottawa and passed down Union Street to Seventh where it progressed down Seventh Street pass the Deaconess Hospital to College Street.

The parade was led off by Captain Julian Douglas of the 131st Infantry. He was wounded twice and captured by the Germans after which he escaped. Captain Douglas was decorated with the Distinguished Service Cross and the Croix de Guerre. All the men marched in uniforms.

The parade was the largest parade and event ever held in Lincoln. There were more than 20,000 people who attended the parade and the events at Brainard Park. Five thousand cars were parked at the entrance to the park. Thousands of persons rode the street cars to and from the park during the day. Every seat in the auditorium was filled and 6,000 persons stood on the outside in an attempt to see and hear what was going on in the amphitheater. At the park 800 soldiers and sailors sat down to the chicken dinner.

The parade was headed by a big Red Cross motorized float from which flowers were scattered in the path of the marching troops. Gold star mothers and relatives of men who were killed in service occupied the reviewing stand on the northeast corner of the courthouse square. Each detachment of troops executed a snappy "Eyes left," as a tribute to the fallen heroes and as a matter of respect to their relatives.

There were many men in the parade who limped due to their wounds and had not fully recovered.

At 12:00 noon the plane tribute from Chanute Field flew over the city and alighted north of the Chautaugua grounds. In the process of landing there was damage done to the propellers which prevented any stunt flying that afternoon.

Aerial bombs were set off in the afternoon at the park. They contained parachutes of red, white and blue with suspended American flags bearing the names of the Gold Star heroes which floated in the air following the firing of the bombs. Vaudeville acts entertained the servicemen and their families following the aerial bombs.

The fireworks that evening were one of the best ever arranged for the town. It drew as much praise as any of the other events that day. Among the unique and unusual pieces were those which depicted President Woodrow Wilson and General John Pershing.

Street dancing began at 10:00 p.m. following the fireworks. Several hundred couples danced until the day was gone. The dance was held on McLean and Broadway Streets on the square. The school bands furnished the music for the dancing.

When the troops were sent off to war from Lincoln they went off as segregated groups. The colored soldiers were sent off one week after special events were held for them. White soldiers were also honored as they departed Lincoln.

At the "homecoming" there were no colors as the troops were honored. All had a good time and the Afro-Americans mentioned that as far as they were concerned they had never had a better time.

The events which drew the citizens to downtown Lincoln during the evening of August 13, 1919 drew a crowd of 30,000 persons. It had become an all county event to honor the county's World War I troops as

they marched for perhaps the last time down the street in Lincoln on August 13, 1919.

**Logan County Genealogical & Historical Society, Inc.  
Bylaws Supersedes All Others**

**Article I. Name**

Section 1. The name of this organization shall be The Logan County Genealogical & Historical Society, Inc., a non-profit, Federal tax exempt organization, chartered by the State of Illinois, and hereinafter shall be referred to as the Society.

**Article II. Purpose**

Section 1. To stimulate an interest in the genealogy and history of the people who contributed to the establishment and development of our nation.

Section 2. To seek, preserve and make available to all persons the genealogical and historical data pertaining to those who lived in Logan County and to the incidents and events which took place here and in our country.

Section 3. To receive, hold and invest all monies received by the Society, to hold and administer property for the benefit of the Society and for the educational purposes as provided in Section 501 (C) (3) of the 1954 Internal Revenue Code of the State of Illinois.

**Article III. Membership and Dues**

Section 1. There shall be the following classes of membership as decided by the Board.

1. Charter - Members who joined the Society prior to December 31, 1978
2. Individual/Single
3. Family/Joint - Two or more people in one family living at the same address
4. Contributing - Any person, firm, or organization shall be eligible.
5. Life Membership - Individual/Single or Couple

Section 2. Each membership is entitled to receive all four (4) issues of the Society Quarterly, though some may join in mid-year or later.

Section 3. Membership year is from January 1 to December 31. Membership dues shall be established by the Board with the approval of members present.

Section 4. Members may be suspended or expelled from the Society by a 2/3 vote of the Board for insubordination or misappropriation of funds, or whose interest conflict with those of the Society's purpose. Any member so rejected may file an appeal with the Executive Board.

**Article IV. Officers**

Section 1. The elected officers of this Society shall be the President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer.

All officers shall be members in good standing and at least 18 years of age.

Section 2. Any elected officer may be removed or suspended from office if found guilty of dereliction of duty by the Executive Board.

Section 3. No member shall hold more than one elective office at a time. No President shall serve more than two consecutive terms unless the nominating committee is unable to find a qualified replacement.

**Article V. Terms of Office**

Section 1. Officers shall be elected to serve for a term of two years. Elections shall be held every other year with new officers terms to begin at the close of the Annual Meeting.

Section 2. All committees selected by the new President shall serve a term of two years unless otherwise specified at the time of election.

**Article VI. The Executive Board**

Section 1. The Executive Board shall consist of the elected officers plus the immediate past President, one former past President and a representative from regular membership with the approval of the Executive Board.

Section 2. This Board shall meet monthly or as necessary to transact Society business between regular meetings. The time and place of said meetings shall be selected by the President. Members shall be notified by mail or phone five days in advance, or if acceptable to the members, the five days may be set aside and the meeting held at their convenience as decided by the majority of the Executive Board.

**Article VII. Vacancies**

Section 1. In the event of resignation or illness of any officer, such vacancy shall be filled by the Executive Board for the remainder of the term.

**Article VIII. Duties of the Officers**

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and Executive Board, appoint all committees, and exercise general supervision over the officers and committees; is ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee. The President shall also be authorized to sign checks in the absence of the Treasurer and execute all contracts, deeds or other legal instruments as permitted by the Executive Board.

Section 2. The First Vice President shall perform all the duties of the President in the absence of that officer or their inability to serve and is also the Program Chairman.

Section 3. The Second Vice President is chairman of membership and shall keep a current list of paid members informing other officers and the membership as requested.

Section 4. The Recording Secretary shall serve as the Registered Agent of the Society and shall have the custody of the official Corporate Seal of the Society, is to accurately record all the proceedings of the regular meetings and the Board, shall read the minutes as directed by the President. The Secretary shall attest all contracts, deeds and other legal instruments as authorized by the Executive Board. In the absence of the three (3) elected top officers, the Secretary shall preside at the meetings.

Section 5. The Corresponding Secretary shall, on a regular basis and as directed by the President of the Society, pick up the mail from the post office and shall hold the only key to the post office box; distribute the mail to the proper officers and conduct correspondence as requested by the President.

Section 6. The Treasurer receives all monies for the Society and distributes it as authorized by the Executive Board; keeps an accurate accounting of all funds and makes necessary disbursements as directed; presents a detailed financial report to the Executive Board, regular and annual meetings, and is subject to the supervision of the Executive Board.

In the absence of the top (4) elected officers, the Treasurer shall conduct the meetings of the membership and the Executive Board.

The Treasurer's records shall be audited 30 days before the annual meeting by an auditing committee appointed by the President, consisting of one Board member and two (2) members at large, to be appointed at the September meeting.

The Treasurer must surrender to the auditing committee the complete set of accounts, a list of all Society assets, and any other items concerning the office, and turns over all Society properties to the new Treasurer following the annual meeting.

### **Article IX. Committees**

(The President appoints the following committees as approved by the Executive Board.)

#### Section 1. The Auditing Committee

The committee shall be appointed at the regular membership meeting in September. The Auditing Committee shall consist of one member from the Board and two members at large. They shall complete an audit of the Treasurer's accounts and submit a signed report at the annual meeting of the membership.

#### Section 2. The Editor

The Editor of the Quarterly may select members to assist in the duties of locating and selecting worthwhile articles appealing to genealogists and historians alike; shall assist in the distribution and mailing of the publication as recommended by the Executive Board. (Family memberships are entitled to only one Quarterly.)

The Quarterly shall be published four (4) times a year - Spring, Summer, Fall, Winter. It is now called *Logan Roots and Branches*.

The exchanging of publications with other Societies shall be on a limited basis and coordinated by the Editor, the President and the Executive Board.

#### Section 3. Nominating Committee

A Nominating Committee of three (3) members shall be named at the September meeting, consisting of two officers and one member at large, elected by the membership. They shall receive a list of members in good standing from the Membership Committee and select a corps of officers who may be elected and installed at the annual meeting. (Nominations from the floor will also be permitted.)

#### Section 4. Genealogist

The Genealogist shall do limited research as requested by the correspondents, answer specific requests and shall surrender all records to their successor. Any monies received for researching shall be turned in to the Treasurer.

#### Section 5. Public Relations Person

The President appoints a Public Relations Person or Committee to write and distribute news releases to area media sources, advertises and publicizes events and publications of the Society as directed.

**Section 6. Librarian**

The Library Committee shall select, acquire and maintain genealogical and historical material for the Library. Their duties include the cataloguing of all the Society's holdings, maintaining regular hours where possible and requesting volunteers to assist in all matters pertaining to the Library.

**Section 7. Historian**

The Historian shall be appointed as deemed advisable by the President and perform such duties as directed by the Executive Board.

**Article X. Meetings**

**Section 1.** Regular meetings of this Society shall be held monthly except in December. The date, time and place is to be decided by the Executive Board.

**Article XI. Amendments and Revisions**

**Section 1.** A five (5) member committee shall be appointed every third year from the last revision of the Constitution and Bylaws. This committee shall report any suggested changes to the Board for their consideration. If changes are to be made, a copy of same shall be published in the next soonest Quarterly sent to the membership and shall be voted on at the next regularly scheduled meeting. The vote shall be a simple majority of members present.

**Section 2.** Any member in good standing may present in writing an amendment to the Corresponding Secretary. If approved by the Executive Board, the proposed amendment shall be mailed via the Quarterly and voted upon at the next regularly scheduled meeting.

**Article XII. Dissolution**

**Section 1.** Upon the dissolution of the Society, the officers who serve as the Executive Board, shall after paying or making provisions for the payment of all liabilities of the Society, offer the assets of the Society to the Illinois State Genealogical Society, or if the Illinois State Genealogical Society does not exist, the assets shall be offered to the Illinois State Historical Library, or to an organization or organizations charitable or scientific purposes which qualified as an exempt organization under Section 501 (C) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future Internal Revenue Law).

**Section 2.** Any of such assets not disposed of shall be disposed of by the Logan County Court of Common Pleas, where the Society is located, exclusively for such organization or organizations, as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes under Section 501 (C) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future Internal Revenue Law).

**Article XIII. Parliamentary Authority**

**Section 1.** The Society shall be conducted in accordance with the parliamentary procedure set forth in Robert's Rules of Order.

With the exception of some minor housekeeping changes, the only relevant change was the deletion of a definite meeting date and time as originally stated in Article X. Meetings.

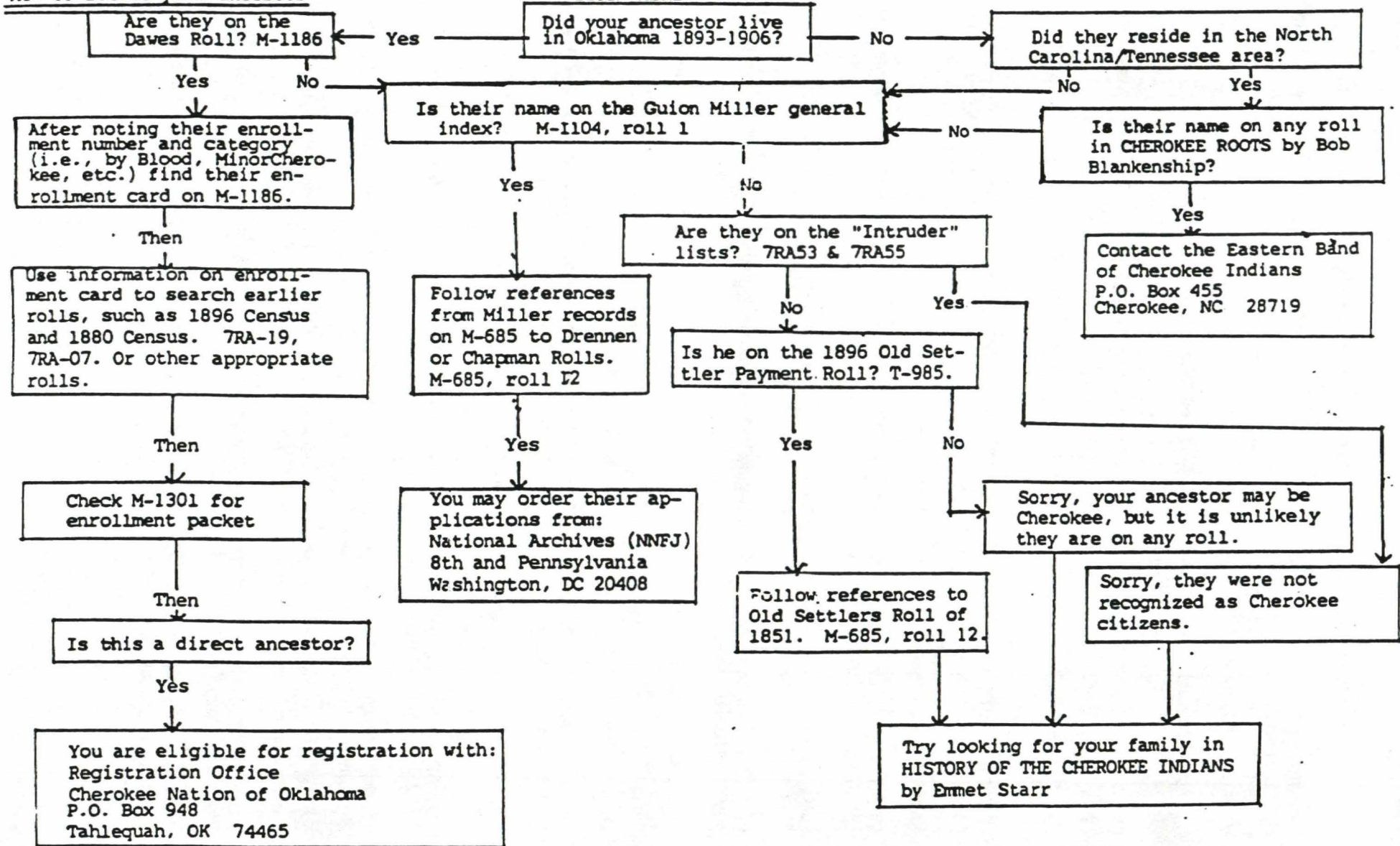

## The Poppies of War

"In Flanders fields the poppies blow, between the crosses, row on row." Americans recognize those lines from the poem "In Flanders Field."

The poppy comes to us from the fields of France where our American troops first gave their lives in battle during World War I against the Germans. The major battles in that war in which hundreds of Americans lost their lives included Belleau Woods, Chateau Theirry, St. Mihiel, the Meuse - Argonne Forest and other encounters in between.

Poppies were the only touch of reality and beauty that survived amid the destruction and desolation of the battle front of France. Their growth in the wild became the only floral tribute on the graves of the dead. For the fighting men the poppies became a symbol of heroism and sacrifice.

During World War II poppies were also worn to honor the brave men and women at Pearl Harbor, Wake Island, Normandy, the Philippines, the Battle of the Bulge and all the other theaters of war.

Paper poppies were first made by the disabled veterans who were in hospitals. They were sold by the veterans groups who used the contributions for the welfare work of the auxiliaries among the disabled, their families, and the families of the dead of both wars.

Servicemen involved in wars since World War II have been aided through the poppy contributions. Times have changed. Attendance at Memorial Day and Veterans Day services have dropped to a scant number of persons from what at one time had been a major crowd. However, poppy sales continue. Someone wrote a poem of a few lines entitled "Keep Faith! Buy a Poppy."

There's a flower that reminds me of the help that they need,

What matters their trade or their race or their creed?

There's a flower that reminds me this time every year

Your purebred of poppies will help bring them cheer.

Buy a poppy!

Let us each buy a poppy for the first A. E. F. (American Expeditionary Forces)

Their need is insistent, their cause it is blest.

Then let us buy a poppy for the boys out on the line,

Their need is insistent, their cause is divine.

The poppy message from Flanders field is the same today if we remember their story of there they grow, "between the crosses row on row."

**Robert Todd Lincoln**

Because Robert was a son of the President, he was protected from battle. As a college student, he was at a New Jersey railroad station awaiting to board a train. Because of a mass of other passengers, he was forced to lean from the platform against the side of the train. Suddenly he felt the train move.

The motion spun Lincoln off his feet and caused him to slide downward into the open space between the car and the platform. He was helplessly suspended. He felt a hand grab his coat and lift him to safety.

He turned to thank the bystander who had rescued him, and he recognized the famous actor, Edwin Booth, brother of the man who later took the life of his father.

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***The Frugal Housewife***

A few household tips gleaned from *The Frugal Housewife*, published in 1836:

Look frequently to the pails, to see that nothing is thrown to the pigs which should have been in the grease pot.

Eggs will keep almost any length of time in lime-salt-water, properly prepared. Use one pint of coarse salt and a pint of unslacked lime to a pailful of water. Kept covered in this solution, eggs will keep as long as three years and still be perfectly sweet and fresh.

Honey mixed with pulverized charcoal is excellent to cleanse the teeth and make them white.
