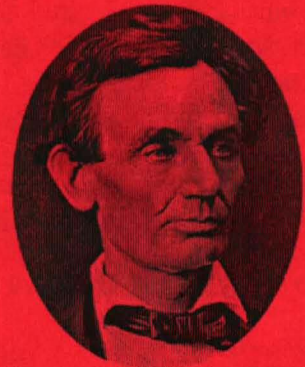
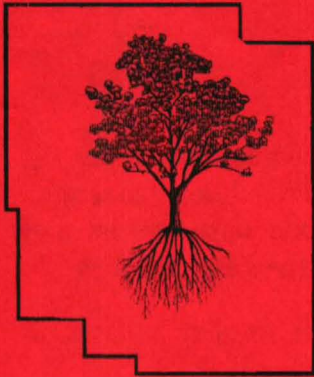

### **World War II - Emden Youth Reported Missing In Action**

March 6, 1944 - He was a waist gunner, the most dangerous job on a Flying Fortress. Aboard their B-17 bomber, called "Hell's Cargo," they were on their sixth bombing mission over Berlin; the temperature was 70 degrees below zero at their altitude. Suddenly, the odds caught up with them; they were hit by anti-aircraft fire. As soon as they were hit, enemy fighter planes closed in, and soon the plane was on fire. "Leaping out of a burning airplane isn't an easy thing to do," the waist gunner shared many years later.

He leapt out of a door into deathly silence. He began to freefall, reaching speeds of 180 feet per second. He had bailed out at 17,000 feet and waited to get clear of the attacking fighters before deploying his chute. When he did, the chute jerked with all the force of a freight train. Pain shot through his body.

Orders were to "Undo your chute and go for escape when you land," but he landed right in the arms of Axis troops. The first thing the enemy did was grab his earphones, his money, his food and his escape kit. He was taken to an Air Force POW camp called Stalag Luft 4. It was considered the worst POW camp in Germany.

They lived behind electric fences, lying on the floors of barracks with walls so thin the wind cut through. The weather at times was 30-40 degrees below zero. Both his hands and feet were frozen.

Food was scarce because the captors often kept the Red Cross food parcels.

It was 35 degrees below zero the day 6,000 prisoners were put on an 86 day death march. They were being used as a human shield against the Allies. 1,500 of the prisoners did not survive.

On the morning of May 2, 1945, British soldiers freed the POW's. Waist gunner Merle Rohlf's sent a telegram to his family in Emden, IL to tell them he had been freed, and he hoped to be home in time to celebrate Independence Day with them.

Mr. Rohlf's was 83 years old when he shared his story with a Lincoln Courier reporter in November 2006. This is an abbreviated account of one man's heroic battle to survive; taken from The Courier.

### **MARTHA MARIE FLEMING**

SOI: Martha Fleming's Obituary

Martha was born July 29, 1947 the daughter of Edwin Fleming and Elvira (Hoepfner) Fleming formerly of Chicago, IL then moved to Lincoln, IL.

Martha was a graduate of Luther High North of Chicago. She graduated from Sam Houston State College in Huntsville, TX, where she received her Bachelor of Science degree. After teaching on the Zuni Indian Reservation in Zuni, NM, she enlisted in the U.S. Navy on July 4, 1974.

Her navy career included training at Virginia Beach, VA naval base. She transferred overseas to the U.S. Naval facility in Brawdy, Wales U.K. She was reassigned becoming a member of the OPTEVFOR staff. The **Operational Test and Evaluation Force (OPTEVFOR)** serves as independent and objective agency within the United States Navy for the operational testing and evaluation (OT&E) of naval aviation, surface warfare, submarine warfare, C4I, crypto logic, and space systems in support Navy and U.S. Department of Defense acquisition programs. She was the first female officer to be appointed as director of Underwater Warfare. As director for one of the navy's newest and longest anti-submarine warfare system, Lt. Fleming had been responsible for operational testing and system analysis of test data. Returning to the states, she entered the naval post graduate school in Monterey, CA, where she received her master of science in human resources management. She was reassigned to the naval support activity base in Millington, TN and appointed director of human resources. Lt. Fleming resigned from active duty in 1984, making her home in Tennessee while teaching statistics at the University of Memphis. She went into real estate and became the owner and principal broker of Oak Reality Co. Inc. Due to breast cancer she closed oak Reality in 1998 and joined the staff at Century 21 properties. She continued working until her death June 16, 1999.

## **How to Use Your War Ration Book**

### *Ration Book Instructions*

IMPORTANT. -- Before the stamps of the War Ration Book may be used, the person for whom it was issued must sign it as indicated in the book. The name of a person under 18 years of age may be signed either by such person or by his father, mother, or guardian.

For future reference, make and keep a record of the serial number of your book and the number of your issuing Ration Board, as indicated in your book.

Your first War Ration Book has been issued to you, originally containing 28 War Ration Stamps. Other books may be issued at later dates. The

following instructions apply to your first book and will apply to any later books, unless otherwise ordered by the Office of Price Administration. In order to obtain a later book, the first book must be turned in. You should preserve War Ration Books with the greatest possible care.

1. From time to time the Office of Price Administration may issue Orders rationing certain products. After the dates indicated by such orders, these products can be purchased only through the use of War Ration Books containing valid War Ration Stamps.
2. The Orders of the Office of Price Administration will designate the stamps to be used for the purchase of a particular rationed product, the period during which each of these stamps may be used, and the amounts which may be bought with each stamp.
3. Stamps become valid for use only when and as directed by the Orders of the Office of Price Administration.
4. Unless otherwise announced, the Ration Week is from Saturday midnight to the following Saturday midnight.
5. War Ration Stamps may be used in any retail store in the United States.
6. War Ration Stamps may be used only by or for the person named and described in the War Ration Book.
7. Every person must see that his War Ration Book is kept in a safe place and properly used. Parents are responsible for the safekeeping and use of their children's War Ration Books.
8. When you buy any rationed product, the proper stamp must be detached in the presence of the storekeeper, his employee, or the person making delivery on his behalf. If a stamp is torn out of the War Ration Book in any other way than above indicated, it becomes void. If a stamp is partly torn or mutilated and more than one-half of it remains in the book, it is valid. Otherwise it becomes void.
9. If your War Ration Book is lost, destroyed, stolen or mutilated, you should report that fact to the local Ration Board.

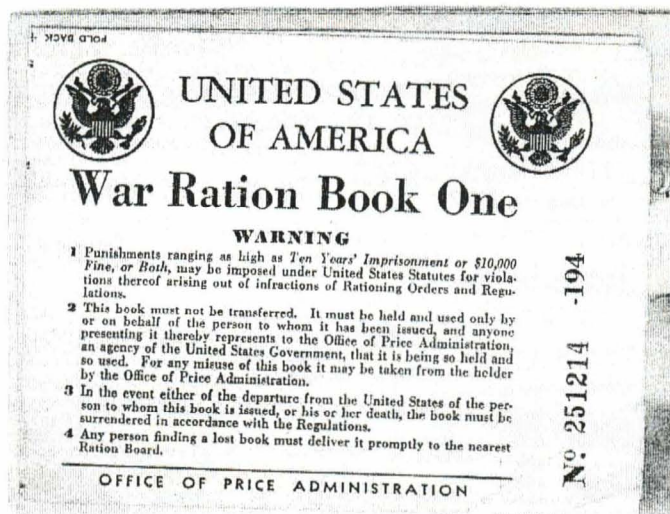
10. If you enter a hospital, or other institution, and expect to be there for more than 10 days, you must turn your War Ration Book over to the person in charge. It will be returned to you upon your request when you leave.
11. When a person dies, his War Ration Book must be returned to the local Ration Board, in accordance with the Regulations.
12. If you have any complaints, questions, or difficulties regarding your War Ration Book, consult your local Ration Board.

## NOTE

The first stamps in War Ration Book One will be used for the purchase of sugar. When this book was issued, the registrar asked you or the person who applied for your book, how much sugar you owned on that date. If you had any sugar, you were allowed to keep it, but stamps representing this quantity were torn from your book (except for a small amount which you were allowed to keep without losing any stamps). If your War Ration Book One was issued to you on application by a member of your family, the number of stamps torn from the books of the family was based on the amount of sugar owned by the family, and was divided as equally as possible among all these books.

## THE TURNING POINT

On a gray day in 1944, allied forces stormed the coast of France and the hopes of the free world hung in the balance. By Elizabeth Bettendorf.

D-Day June 6, 1944, Bill DeFrates was seasick. The 18-year-old Jacksonville native had just plunged from the ramp of a crowded landing craft near the shores of Omaha Beach. It was a massive allied invasion on the French Normandy coast. Bill was only 5'3" tall and 130 pounds. He was trained to communicate as a navy signalman third class but not prepared for battle.

Bill was dressed in layers of fatigues and gas proof clothing, a pair of yellow and red semaphore flags tucked into his belt. He lugged a heavy field pack, cartridge belt, carbine and gas mask. As he bobbed in the churning waves, he groped for his lifebelt, squeezed hard, but the device only partially inflated. DeFrates dog paddled through the chilled waters, half submerged and half afloat until an astute pharmacist's mate dragged him ashore.

The crucial role of D-Day was to show the Germans the overwhelming might of the Americans and their Allies that we would ultimately prevail and continue our march east.

So when 370,000 mostly American, British, and Canadian soldiers in more than 5,000 ships and boats, and 12,000 aircraft descended upon the Normandy beaches in the early gray hours of June 6, 1944, American sentiment was as buoyant as the silvery barrage balloons that loomed over the

warships.

### THE FLANDERS FIELDS

In Flanders fields the poppies blow  
Between the crosses, row on row,  
That mark our place; and in the sky  
The larks, still bravely singing, fly  
Scarcely heard amid the guns below.  
We are the dead. Short day ago  
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,  
Loved, and were loved, and now we lie  
In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:  
To you from failing hands we throw  
The torch, be yours to hold it high.  
If ye break faith with us who die  
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow  
In Flanders fields.

### THE POPPY

**Flower of Remembrance** was first immortalized in a poem entitled "We Shall Not Sleep" by Col. John McCrae, a WWI Canadian surgeon who served with the First Brigade Artillery in Flanders. When McCrae's poem first appeared in the Nov. 1918 Ladies Home Journal, New York YMCA volunteer, Moina Michael, was inspired and led a crusade which would eventually make the little flower a national reminder of the sacrifice made by veterans in all wars.

The blood red, flower with four petals and native to the battlefields of Flanders was officially proclaimed the "flower of remembrance" at the 1920 National American Legion Convention and at the Auxiliary Convention of 1921.

Today, Auxiliary members distribute millions of the little paper poppies made by hospitalized veterans in the weeks preceding Memorial and Veterans Day. Donations are used exclusively to assist veterans and their children.

### MAJOR ESTABROOK LEADS MEN BACK TO THE FRONT

On February 18, 1864, Atlanta area men who had re-enlisted in the Seventh Illinois Infantry, set off for Florence, Alabama, where under the command of Maj. George Estabrook, they were to patrol the Tennessee River and watch for Confederate Gen. Nathan Bedford Forrest.

On May 7 they were attacked by Gen. Roddey's Cavalry Brigade and in six hours of furious fighting, greatly outnumbered. They were forced to retreat, having lost three killed and 32 wounded or captured. On May 13, in company with the 9<sup>th</sup> Ohio Calvary, the 7<sup>th</sup> Illinois Infantry drove the Confederates back across where their next encounter would be at Allatoona Pass in October.

While some Atlanta men were engaged in the West, others were fighting and dying in the East. German – American soldiers under the bumbling and inept Gen. Franz Sigel were suffering ignominious defeat in the Shenandoah Valley. Others were falling in the Wilderness campaign which Grant opened in May. On June 3, following three days of inconclusive fighting for control of the crossroads at Cold Harbor, Grant launched a massive head –on assault on dug-in confederate troops. Bitter fighting continued on that front until June 12. At the end of his first month of command in the East, Grant had lost 50,000 men and Lee 30,000. He was learning again the lessons of Corinth and Vicksburg; victory would come only at great cost in lives.

Despite hardships and wounds, officers and men on both sides were expected to “soldier on” and so they did. Maj. George Estabrook lost a finger on his right hand and suffered a severe right shoulder wound that would afflict him for the rest of his life. Among those severely wounded at Chickamauga was John Walton Spindler, but he served out his enlistment. Later he would play a significant role in Atlanta postwar history as its High School

principal and town librarian. John Bell Hood, a Confederate General lost a leg and had a crippled arm, yet he was in command of the forces the 7<sup>th</sup> infantry would face at Allatoona.

### A FATHER SEEKS HIS WOUNDED SON.

Among the casualties was Caleb Chapin, the oldest son of Samuel Chapin. Caleb was a brilliant lad who, with Johnnie Beverly, daily had ridden ponies into Atlanta to attend the Seminary. On October 18, 1861, as a 17-year-old, Caleb took the teacher's examination administered by the Logan County Superintendent. He received a Grade 2 classification, the second highest given. Caleb, now 20 year old private in Co. G of the 39<sup>th</sup> Illinois Infantry, was severely wounded in the fighting at Cold Harbor.

Upon hearing that his son was wounded, Samuel Chapin went immediately to Washington D.C. for two to three days Samuel was denied permission to go to the fighting lines. Finally he declared, “My son is dying and I shall care for him if I can.” Samuel resolutely made his way to the front in time to spend several days nursing his son and others, working from early morn until late at night. Caleb died June 12; the grieving father brought his son's body back for burial in the Atlanta Cemetery. Flowers were place on Memorial Day by the Atlanta school children.

### WORLD WAR II VETERAN'S ROSTER

Roster was compiled from the Scrapbook of Sarah Landers Reynolds Brown, Donated by Sarah Brown and her sister Alice Landers Thornton for the use of the Logan County Historical Society's research. Transcription is from newspaper clippings in this scrapbook by Jack Danley, a friend of the family. Sarah and Alice's mother Irene Landers used to watch over me. She called herself “My Other Mom”. In our neighborhood she was “Mom Landers” to everyone. I hope this will be of value to the people who are compiling the Veteran's book.

Note to researchers: This collection is loose scrapbook pages and loose single clippings. I will attempt to extract as many names as can be determined now in Feb 2004. This collection appears to have been started by a young lady who saw many of her classmates and friends going off to war. Thank you Sarah, we appreciate your efforts to save these memories.

These clippings are not arranged by dates. Perhaps we can identify them later.

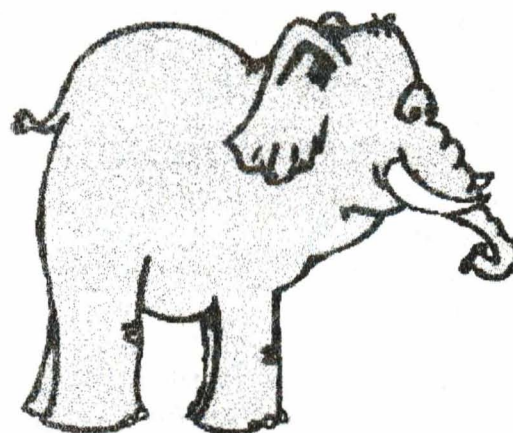
### DETERMINING RELATIONSHIPS

11. Your third cousin is your great grandparents' brothers' or sisters' great grandchild.
12. Your third cousin's child is your third cousin once removed.
13. Your third cousin's child once removed is your third cousin twice removed.
14. The grandchild of your brother or sister is your grand nephew or grand niece.
15. The sister or brother of your grandparents is your great aunt or great uncle.

16. The sister or brother of your great grandparents is your great grand aunt or great grand uncle.

### ELEPHANT STEW

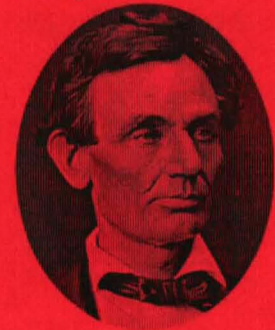

## **BOYHOOD DAYS** **IN LOGAN COUNTY**

*by C.B. Watson*

*Lincoln Courier Oct. 17, 1902*

I left Lincoln in 1869, came to California in 1870 and to Oregon in 1871, where I have lived the rest of my life. I have made one trip back to Logan County. The Lincoln Courier brought back old memories to which I can't help but recall. I saw some familiar names such as Randolph, Harts, and Ross. I noticed mention of Lincoln College.

I was present when the corner stone of this institution was laid and heard Governor Oglesby deliver the address on that occasion.

I was present when the soldiers' monument was placed in the Courthouse square and heard Governor Oglesby deliver the address on that occasion also. I was at Lincoln, IL when the remains of President Lincoln were taken through.

I was also there when President Johnson went through on his majestic circle.

I was present on the departure of the One Hundred and Sixth regiment in 1863 for war and was an interested spectator when my father was in that regiment.

I was also there when the One Hundred and Sixth returned, having gone to Springfield to meet them.

I had the usual experience of the "young American" while a boy in old Logan County. There I husked corn, froze my toes and ears, hobbled about with stone bruises on my heel, fought bumble bees, caught rabbits, and may have stolen watermelons.

Of this last half-toned confession, however, I am not sure, but feel safe at any rate for even it be true, I can count the statue

of limitations my friend. I recollect gathering hickory nuts, walnuts, paw-paws, and wild plums on the Salt and Kickapoo creeks. I lived in what was then known as the "Johnston neighborhood" about eight miles east of Lincoln and have ridden by a cake of ice down the old slough during the raging times of the war, and played that I was captain of a gunboat on the Mississippi.

This may all seem foolishness, but it is my memories and stories I have retained that are like treasures to me.

### **Beason's Birth – Labor Pains and All**

According to Latham's History of Logan County, 1878, the village of Beason was laid out in July 1872. Stringer's History of Logan County, 1911, gives a more specific date of 29 July 1872 for the beginning date of Beason. The group of gentlemen who initiated the establishment of the community included: Silas Beason; Jonathan R. Hall; George Gelsthorp; Elias Hammerton; Lewis C. Turk and Joseph Wilson. These histories, and the 1886 History of Logan County, tell of how the small village was begun and how it grew.

However, the several histories of Logan County in existence today do not address the rough start of the new community. The following series of articles from the Lincoln Herald, Lincoln, Illinois, relate to the reader the events that nearly resulted in the relocation of Beason to another site.

*Editor Herald:* - ...During the month of July last, it will be remembered, a town on the I(ndianapolis), B(loomington) &

W(estern), Railroad, was located some nine miles east of Lincoln, and named in honor of an attorney at law in that city, Hon. S. Beason. For some reason or other, the people generally were not satisfied with said location, and, consequently, the town had not increased much during its short existence. Mr. B. Pendleton has been merchandising some; Mr. J Evans has erected a dwelling house and a blacksmith shop; Mr. Wm. Verry has been buying some corn. These gentlemen have all been compelled to close out business in their present locality, or, rather, will be compelled to do so, from the fact that Beason has been relocated. It is finally and doubtless permanently, located one mile east of its present site. From the fact that dissatisfaction existed, the bonds of the township were not issued until the above change was made.

Several of our leading citizens, Messrs W. Robinson, G. Middlecoff, W. M. Curry, R. Mills, J. Berryhill, A. G. Shields, J. Bell, B. Pendleton and J. A. Hawes, were honored with the privilege of an excursion trip over the I. B. & W. R. R. as far as Champaign

*Editor Herald:* - ...The location of the town, Beason, seems to yet remain a question of doubt. A petition has been circulated and sent to the officers of the railroad company, soliciting them to allow it to remain in the original site, while those who effected the change, have also sent in their reasons for desiring a new location. The consequence is, that the officers of the road seem to be wavering, questioning which party to humor. We are informed, however, that there is a written contract in possession of the town officers, in which the company agrees to build the switch and depot in the locality named by the parties who objected to first location. If this be true, it would appear, that should the company fail to comply with the contract, the bonds of the township, issued with that understanding, might be held unprofitably by the company. *Editor Herald:* ...An Excitement still prevails in regard to the station, Beason. On Thursday last Deputy sheriff Hukill read an “injunction” at the first location. As there are two parties in the township, one removal, the other anti-removal, it is hard to tell at present what will be the result of the transaction. Some think the injunction will be sustained by the court, while others believe it will not. But, whatever may be the final result of the question, be the station moved or not, there can be but one way to justify the people of Oran; there can be but one way to settle the just claims of the taxpayers of the township, and that is to

move the station from its original location one mile east. It is not the desire of your correspondent to discuss this question through your columns, but that your readers may understand the exact state of affairs, he will present them exactly as he understands them. The I. B. & W. railroad runs through Oran one-half mile from its southern line, for which the people pay \$25,000, and for which also it is designed they should be equally accommodated. In the south-western part of the township there is already located a depot building and a switch one thousand yards long. This is near the residence of Mr. Robert Skelton, and for that reason is called “Skelton.” This station, of course, will accommodate the residents of that portion of the township. Beason is located – in its first site – three and one-half miles east of the west line of the township, or near the center. The people in the eastern part of the town only claim that they are as much entitled to a depot as they of the western part, and that if the station near the middle is not moved one mile east, the middle and west will be accommodated while the east is “left out in the cold.” The railroad company has till the 8<sup>th</sup> of March to erect the station, or forfeit the bonds...

*Editor Herald:* ...As the first Tuesday in April approaches, our voters become interested in the coming election. There seems to be two parties (not literally political) in the township. – One consists of individuals who do not indorse the issuing of the \$25,000 in bonds to the I. B. & W. R. Company. This party is also opposed to the removal of the town of Beason. Its main issue, however, is “anybody to beat Shields.” The other party, believing that the township was justly liable for the bonds, and that the Supervisor did no more than would eventually have had to have been done; that

justice demands that the station should be moved, and that the present incumbent, Mr. Shields, deserves the support of Oran for his transactions, on the other hand, struggles for “anything” to elect Shields. It seems that the partisan feeling only extends so far as the election of Supervisor is concerned. ...Whatever may be the result of the election, we hope that every individual will vote in such a way that he may not hereafter repent his action, remembering that this election may settle permanently the location of Beason, and that, as the people pay for the town, it should be located at the will of the largest number whom it is directly to interest...Purdex

*Editor Herald:* ... The anti-removal of Beason party elected its entire ticket. – On Monday evening an enthusiastic meeting was held at the Berryhill school house, at which Wm. The meeting resulted in no particular good, there being much confusion and many endeavors to show forth personal frailties. Mr. George Middlecoff presented the whole proceedings that have taken place since the question of removal sprang up.

*Editor Herald:* ... The little breeze created here by the effort to remove Beason station to Independence Church seems to have about cooled down and things there seem to be about in *status quo*. – The I. B. & W. have about finished their depot building. A son of Jonathan Hall of DeWitt Co., is agent, and intends buying grain also, I believe.

Returning to the histories of Logan County we find that Independence church was eventually moved one mile, into the town of Beason in 1877 .

## **THE HORSE**

*Lincoln Courier May 2, 1889*

In the absence of politics and corn talk, the chief theme is "horse". You can always tell an old horse talker for he always calls it "Hoss." The younger amateurs pronounce it horse with a very short "o", but it is horse talk all the same.

A good old man once lived in our town that was perfectly reliable. He told us the following horse story. He lived ten miles from Lincoln. One day a member of the family took seriously ill; he took a team from the field, hitched them to a spring wagon and drove to Lincoln in just 47 minutes. He notified the doctor and then he noticed a tremendous rain coming from the

southwest. He whirled about for home; all the time his horses were pulling hard on the bits. Just at the edge of town the rain began falling in torrents in the rear end of his buggy; he gave the team the reins and arrived at home dry as a powder horn, the rain following continually just back of his seat.

What is that you said? You don't believe it! You are doubtless a young man, and let us remark that incredulity is a crime that has made countless millions mourn. We told you that this fine old man was reliable and you must take it all in.

### **Mt. Pulaski's Early Settlers**

(O. C. Stafford in Mt. Pulaski Times)

*Thursday, April 16, 1885*

Among the earliest settlers of Mt. Pulaski were Jabez Capps, Squire Turley, Dr. Robinson, Dr. Newman, Dr. Clark, Dr. Dickinson, and Dr. Dement. Jabez Capps and Dr. Robinson are still living, but the others have crossed the dark river. They both raised families here. Robinson now lives in Kansas and his boys have turned out well. His second boy Jim was a wild one and I heard him tell his father one day, after he had given him a whipping, "that he thought

he had played hades because he had licked the boy." Old Mr. Mason, John and Chris, Mason's father lived here. John Mason of this place was born in 1837 and was the first child born on the hill. Mr. Mason later removed to the farm now owned by George Rowe, on Salt creek where he died. He had three boys and two girls. Chris and John served in the late war, and Chris in the Mexican War. I remember how fine Chris looked when he paraded the streets on a

dapple grey mare, marching to the music of the fife and drum, beating for volunteers.

I remember hauling John E. Downing and Squire Randolph from Pekin on their return from Mexico in 1847 and the poor fellows looked like skeletons.

Pekin was Mt. Pulaski's trading point. We used to haul up corn, wheat, oats and bacon, and bring back groceries and dry goods. I never will forget my first trip to Pekin. Tom Mason went with me. We were unacquainted with the road and the people. There was not a bridge between here and Pekin, except across Kickapoo. We mired down in Salt spring branch, and had to get two yoke of oxen to pull us out, and mired down on the Delevan prairie and had to get help. We stayed the first night at Randolph's on Sugar creek, and the second at a Norwegian widow lady's, and right there I could have written "The Chambermaid's own or the bedbugs' Revenge," for I thought the bedbugs would carry us off before morning. It was in a log cabin, and the old lady was sleeping in the same room. She heard us fighting the bugs and said we had better get in her bed and she would get up. Tom got up and put on his clothes, harnessed his horses, and drove down to a little hollow about two hundred yards from the house, and I went to the stable loft. The next morning I found Tom asleep in his wagon, and when I woke him up he said, "Where did you stay? I thought you were eat up." We went back to the house and got our breakfast, and then drove on to Pekin. We bought some herrings and some cheese for dinner, and eat very hearty, and I think that afternoon and night we were two of the sickest mortals you ever saw. I never could eat a herring since.

I afterwards learned the road better, and the people, and as business looked up there

was a greater demand for teamsters and they were more numerous. Among them were Robert Paranteau, Robert Franks, George Snyder, old Mr. Dyer, Robert Dement, Isaac Tomlinson and William Snyder. We used to pay 50 cents a night for lodging, supper and breakfast, for ourselves and horses. I never will forget old Mr. Dyer's first trip to Pekin.

We had a regular stopping place at Uncle Billy Byers' on Sugar creek. He was a Christian preacher, and always had family prayers. Mr. Dyer was a great man to swear, but he said he would go into the room and hear Uncle Billy pray, as there was nothing like being religious on the road. He said it lightened the bill of fare, and so he went into the room and when Uncle Billy read his chapter and knelt down to pray. Dyer was sitting beside the fireplace. There was a saucer filled with hot grease and a rag in it for light. Toward the end of the prayer the grease took fire and as it blazed up Dyer sprang forward to put it out. Unfortunately he overturned the saucer and the hot grease ran all over his hand. "Confound the lamp," shouted Dyer, and "amen," said Uncle Billy. Mr. Dyer rushed out into the room where we were sitting and said he wouldn't have sworn in there for fifty dollars. Mr. and Mrs. Byers were excellent people and doctored the old man's hand the rest of the night but he was obliged to carry it in a sling for several days.

Toby Benson, now Dr. Benson, of Latham, was along that trip, I think. I remember one time when we crossed the first bridge at Deer Creek, after a rain, and Toby drove on the bridge too far to one side when a plank tipped up and let his horses through into the creek. Toby caught hold of one of the bents as he went down, and holding on by his hands, called to the boys to help him out first, as he might fall down on the horses and get drowned. While on an

excursion to Peoria, six or seven years ago, I met Toby on the steamer Grey Eagle, on the Peoria lake. He pointed out to me a place on the Illinois river where he once drove in to water three yoke of oxen with which he was hauling logs. After drinking, the oxen started and before he could stop them they swam directly across the river. Toby was sitting straddle of the near ox at the tongue of the wagon, and said he had hard work to keep his seat. He had to drive five miles down the river to a ferry to get back on the other side. Toby used to live in Peoria before he came here, and Mt. Pulaski was not a very large place when Dr. Benson came here.

It is the laboring class that gives life to a town. I remember when in good weather you never saw anyone idle except on Saturday afternoon. There were manufacturing interests here in early days. Jabez Capps carded wool into rolls, Squire Turley making brick, and Godfrey Frederick made brick down on Theodore Lawrence's farm and hauled them here. Uncle George Meister has for years been furnishing brick for the town. You can see the fruits of his labor in the large brick buildings about the village.

I remember seeing, years ago, a little boy and girl driving a small mule team with which they were hauling wood from Lake Fork for Uncle George Meister's brickyard. It was his son John and daughter, Mrs. Krieg. Chris and his brother Andy were the blacksmiths of this place; Leonard Albert, the wagon maker; and old man Snyder and his sons James, Ben and Charles, the cabinet makers. Col. Whittaker was the tailor, and old Grandma Whittaker was the milliner. There was no dress-maker, as the women all made their own dresses. Uncle Frank Schick was the shoe maker for the town, and country, too. H. B. Rowe and his brother,

Miles, until Miles lost his life while raising a building, were carpenters, as were also Chris Mason and his father. Alexander Morgan was the tobacconist, and manufactured tobacco and cigars in the room now used as a dining room at Hamilton Turley's Hotel. Ashburry Harry used to tan leather on the Lincoln road where Jake Seyfer now lives. Mr. Girtman used to dress deer skins at Lake Fork. He was Hugh Girtman's and Mrs. L. K. Scroggins father.

Old Uncle Wat Turley, brother of "Ham" Turley, Mrs. Rowe, and Mrs. Fisher, used to make reeds for weaving. I remember going to his house at Lake Fork with my mother, to get a reed, forty-five years ago, when the road was lined with prairie grass all the way. The reeds were made of cane he brought from Kentucky. They were only used in this day to weave carpets.

This town was eight or nine years old then. We came on up here and stayed two or three days, and that is the first time I remember seeing Chris Danner. He had been somewhere and got some geese, and the wolves caught them. He said he thought they were dogs and shot at them but never killed any of them. In the summer they used to be about the big spring. The big spring as it was called, was the only water, except wells, south of this place until you got to the Sangamon river, and it was discovered by the oldest settlers. My first recollection of it there was a gum in it, and it was fenced in with rails, the water running off down through the prairie. There were but few wells here. The people hauled their water from the spring in barrels as they used it. Some went there to wash. It has long been considered the best water in the country, and of late years it has been discovered that it has medicinal virtues.

## 1<sup>st</sup> PEOPLE OF POSTVILLE, ILLINOIS

## **John Frederick BOY**

Contributed by Bill Donath  
(Great-Great-Grandson of J. F. Boy)  
From a presentation during the 2009  
Old Union Cemetery walk

Guten tag. Thank you for stopping. I need a rest from delivering ice to my friends here in Postville and Lincoln. This was my business for forty-three years.

My name is John Frederick Boy. I was born in Hesse Darmstat (Germany), in 1816.

Here we are, at my final resting place, that of my wife and four of our children. You will find no monument marking our graves. It was our request that none be set.

When I was a teenager, my father secreted me out of Europe to avoid the military conscription laws. You see, he had sent four older sons to do their duty and they all died while serving in the army.

My father took me to a friend of his, a ship's captain. The captain agreed to take me on board his ship and keep me there until I became of age, put me ashore in the United States and hold money to give to me when I left the ship.

I was on board that ship more than two years. We had sailed around the world. Eventually, about 1837, we made port on the east coast of the United States. When I left the ship I adopted the name of BOY to prevent being sent back to Prussia.

I made my way across the United States to St. Louis, where there was a large German speaking population. I worked there for several years as a painter. In 1847, I married Maria Catherina VOGEL. She was born in Prussia in 1826.

We began our family there. Henry was born in 1848, Emilie was born in 1851 and

Charles was born in 1853. I became an American citizen in 1852. We had been looking for business ventures outside of St. Louis. We learned that Seth Tinsley had a store for sale in Postville. We purchased the store, which was located at the corner of 5<sup>th</sup> and Main and other properties.

We moved our family to Postville in 1853. Later that summer we attended the christening of the Town of Lincoln. There we met and became acquainted with Abraham Lincoln. A few years later he was a guest in our home at 1103 5<sup>th</sup> street.

After moving to Postville, we added three more children to the family. George was born in 1855, Julia in 1859 and Amalia in 1861. We also raised Mary's youngest sister, Julia VOGEL, after their parents died in the cholera outbreaks in St. Louis. Their mother died in 1847 and their father died in 1854.

All during our life in Postville and Lincoln, we participated in the social, religious and political life of the community. Mary and I served as school examiners and donated ice for the end of year picnics that were common at that time. The church we attended is now known as St. John United Church of Christ. We participated in the political rallies, fund raising rallies that were popular at that time and served on planning committees.

I became involved in the politics of Postville and Lincoln, as a republican, holding several positions in Postville. By 1861 I had become well enough known in the county to be elected Coroner of Logan County. By the early 1860's I was Treasurer of Postville. Our town council approached

the town council of Lincoln to merge the two towns. We were successful at that early in 1865 when The Town of Lincoln and the Town of Postville merged to become the City of Lincoln.

At the time of the merger I turned over my entire treasury of \$32.55. I was elected a Fourth Ward alderman in 1865 and 1867 then again in 1881.

Mary and I experienced the joys and tears of life in Postville and Lincoln. Our oldest daughter, Emilie, was married in 1873 to German born Edward Rautenberg. He was a successful real estate and insurance broker in the county. He was elected Circuit Clerk of Logan County for a few terms in the 1880's.

In 1877 we had a diphtheria outbreak in Lincoln. Both Julia and Molly became deathly ill, and Mary was sick as well. Unfortunately Molly died just five days before of her 16<sup>th</sup> birthday. She was the first buried here. The following day the Lincoln Herald announced not only Molly's death but Julia's death, too. But Julia recovered, as did Mary. The paper printed an apology the following week.

Julia married in 1879 to German born Fritz Obermueller. He was a successful grain dealer here in Lincoln, in Burtonview and eventually in Mt. Pulaski where he was involved in business and politics and served as their Post Master for several years.

In 1880 our oldest son, Henry, died of spinal disease that developed after an injury he suffered as a child. He was just 31 years old. He had been elected West Lincoln Township Clerk in the 1870's.

In 1886, our son Charles married and later moved to Clark County to take up farming.

In 1892, my helpmate Mary died suddenly of a heart attack at the age of 66. When I could no longer work I sold my business to Hagen & Coogan. I moved to Mt. Pulaski in 1893 to live with Julia and her family.

In 1895 Charles died suddenly of a stroke at the age of 42, leaving a wife, two sons and a daughter.

Early in 1896 I suffered a stroke and died peacefully in my sleep at the age of 80.

George never married and lived on to 1904 when he contracted lock-jaw and died at the age of 49.

Emilie lived to 1928 and died at the age of 78, having raised eight children, four boys and four girls.

Julia died in 1942 at the age of 83, having had ten children, and having raised nine daughters to adulthood.

That pretty much tells the story of the John Boy family.

Well, I need to get back to work. I hear the voices of Brothers Beason, Foley, Frorer, Knapp and Latham heatedly discussing politics and financing. They sure do need a cooling off.

Again, thank you for stopping.

## TERMINOLOGY used in PROBATE RECORDS

An estate will be referred to as either  
Testate or Intestate

TESTATE: The decedant left a will – either written or spoken (nuncupative Will.) A nuncupative Will must be attested to by more than one witness who heard the decedent make the Will. In a Will, the decedant could name all of his heirs but was not required to do so.

INTESTATE: No Will left by the decedant, or at least no Will could be located. In the case of a decedant leaving no Will, the court appoints an administrator. When the administrator is appointed, the Letters of Administration must name all of the decedant's heirs at law and usually gives their relationship to the decedant.

PROBATE PACKET: Somewhere in the probate packet you will find the date of the decedant's death. If the probate was filed shortly after the death the date should be correct. If the probate filing was delayed, occasionally this death date will be in error because the date is from someone's memory.

PROBATE PACKETS MAY CONTAIN: Administrator's Bond, or Letters of Administration will give the name of the Administrator and should list all of the heirs at law of the decedant. Date of death will also be listed.

WILL: The Will of the decedant will outline the wishes of the decedent

and may or may not list all of his/her heirs at law. Always look for a Recital in a Will. A Recital will spell out special wishes on the decedant and often explain to someone exactly why he/she is being cut out of the estate.

APPRAISAL OF THE ESTATE: Usually close friends and neighbors.

INVENTORY OF THE ESTATE: Inventory of real and personal property owned by the deceased.

REQUEST TO DISPOSE: Request by execution on administration to dispose of property, especially insolvent estates. This is usually an affidavit of the Executor or Administrator which outlines the circumstances in the case and the reason for requesting permission to sell. If is granted this permission the deed will show only the administrator's or executor's signature as grantor – not the heirs.

WIDOWS RELINQUISHMENT AND/OR SELECTION: This will indicate either that the widow relinquishes her share in the estate or a list of articles and land which she has chosen or have been set aside for her.

FINAL SETTLEMENT: A list of final disbursements of the estate by the Executor or Administrator. This document usually lists heirs and legatees and the amount they received from the estate along with their addresses or at least the county and state they resided in.

death date is known, the probate  
journal may be checked for  
possible entries for estates which  
were not completely filed for  
probate. They could have been  
withdrawn for some reason. The  
reason will be in the minutes of the  
journal.

VIGNETTE: Virginia Inheritance laws  
before 1786. A Will in Virginia  
prior to 1786 did not have to name  
the wife or the eldest son of a  
deceased man. Their inheritance  
of real estate was set by law. The  
widow was to receive 1/3 as her  
dower and the eldest son to receive  
the remaining 2/3 unless otherwise  
specified by his father's will. The  
eldest son also received his  
mother's 1/3 when she died. If the  
eldest son died, the eldest grandson  
of the whole blood became the  
heir-at-law, not the 2<sup>nd</sup> son. If a  
man was unmarried at the time of  
death, his heir-at-law was his  
eldest brother, not his father or his  
uncle, unless his will specified  
otherwise.

## STATUS OF PROJECTS BY VOLUNTEERS

Bill Detmers - is transcribing records for the Logan County Cemeteries. He is currently working on transcribing all burials recorded by the Logan County Cemetery Association for 1957 - 2009. Bill has Hartsburg Union Cemetery records transcribed and in the cemeteries data base. Norma Shehorn provided the Mt. Pulaski Cemetery records on a cd. We still need to contact all the other cemetery associations in the county to see if we can photograph and transcribe their records. Our goal is to have a single file of everyone buried in Logan County, with dates and burial locations.

Bill Detmers and Bill Donath - photographed the burial records for Old Union and New Union cemeteries, to be transcribed from the photos of the records. They still have to photograph the cemetery maps at the Logan County Cemetery Association.

Bill Timm - is copying the Hendricksmeier books, as the paper used when the books were originally done was not acid free, and are starting to crumble.

Bill and Todd Timm - merged all the obituary files into one set of books. Carol Radespiel and Ed Morgan worked with the Timms to get the books back into alphabetic order and to file a large backlog of obits that had not yet been filed.

Bill Donath - Lincoln Herald Index: Currently working on June 1873. Progress has slowed since a new editor in 1873 added lists of names for court cases, real estate transfers, marriage licenses, marriages and deaths. Letters from the communities in the county are much more numerous and contain much information about county residents. Communities within the county could use these letters to "fill in" information for their historical events and the people who lived there. See the article on Beason as an example of finding "new" history.

Bill Donath - Lincoln Herald Research: Articles about the annual reunions of the Old Settlers are being collected. Those articles will be in future editions of the Roots & Branches. The results of the fairs were also published in the Herald. If someone wants to gather that information, it is readily available. Not only premium winners but judging committee members were listed.

Bill Donath - An email newsletter is planned for midway between quarterlies. To be sure you get your copy, please update your email address with the Society.

Bill Donath - Indexing to the yearbook collection will help researchers find family members more quickly.

Bill Donath - Transcription of the Logan County Circuit Clerk, Death and Birth records will allow us to put those in alphabetical order which will help researchers find family members more quickly.

Bill Donath - Indexing of John Regan's Logan County newspaper collections will help researchers find family information much more quickly.

Development of a totally new website has stalled due to a grant application not being approved. Funding for the project would be \$1,000.

Installation of a dehumidifier in the crawlspace is necessary to control the growth of fungus in the now airtight space. Quotes are being sought for the project.

Completion of the Civil War Statue replacement and installation of a name board for all Logan County Civil War soldiers is progressing.

Mary Ellen Martin & Diane Detmers - have been re-arranging the displays of museum items to display as many donated antiques and pioneer pieces as possible.

Marcia Schaub - is transcribing Walnut Hill Cemetery to make copies easier to read.

Gary Freese -. If you need some help with your research, this would be a good time to send in your request. Your written request should include as much information as possible in an effort to keep Gary from duplicating what you already have. 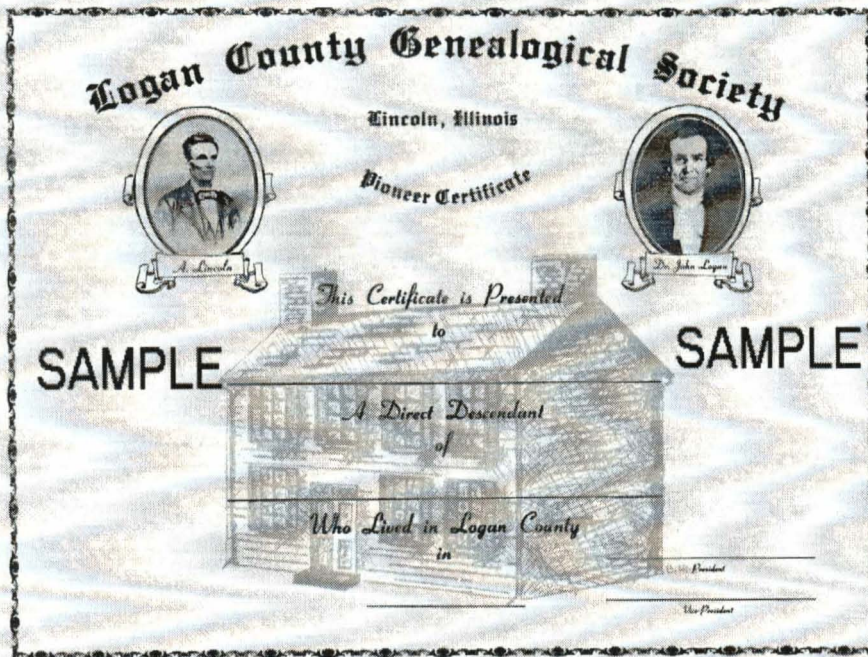

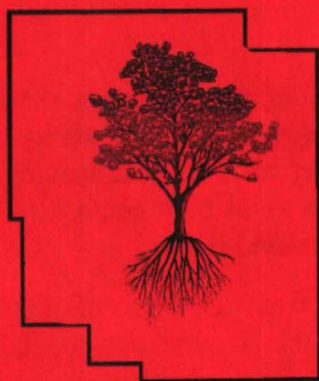

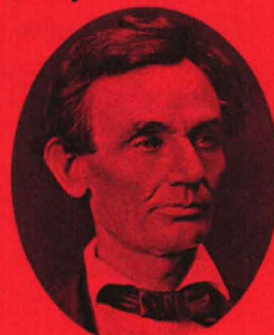

Welcome to the summer issue of Roots & Branches. We hope you enjoy the stories and the information provided in this issue. Maybe it will give you a little better understanding of what life was like in Logan County, Illinois in the early years.

## **Jacob Niewold and Henry Hendrickson, Jr. in Sheridan Twp.**

*From a letter written by Ruie West to Ethel Iona Hendrickson after visiting Henry Derr Hendrickson in 1941. (These people are ancestors of E. Diane Smith Detmers)*

Jacob Niewold brought his family, wife Anna Onnes Siertsema, sons Henry and Onno and daughters Clarisa and Margaret (Siertsema) to America from Holland in 1842.

They settled in New York, on Staten Island the same year. They lived there two years, and then started for the west, via the Erie Canal and the Great Lakes, stopping to winter in LaFayette, Indiana.

Jacob, his brother-in-law, John Siertsema, and a Mr. Beukama started for Illinois that winter, and all bought land in Sheridan Twp. of Logan County, Illinois, leaving the families in Indiana until spring.

In the spring of 1845, they came to their newly purchased land, using two teams of oxen to move their belongings. Upon their arrival, they dug a cave-like home into the

bank along Prairie Creek, and lived in that until they could build their permanent home.

The first few years the family was prostrated by sickness, and poverty stared them in the face, their last team going to pay expenses.

As the land improved and the family health was restored, things improved. Jacob lived long enough to see the farm well developed, and his family settled in life.

A neighbor, Henry Hendrickson, Jr. married Jacob's daughter, Clarisa, who was 15-16 years old. They were married about six months when Clarisa was badly burned by water when taking a large pot from the fireplace. An infection set in and she died of blood poisoning. It is unclear, but appears that she may have been buried near the tree line behind their house.

Henry later married Clarisa's half sister, Margaret, and their children were Clarisa, David, Mary Jane, Ella May, and then a son Theodore. Margaret and Theodore both died and were buried in the same coffin made by John Hendrickson and his son Henry Derr. The coffin was made of black walnut.

As there were no saw mills in this area yet, the houses were made of logs. There were plenty of deer as well as other animals that would come close to the house, and they could kill deer right in their gardens and fields.

Jacob Niewold's farm was just back of the new cemetery, and Henry Hendrickson lived across the road, in front of the cemetery gate.

Mt. Pulaski Has One in Its Old Court House

O. C. Stafford in the Mt. Pulaski News says of the old court house on the hill:

In the fall before the winter of the deep snow, 1832, about one hundred and fifty Indians passed over this hill, coming from Kickapoo creek and Mackinaw river, on their way to Lake Fork, where they camped and hunted for a couple of weeks. They called Grandfather Turley "Bostona." I think John and Andy Bowles, L. K. and Russell Scroggin, and my wife and a few more of the old settlers that yet live will remember the Indians. At that time this was called "Blue Hill" - it looked so on account of the grass on it. There wasn't a tree or stick on it, or a house or a fence, north, east, south and west. Nothing but a dim road led in each direction, shaded by grass and rosin weeds, in which many wild animals and fowls could be found, such as deer, wolves, wild geese, ducks, cranes, prairie chickens. The pioneers will remember these things. Scores of our old friends and neighbors have passed to the great beyond that helped to build the roads and break the crust for the following generations. I hope the young appreciate the labor of those noble souls whose bodies are bleaching in the dust.

This country had developed into wealth. This "Blue Hill" or Mt. Pulaski has developed into a

city with a public square surrounded with good buildings, good business men and women. In the center of the square, the crown of the hill, from which a grand view can be had of the beautiful prairie, is located the building which was originally the Logan County court house. We had a struggle with old Postville for the county seat. We first started a frame court house on the west side of the square in 1833 or 1834 and it was occupied until 1848, when the present building was constructed. I remember when horses and cattle afterwards used to seek the shelter of the building to get out of the hot sun. Jabez Capps finally bought it and used the lumber in building a packing house. In 1848 the brick court house was erected, and I think the work was done by Henry Vonderlieth and Hiram Wilson. John Baker and Brower Bunn carried the mortar. After the civil war Bower Bunn became one of Illinois' greatest orators. He said in the Fourth of July speech here once that he was the architect of the building. It was used as a court house until the middle 50's, when Lincoln captured the prize. If that old building could talk it could tell of one of the greatest men the United States ever had opening court within its walls. It was Abraham Lincoln, who afterwards held the highest office in the gift of the people of this great nation. After the county seat was changed the building was used for that purpose until 1879, when the large school building in the east part of the city was completed.

This letter is a request for a contribution for a portion of the cost to replace the statue and enhance the Civil War Soldiers' Monument on the grounds of the Logan County Courthouse.

In addition to the statue replacement, the project includes the installation of a name board in the courthouse to honor the more than 2,400 men who left Logan County to serve in the war; and to install a display board near the monument listing the names of the approximately 447 men from Logan County who died during the war, a photo of the original statue and excerpts from the 1869 dedication oration of then Governor of Illinois, and former General, Richard J. Oglesby.

The Logan County Genealogical and Historical Society is working in partnership with the Logan County Board in this joint venture that will honor men from the county.

The statue of a soldier that sat atop the monument, dedicated to those men who died, was destroyed by a combination of erosion of the marble over 140 years and a freak windstorm that toppled the statue on 27 December 2008.

The County Board has contributed the insurance payment plus additional funds that will nearly cover the cost of replacing the statue with a bronze statue.

The names of the 326 Logan County men who died during the Civil War, that were engraved on the original monument, have been erased from the Soldiers' Monument by erosion of the stone. An additional 125 men, who died during the war, were found during research for a history of the monument. The display board will be of the type being installed to identify other historical incidents or locations around the county.

The more than 2,400 men who served Logan County during this great American conflict, and survived, have no memorial to their service and sacrifice. The name board, to be installed in the courthouse, will be of the same type as other name boards in the courthouse, honoring military service. The location of the name board will be on the second floor opposite a mural of a young Abraham Lincoln.

All deserve to be recognized for their patriotism and the sacrifices they endured for preservation of the United States.

In just 12 short months the country will be observing the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the beginning of the Civil War. Our goal is to have the name boards and name plaques completed long before that anniversary begins.

Since then it has been used for various purposes. R. V. Mallory at one time occupied it with his printing establishment, publishing the old Times-Citizen. The city used it a number of years as its headquarters. When Dr. J. H. Beidler was postmaster he moved the post office location from the west side of the square where the David Zah saloon is, to the present place. "Squire W. A. Schafer has had his office in the building for a long time. Both the post office and his office are on the first floor, while in the second story the Mt. Pulaski band had its headquarters as does also the public library. The outside walls have always remained the same but the inside of the building has been altered several times.

On the last Fourth of July Hon. Frank W. Childs of Chicago in his speech gave a history of Independence Day from 1776 to the present time; he told how liberty was obtained and how it was sustained by the patriotic men and women of the past and the present. Do all of us pioneers ever think of our comrades, who have passed away, and how they assisted in the struggle to help make life better and easier for their children? Think of the little and big wheels and looms they used to make cloth with for the clothes and of how inventive genius had changed things from the pioneer methods. Think of the block west of the square from a log cabin and garden to a row of business houses and dwelling houses occupied by children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren, of Grandpa Jabez Capps, all respected and honored. It was Mr. Capps who built the first cabin, and is the wife, children and grandchildren of his son-in-law, S. Linn Beidler, deceased, who occupy the dwellings.

## Lela James Downing

Lela James Downing died at the age of 102, 1 May 2003. She was born 27 October 1900 in Cornland to James Thomas and Sarah Jane McCue Irving.

Lela's life began in the closing days of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century. She saw everyday of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century and celebrated two of her birthdays in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. The day she was born, her grandfather was engaged in Dumfreyshire, Scotland as a Carriage Master, and the Wright brothers were still three years away from their historic first powered

flight. The day she was born Henry Ford was tinkering with his car, but the Ford Motor Company was still three years away from incorporation. The Cadillac Motors was three years away from producing their first commercially successful automobile. The day Lela was born Queen Victoria of England was still the ruling monarch.

As a little girl Lela like every little girl of her era, learned to sew, knit, crochet, cook and keep house. Cooking chicken was the most difficult lesson. As a child she had to first learn how to kill the chicken, clean off the feathers, and then cook the chicken. All little girls in her family took music lessons on the piano and played for church. It was Lela's chore to keep the hopper on the heating stove filled with coal. It took two buckets of coal to fill the magazine. The house was heated with a stove and it had an Isinglass window on the front. There were registers in the ceiling of the downstairs room so the heat would go upstairs.

## Swapped Stories

Tales of Early Times as Told by James Hammitt, Abel Larison and  
W. A. Brock

On a Sunday recently, Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Buck, gave a dinner to a few friends at their home near the northern Logan County line. The guests of honor on this occasion were James Hammitt, Abel Larison and William A. Brock pioneers of this state, whose lives have been closely interwoven with that community. A correspondent of the Pantagraph who was present on the occasion took some notes of the tales of the pioneer times, and the substance of some of their stories is here reproduced.

### James Hammitt

Mr. Hammitt is the venerable father of the hostess of the occasion and was born in Morgan county, Ohio, July 11, 1818, and contrary to the order of things, is not bent with the weight of 85 years, but is erect and spry as many men of 30 years his junior. He thinks nothing of walking three or four miles any day. His home is a mile south of his daughter's and is just in the edge of Dewitt

County, and on that day he walked rather than hitch up to the phaeton.

In the fall of 1833, James as lad of 15 years came with his parents from their Ohio home to Illinois. The family settled on Kickapoo within a few miles of where he now lives. The family made the trip in wagons of course.

Mr. Hammitt tells of the sudden freeze up in 1836, when the temperature fell 70 degrees in a few hours. A warm rain was falling and the ground was covered with water. The freeze was so sudden that much stock of all kinds and poultry were frozen in the ice. He tells of chopping the ice from about the feet of stock and a cow's tail to liberate them from their icy fetters. He and young Larison each owned a pair of skates, home-made ones, on which they skated many miles over the prairies.

Mr. Hammitt has a fund of anecdotes and stories and talks interestingly of the hardships and trials of those early days and of those who helped to blaze the way to civilization. His stories of social life and his quaint, effective style of telling them are well worth hearing. Scenes at horse racing, turkey shoots, husking and quilting bees, camp meetings, deer and wolf hunts, parties, dances and athletic sports, as "Uncle Jim" tells them, are a wonder to the younger people and rival those of Eggleston in the "Hoosier Schoolmaster." In his younger days, with his family around him, he was noted for his hospitality, a trait which is still a prominent one.

By foresight and industry he has secured a competency for himself and family. His companion, who shared with him his joys and sorrows, his successes and reverses through a period of over fifty years, passed away a few years ago, and he now lives with a son on land which he entered at government prices about fifty years ago. Mr. Hammitt is a staunch democrat in politics and liberal in his religious views.

#### **Abel Larison**

Abel Larison was also born in Ohio, in Muskingum County, April 15, 1822, within a few miles of Mr. Hammitt's birthplace. He came with his parents to this state in 1830. They made the trip with teams, bringing their household goods with

them. They also settled on the banks of the Kickapoo, near where the Hammitts located three years later. Mr. Larison now lives in Atlanta, in Logan County, on a farm which he secured of the government forty-one years ago. He makes his home with his married son. Mr. Larison is a hale, hearty man of 82, reads and shoots without the aid of glasses. He is a "snow-bird." He has an excellent memory of dates and incidents and a happy faculty of telling of the happenings of those early days.

He relates that during the time of the deep snow in '30 and '31, the family, consisting of his father and mother and eight children and three others, a total of thirteen, wintered in a log cabin sixteen feet square, with only a dirt floor. They were more fortunate than some others in the matter of food for this reason: When his father left Ohio, he brought with him a sack of coffee, some of which he traded to a miller down the creek for fourteen bushels of corn meal, and when the snow began falling, knowing that if it lay on for any length of time the deer would become lean and poor, he killed sixteen with occasionally a wild turkey killed for "fresh meat," gave him plenty of food, if not a variety. There were many horse thieves here in those days and the settlers had organized an anti-horse thief association for protection. Mr. Larison belonged to a local association and because of this caution and fearlessness was often detailed for special detective work in that line.

#### **End of a Horse Thief**

He tells an interesting story in that line, which, because of the tragic ending, he is not likely to forget. In the early 60's a noted horse thief, Jim Oldfield, who had served a half dozen terms in the penitentiary for stealing, and who lived, or had headquarters, somewhere along Kickapoo, had stolen three or four horses from the farmers of the community. Mr. Larison and another man were set on the trail. They followed him to Eddyville, Mo., where, after carefully guarding the rendezvous all night, just at daybreak the next morning Mr. Larison captured him at the point of a revolver. He handcuffed him, took him to the tavern and gave him his breakfast. Leaving the prisoner in the

custody of his partner, he went to the railroad depot and secured tickets to Bloomington.

When he was gone, Oldfield managed to take from his vest pocket a vial which he claimed contained ague medicine, but which in fact contained strychnine, and swallowed a half teaspoonful. When Larison arrived he was informed Oldfield he would never take him to Illinois. Mr. Larison, not knowing what the drug was that he had swallowed, took him to the depot, where he died in a few minutes after terrible agony.

Some thirty years ago Mr. Larison figured quite prominently in the capture of one of the gang who robbed the dry goods store of Eichberg Brothers in Atlanta, and with a team and wagon hauled nearly the whole store off. The capture was made a few weeks later at a town somewhere in Indiana and the whole lot of goods recovered.

#### A Noted Hunter

Mr. Larison is a noted hunter, and for nine years in succession he has been one of the parties which go each season to Arkansas and Colorado and other points west to hunt deer, antelope and other large game. As he is a sure marksman, he always got his share of the big game. A few years ago on one of these trips he killed thirteen deer in straight shots without a miss. He did not go on the expedition this fall on account of the stringency of the game laws in Colorado. He says he don't care to pay \$25 for the privilege of one shot and besides pay \$5 for a man to show him where to find the deer. He thinks he has killed more deer than any man now living in Illinois. In his younger days he was a great fiddler and his services were much in demand at parties and dances. On this present occasion he was prevailed upon to favor the company with some music. A fiddle was brought out, and after some preliminary twisting of the keys and tightening of the bow according to the old style he played a few numbers, among which were the familiar strains of "Tater Tops," "Irish Washerwoman," "Rocky O'Moore," and "Down on the Wabash."

Mr. Larison is a republican in politics.

#### William A. Brock

William A. Brock, the youngest of the trio, lives four miles south of McLean with his son in Logan County. He was twice married and a second wife died two and a half years ago. Mr. Brock was born in Shelby County, Indiana, in 1829. And when six weeks old came with his parents to Illinois, consequently he has been a resident of the state longer than the others. The family stopped in Funk's Grove for a short time and then moved a few miles south, where they also settled near Kickapoo creek. Today he lives on land a few miles from where he was raised and which was also bought at first hands from the government.

His life has been a checkered one of toil and hardship, but he has also had his share of success. As in the case of his two comrades, his education consisted of a few months each winter for a few years' attendance in schools taught in log houses, where light was admitted through an opening where a log was taken out and the aperture closed with greased paper. Here he learned readin' writin', and a little of 'rithmetic. In earlier life he was of a roving nature, but his roving was always made for some purpose. He made frequent trips to the west and did some cattle and horse trading in the Cherokee Nation and Indian Territory. He made two overland trips to California; at one time with a drove of cattle and another by stage coach. He talks of his return voyage on the last trip by ship and graphically describes his five-days' storm on the Caribbean sea off the coast of South America and near the isthmus, and another equally as trying when the ship was on fire in the hold, where it burned several days threatened the entire destruction of the vessel and all on board. In his life on the plains he had some trying experiences with hostile Indians, and often it was only by strategy, coolness and bravery that a serious encounter was prevented, which might have resulted disastrously, indeed.

Mr. Brock is noted for his generous hospitality, and in earlier times the entertainments he furnished his friends were most royal and hearty and occasions long to be remembered. He is a life-long democrat and also liberal in his religious opinions.

Mr. Brock's father, Andrew Brock, served on the first grand jury ever held in Bloomington.

### **In Old Age**

Those three, while having traveled far apart in their time, have lived neighbors and have been boys and men together for three-quarters of a century, and to each other today are yet boys and answer to the familiar old-time names of "Jim," "Bill" and "Abe." In consequence of the geographical changes made in the districting of the state, each has lived in three counties without having changed

his residence. They have borne their part well in the battle of life and to them and such as they the present generation owe much for what we enjoy in all that makes our happiness and prosperity. Their honesty and integrity are above suspicion and their word is now, as always, as good as their bond. They have grown old in years, but their hearts are yet young, and they cheerfully face the western sun with a good prospect of more happy years of life, and none of their many friends seem to be in a hurry for them to go.

## **Elijah Albert Morris - obituary**

*Middletown Ledger March 27, 1913*

Elijah Albert Morris died at the Deaconess hospital in Lincoln Illinois Thursday Evening March 20 at about 5 o'clock after a prolonged illness following a stroke of apoplexy that overcame him about a year ago.

He was taken to the hospital early in last December and remained there until his death. He had been in poor health for two or three years. This condition was thought to have been the result of a hard fall sustained during the erection of a residence building on which he was employed several years ago.

He and his family moved to a farm near Elk City Okla. and the expectation of improving health failed to materialize. They returned to Middletown early in 1912 and Mr. Morris was soon stricken with the fatal illness from which he never recovered.

The deceased was born seven miles west of Lincoln on November 4, 1857. His parents were Elijah Morris and Elizabeth Morris. He grew to manhood in that neighborhood and on December 25, 1875 was united in marriage to Clarissa Young. The ceremony was performed at the home of Mr. Garrison Sr.

To the union six children were born, all of which are living. Their names are Samuel Morris, Ruth Morris, Lewis Morris, Treacie Morris and Mrs. Tina Johnson all of

Middletown and Mrs. Ada Penman of Tower Illinois.

After their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Morris lived on a farm in Mill Grove until 1902 except for three years in Kansas. The family moved to Middletown in 1902 and has resided there since except for the year in Oklahoma.

He followed carpentering and kindred work for an occupation while living here. Besides his wife there are two brothers surviving. They are Alonzo Morris of York Nebraska and Solomon Morris of this vicinity. Four grandchildren also survive.

During his life he portrayed the communicable traits of a loving husband and father and dwelt in peace with his neighbors. The funeral was held at the Methodist church Sunday afternoon at two o'clock with Rev P.C. Sommerville preaching the funeral sermon. The interment was made in Irish Grove cemetery.

I give and bequeath to Henry Hendrickson, Jr., John Moots Hendrickson, David Black Hawk Hendrickson, and Peter Myson Hendrickson all the residue of my property notes and accounts after paying all my debts the money to be paid to each Son when he becomes of the age of twenty-one, the land to be divided and apportioned when the youngest son becomes of age.

It is my will and request that George Powers Esquire of Sangamon County, Ill shall be the administrator of my Estate.

**OLD SETTLERS AT ATLANTA**  
The Lincoln Herald, Lincoln, Illinois  
Thursday, September 9, 1880 p 2

At the old settlers meeting at the Atlanta fair on Tuesday last Col. R. B. Latham was called to the chair and made a short speech, thanking his audience for the honor conferred. After prayer by Elder John Lindsey, Rev. E. J. Thomas, of Atlanta, delivered the address of welcome.

Col. J. Merriam was called upon for a response and made a very good speech upon pioneer topics. He hoped that for some future reunion a log cabin might be erected composed of wood from the various groves in the four counties of Logan, Tazewell, McLean and DeWitt and containing relics of early times.

Jonathan Cusey was called upon to respond on behalf of McLean County. He had lived in McLean County 44 years. If their time of residence was to be measured by progress, some of them had lived here a thousand years. He thought the early settlers of these four counties had chosen wisely in selecting this garden spot of the State. This reunion was a grand idea, successfully carried out. His first school book was a little paddle painted blue on one side and red on the other with a-b-c's upon it.

John J. McGraw, of Clinton, responded in behalf of DeWitt. He and his wife came 50 years ago to the vicinity of Waynesville. Mackinawtown was then the county seat. McLean County was formed in 1831. In '38 and '39 the county of DeWitt was formed; he had thus lived in three counties, though not changing his residence. A great many people suffered during the winter of the deep snow. The next year the corn was frost bitten and there was suffering for food. During the winter of the deep snow their post office was at Blooming Grove, 20 miles away. They were almost shut out from the world.

By request, Col. Latham responded for Logan County. He had been here 61 years, his father having built a cabin at Elkhart Grove in 1819. Logan County was settled a little before either of the other counties. For several years his father had to go to near Edwardsville, about 100 miles, to mill. About 1822 or '23 Latham's father put up a mill which required four horses to run it. (A voice "I've been there many a time.") The same Bobby Musick settled on Sugar Creek and two or three others came very shortly afterwards. Three or four tribes of Indians occupied the country. His father was Indian agent at Peoria from 1824 to 1826, the date of his death, after which the family returned to Elkhart grove. He had known the wolves to fight the dogs across the yard fence. He closed by expressing a wish that the old settlers would tell their experience freely in the afternoon meeting.

In the afternoon short speeches were made by a number of pioneers. This initial meeting was a success and will doubtless be followed by others.

## Lincoln Carnegie Library:

Many Americans first entered the worlds of information and imagination offered by reading when they walked through the front doors of a Carnegie library. These libraries entertained and educated millions. Between 1886 and 1919, Carnegie's donations of more than \$40 million paid for 1,679 new library buildings in communities large and small across America. Many still serve as civic centers, continuing in their original roles or fulfilling new ones as museums, offices, or restaurants.

The patron of these libraries stands out in the history of philanthropy. Carnegie was exceptional in part because of the scale of his contributions. He gave away \$350 million, nearly 90 percent of the fortune he accumulated through the railroad and steel industries. Carnegie was also unusual because he supported such a variety of charities. His philanthropies included a Simplified Spelling Board, a fund that built 7,000 church organs, the Carnegie Institute in Pittsburgh, the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, and the Carnegie Endowment for Peace. Carnegie also stood out because some questioned his motivations for constructing libraries and criticized the methods he used to make the fortune that supported his gifts.

In 1901 the City of Lincoln received the grant for a new library. Combined with the donation by will of a home and two lots by Isabel Nash and gifts by Stephen Foley, the City and Lincoln Public Library constructed a "classic", style library structure designed by W. A. Otis, of Chicago, in Lincoln, IL. Other than maintenance and alterations not affecting the structure's character, the only significant change has been the remodeling and opening of the basement during 1972-1974.

Lincoln Public Library's history typifies the combination of national wealth, grass roots

initiative, and cultural ideals which generated the free library movement and its goal of a free and educated American society. The

Lincoln Public Library was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1980.

## Town in Two Counties

Town of San Jose is Half in Logan and Half in Mason

San Jose is situated in two counties, Logan and Mason. About three-quarters of the village are in Mason County and the remainder is in Logan. All persons who are entitled to vote at village elections vote in that village, but at all other elections that portion of the citizens who reside in Logan county must go some four miles, to where is located the town hall, and there deposit their ballots. That portion of the residents who live in Mason County can vote in the village, as a voting precinct has been located there.

San Jose has just begun to put down sidewalks of concrete. One block has been begun and the village will pay for almost the entire block, as it happens to be before the property of the village. When it touches private property, the owners will have to pay half and the village half of its cost. It is intended to continue these concrete walks until the entire village has been thus improved.

San Jose has a public well 100 feet deep. A new steel tank has just been erected and a new gasoline pump put in, but there is no method of distributing water about town. Tanks and barrels are filled from this tank and pipes will doubtless soon be laid about town and

hydrants put in, but that is something that must come later on. The village has a good hand engine for fighting fire, the old one having been burned at a recent fire. There are 1000 feet of hose and a volunteer fire company. Within the past four years there have been four rather large fires, besides several of smaller size. The Central hotel was destroyed recently and some time ago the Fryer & Smith elevator, the store of Mr. Redinger and two residences. Mr. Linbarger's livery stable and the meat market and harness shop.

All about San Jose the farmers raise more or less fall wheat. Hardly a farmer in the neighborhood but what who has 20 to 40 acres down in wheat, but not nearly as much is raised as formerly, as the chinch bugs and the Hessian fly have frightened farmers so they no longer grow very much wheat. These pests would go from their wheat into the cornfields and destroy many hundreds of dollars worth of this grain for the farmer, besides destroying nearly all his wheat. Wheat sold there this summer for 70 cents per bushel and the amount grown per acre ran from 10 to 30 bushels. There is a large grist mill at San Jose, which grinds home-grown wheat, and

excellent flour is made, which is shipped all over this and other states. Henry Rapp, John Diers and Rauh Brothers each had some 40 acres apiece this year to wheat.

Oliver Biggs resides on a farm half a mile west of San Jose, and is one of the best known taxidermists of the country. He receives commissions from nearly every state in the union and specimens of his work can be found in the University of Chicago, in the University of Illinois, at Harvard and Yale colleges and at many of the large museums of the country. He has at his home what is most undoubtedly the best and most complete collection of fauna and bird life of Illinois that can be found anywhere. Mr. Biggs is also an enthusiastic bee man and a raiser of pedigree horses. He is a money-maker and does not let his fads keep him poor, but they assist him in adding considerable to this income. Scarcely a day passes but what he receives by mail or express, packages or specimens to stuff and mount. It is claimed that Mr. Biggs of San Jose is the best known taxidermist among the colleges and museums there is in the west.

San Jose is surrounded by a network of telephones, nearly every farmer having one. At the local exchanges there are 200 farmers' telephones. Some of the farmers' lines have odd names – such as Busy Bee, Bumble Bee, Prairie Creek, Landau, Froebe line and others. All of these have connections with all other towns in the vicinity as well as elsewhere.

San Jose has but two churches and both of them are of the M. E. denomination. One is

the German Methodist and the other is the English Methodist. Not only the village but the country around is largely settled by Germans. It is said that the congregation of the German M. E. church at San Jose is one of the largest in the conference. There are 250 regular members of the church and an average attendance of about 300. A handsome new edifice will probably be erected there soon. Rev. A. H. Buelteman is the present pastor, while Rev. F. A. McCarty was formerly pastor of the M. E. church at Tremont.

On Sept. 1, two new rural mail routes started out of San Jose. No. 1 is 23 miles long and has 106 families on it. Mr. Jonathan Curtis is the carrier and will start out at 9 o'clock each week day morning. Route No. 2 has 101 families. Mr. George Faulkin is the deputy postmaster.

The one bad thing about San Jose is the electric bell at the C. & A. crossing that seldom stops ringing. It is arranged to ring whenever a train is within one mile either way from the station. As there are two branches of the Alton at San Jose, the Jacksonville and the Peoria and Springfield, this bell is kept ringing about all the time. Sick folks are made worse and well ones are made cranky by this bell, which rings early in the morning, rings at breakfast time, rings before noon, rings at dinner, rings in the afternoon, rings for supper, rings for curfew, rings for midnight and all times between. A traveling man was kept awake all night by the constant ringing of this bell, and was heard to say "Gosh darn it," but he was from Jacksonville.

Genealogical Trails

Lincoln contains fifteen organized churches, the oldest of which is the Methodist Episcopal. Prior to the survey of Lincoln, this denomination had a class here, and conducted services, the charge being a mission of Mt. Pulaski. Their first preaching place was the First Ward school house, which they occupied until 1857, when they erected a house of worship, now owned and

occupied by the Presbyterians. Among the more prominent members at the organization were Dr. A. C. Wood, W. P. Randolph, Robert Leslie, G. W. Brady, and Henry Johnson. Their first pastor was probably Rev. W. B. M. Colt, some of whose successors have been Revs. J. B. Houts, Preston Wood, W. R. Goodwin, J. G. Little, M. A. Hews, G. W. Gray, and M. D. Hawes.

### STATUS OF PROJECTS BY VOLUNTEERS

Bill Detmers - is transcribing records for the Logan County Cemeteries. He is currently working on transcribing all burials recorded by the Logan County Cemetery Association for 1957 - 2009. Bill has Hartsburg Union Cemetery records transcribed and in the cemeteries data base. Norma Shehorn provided the Mt. Pulaski Cemetery records on

a CD. We still need to contact all the other cemetery associations in the county to see if we can photograph and transcribe their records. Our goal is to have a single file of everyone buried in Logan County, with dates and burial locations.

Bill Detmers and Bill Donath - photographed the burial records for Old Union and New Union cemeteries, to be transcribed from the photos of the records. They still have to photograph the cemetery maps at the Logan County Cemetery Association.

Bill Timm - completed copying the Henrichsmeyer books. These were done because the paper used when the books were originally done was not acid free, and are starting to crumble.

Bill Donath - Lincoln Herald Index: Currently working on June 1873. Progress has slowed since a new editor in 1873 added lists of names for court cases, real estate transfers, marriage licenses, marriages and deaths. Letters from the communities in the county are much more numerous and contain much information about county residents. Communities within the county could use these letters to "fill in" information for their historical events and the people who lived there. See the article on Beason as an example of finding "new" history.

Bill Donath - Lincoln Herald Research: Articles about the annual reunions of the Old Settlers are being collected. Those articles will be in future editions of the Roots & Branches. The results of the fairs were also published in the Herald. If someone wants to gather that information, it is readily available. Not only premium winners but judging committee members were listed.

Bill Donath - An email newsletter is planned for midway between quarterlies. To be sure

Bill Donath - Indexing to the yearbook collection will help researchers find family members more quickly.

Bill Donath - Transcription of the Logan County Circuit Clerk, Death and Birth records will allow us to put those in alphabetical order which will help researchers find family members more quickly.

Bill Donath - Indexing of John Regan's Logan County newspaper collections will help researchers find family information much more quickly.

Development of a totally new website has stalled due to a grant application not being approved. Funding for the project would be \$1,000.

Installation of a dehumidifier in the crawlspace is necessary to control the growth of fungus in the now airtight space. Quotes are being sought for the project.

Completion of the Civil War Statue replacement and installation of a name board for all Logan County Civil War soldiers is progressing.

## LOGAN BECOMES COUNTY

Contributed by Billie Timm

On February 15, 1839, the Eleventh Illinois General Assembly passed the act creating Logan County from part of Sangamon, Tazewell, McLean and DeWitt counties. Abraham Lincoln was chairman of the legislative committee on counties, named the new county in honor of his friend, Dr. John Logan. Dr. John Logan from Murphysboro was also a member of the eleventh general assembly and father of General John A. Logan. General John A. Logan was a famous soldier and statesman.

On February 15, 1839, Governor Carlin signed the bill which created Christian, Case, Menard, Logan, Mason and Sangamon counties. At that time the total area of these six counties was contained in Sangamon County, but the bill divided the one county into six. Sangamon County then went from East Peoria on the north to Shelby County on the south, Morgan County on the west and Macon County on the east. Parts of the latter two counties were taken to give the present Sangamon County more width.

### WHAT'S IN A NAME?

In many instances, old families followed established naming patterns as a method of giving names to their children. One such pattern is as follows:

- 1<sup>st</sup> son was named after the father's father.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> son was named after the mother's father.
- 3<sup>rd</sup> son was named after the father.
- 4<sup>th</sup> son was named after the father's eldest brother.
- 5<sup>th</sup> son was named after the mother's eldest brother.
- 6<sup>th</sup> son was named after the father's second eldest brother, etc.

- 1<sup>st</sup> daughter was named after mother's mother.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> daughter was named after father's mother.
- 3<sup>rd</sup> daughter was named after mother.
- 4<sup>th</sup> daughter was named after mother's eldest sister.
- 5<sup>th</sup> daughter was named after father's eldest sister.
- 6<sup>th</sup> daughter was named after mother's second eldest sister.

You may be interested in checking your family group sheets to determine whether your ancestors followed this practice. If so, a given name may be guessed accurately for earlier ancestors, or the list of children may be put into correct order of birth.

### HISTORICAL TIDBIT

The Price of Illinois: In the year 1723 the State of Illinois was bought by twenty two white men of Pennsylvania and England from ten Indian Chiefs representing ten tribes. The territory was in two tracts, one called Northern Illinois. The consideration was 200 strouds, (a rough woolen fabric) 260 blankets, 360 shirts, 150 pounds of gun powder, 4000 pounds of lead, one gross of knives, 30 pounds of Vermillion, 2000 gun flints, 200 pounds tobacco, two dozen gartering, 10,000 pounds flour, 5000 bushels of Indian corn, 12 horses, 12 horned cattle, 20 bushels of salt, and 29 guns. The articles were paid and delivered in full council. The deed was signed and executed before a French notary public at Kaskaskia Village Exchange.

"The Liberty Bell of the West" at the Kaskaskia Bell State Historic Site in Kaskaskia, IL is older than the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia. Cast in 1741, the 650 pound bell was a gift to the Catholic Church from King Louis XV of France. Kaskaskia was the center of French colonial administration for the Middle Mississippi River Valley during the 18th century and the 650-pound bell was a gift to The Mission of the Immaculate Conception Catholic Church and the town's citizens from King Louis XV of France. The bell was cast in La Rochelle, France in 1741 and inscribed with the words: POUR LEGLISE DES ILLINOIS PAR LES SOINS DU ROI D'OUTRE L'EAU (For the Church of the Illinois, by gift of the King across the water). On one side of the bell are the royal lilies of France and the other side features a cross and a pedestal with the fleur de lis. (Flower of the lily) The bell was shipped from France to New Orleans and then pulled up the Mississippi River by ropes on a bateau, arriving in 1743. On July 4, 1778, during the American Revolution, the bell was rung to celebrate the liberation of Kaskaskia from the British by the American forces of George Rogers Clark and his Long Knives. The bell is currently housed in a brick building built by the State of Illinois in 1948. At one time visitors could enter the shrine and actually touch the bell and hear its soft peal but now it can only be viewed by looking through a barred doorway. A brief audio program has recently been added giving visitors a history of the bell. During the flood of 1973, the bell was washed from its stand, widening a hairline crack that had been discovered in 1948. In spite of the crack, the bell continued to be rung every 4th of July. The bell was washed from the stand a second time during the flood of 1993, widening the crack to a dangerous width and now can no longer be rung for fear of further damage, though Independence Day ceremonies are still conducted at the site. Behind the bell is a wall mural depicting the village of Kaskaskia as it was during colonial times.

## What is a First Cousin, Twice Removed?

If someone walked up to you and said "Howdy, I'm your third cousin, twice removed," would you have any idea what they meant? Most people have a good understanding of basic relationship words such as "mother," "father," "aunt," "uncle," "brother," and "sister." But what about the relationship terms that we don't use in everyday speech? Terms like "second cousin" and "first cousin, once removed"? We don't tend to speak about our relationships in such exact terms ("cousin" seems good enough when you are introducing one person to another), so most of us aren't familiar with what these words mean.

**Relationship Terms:** Sometimes, especially when working on your family history, it's handy to know how to describe your family relationships more exactly. The definitions below should help you out.

**Cousin (a.k.a "first cousin"):** Your first cousins are the people in your family who have two of the same grandparents as you. In other words, they are the children of your aunts and uncles.

**Second Cousin:** Your second cousins are the people in your family who have the same great-grandparents as you, but not the same grandparents.

**Third, Fourth, and Fifth Cousins:** Your third cousins have the same great-great-grandparents; fourth

cousins have the same great-great-great-grandparents, and so on.

**Removed:** When the word "removed" is used to describe a relationship, it indicates that the two people are from different generations. You and your first cousins are in the same generation (two generations younger than your grandparents), so the word "removed" is *not* used to describe your relationship.

The words "once removed" mean that there is a difference of one generation. For example, your mother's first cousin is your first cousin, once removed. This is because your mother's first cousin is one generation younger than your grandparents and you are two generations younger than your grandparents. This one-generation difference equals "once removed."

Twice removed means that there is a two-generation difference. You are two generations younger than a first cousin of your grandmother, so you and your grandmother's first cousin are first cousins, twice removed.

**Relationship Charts Simplify Everything:** Now that you have an idea of what these different words mean, take a look at the chart below. It's called a relationship chart, and it can help you figure out how different people in your family are related. It's much simpler than it looks, just follow the instructions.

#### Instructions for Using a Relationship Chart

1. Pick two people in your family and figure out which ancestor they have in common. For example, if you chose yourself and a cousin, you would have a grandparent in common.
2. Look at the top row of the chart and find the first person's relationship to the common ancestor.
3. Look at the far left column of the chart and find the second person's relationship to the common ancestor.
4. Determine where the row and column containing those two relationships meet.

#### **Trouble with Automobile**

*(September 25, 1903)*

Nelson J. Parker had trouble with his automobile last Sunday evening about six miles north of town. Mr. Parker had taken his family to the home of his brother -in-law, William Houston, and he thought he would give the latter a ride. They started out to try the machine's speed. Mr. Parker attempted to turn around and go back, but to his great surprise he landed in a ditch and smashing one wheel in bad shape. But he did not let that bother him in the least, for he borrowed a cultivator wheel and went home okay.

#### **That Same Old Mule**

*(November 25, 1910)*

The one that kicked J.T. Stewart also kicks Brother Frank and runs away.

F.E. Stewart had a good laugh when his brother John was kicked some time ago by one of the former's mules, but now the laugh is coming on the other side, for Frank was paid back last Monday when that same old mule got in a shot at him and caught him fairly in the stomach. Frank said it never hurt, but others say they would not like to have been in his place.

Frank had started from home in his lumber wagon and stopped at Chris McDermott's to talk when he noticed the mule had become unreined. He got down reining him up and the mule kicked him in the stomach and promptly ran away. D.H. Lahr was about a quarter of a mile away in a buggy with Bob Davis' buggy tied on behind. The first he knew of any disturbance was when the team of mules struck Bob's rig, completely demolishing it. He swerved to one side, overturning the wagon, throwing off the box and passing on ahead with the running gears.

The mules ran to D.M. Black's, calmly turned around and started back home when they were easily caught.

### **School Teacher Gets in Bad**

*(November 4, 1910)*

The boys take the teacher out for a "chicken roast" They get the chickens, but no roast.

A school teacher, lived not more than 100 miles from Kenny, received a bad fright one night recently. Some boys got him to go with them for a chicken roast and of course the teacher was to help secure the chickens. In catching the chickens, someone accidentally caused one of the chickens to let out a squawk, and soon after the farmer began shooting in the direction of the unwanted commotion. The two helpers immediately fell to the ground mortally wounded, judging from their groans. The school teacher 'lit out running and did not stop until he was safe at the boarding house and in bed. He had lost all appetite for chicken since that eventful night, so it is said. He even has suspicions that the whole thing was a put up job.

### **James McGraw and Christopher Orendorff Killed by Indians**

A couple of years ago I was able to respond to a query by an Orendorff family researcher with the following excerpt from the Lincoln Herald that appeared 21 August 1862.

"We have the painful intelligence that two of our citizens, James McGraw and Chris. Orendorff, who some months ago left here for Nevada, were killed by the Indians while crossing the plains."

This was the only reference to the incident found in the Herald. The story continued recently when I was contacted by Randy Brown, a researcher for history of the Oregon-California Trails Association. Randy's research includes reading diaries and journals of pioneers who traveled the Oregon Trail.

Randy found my post about Chris Orendorff and James McGraw. The post was on the RootsWeb.com site for Logan County.

This site is a message board where Logan County researchers can post messages and queries.

Randy Brown's research now adds much to the story of what happened to McGraw and Orendorff. "Here is a little story I wrote up for a tour of the Seminole cutoff. It was on the Oregon-California Trail alternate that McGraw and Orendorff were killed. There is information here not related to the two men, but the last five pages or so has several accounts of their death, the exact site of their grave cannot be determined, but the general location can be determined

from the diary accounts. It's at the top of a hill just beyond a little creek now called Alkali Creek. This is pretty much in the middle of nowhere in southwestern Wyoming. I wrote the story as a tour guide several years ago when I led a tour along that trail."

Keep in mind that Randy's research has to do with the Oregon Trail. The following excerpts are from Randy's eleven page article about a location on the Oregon Trail called the Seminoe Cutoff. These stories tell of the travelers' challenges as well as the risks involved in those travelers.

"Many California and Oregon bound companies of the same era probably took the cutoff, but I can find no journals that call it the Seminoe Cutoff. In 1862 several went that way, and from their accounts it appears that the stage road at least temporarily used the cutoff as well.

"Nellie Slater, June 27, 1862: '. . . Came to Ice Slough this evening. There is a station here where the Indians stole a lot of stage stock a few weeks ago. June 28: 'Traveled 11 miles and came to Warm Springs. Grass is very poor, no wood except sagebrush. After staying a short time we started on again, the most of us young folks walking down a steep hill and crossed Sage Creek [Alkali Creek], 3 miles from the springs. Came on a mile further when we got news that the Indians had attacked the teams back on the road. We went back about half way to the place where the depredations were being committed.

The Indians had killed 2 men, taken their horses and wounded one other horse. These men did not belong to any train but were traveling by themselves, except just before they were killed, had come up close to another lot of wagons. One of their horses had died the day before and they had hired another one. They were from Illinois, were brothers-in-law, one of them a single man and the other had left a wife in the states. There was one wagon behind with them. The Indians first went to the wagon and wanted a horse; the occupants told them they could not have it. While they were making threats that they would kill them, one of the murdered men driving the carriage and was going very fast down the hill when the carriage upset. [The hill would be the rough, long descent just east of Alkali Creek.] The Indians then left the wagon and went and killed this man. They cut the top of his head open and gave him a cut across the face. This was done with his own ax. His partner was walking behind him about a half mile. He was found with 6 arrows in his body and was shot once with an Indian gun. This was left by him and some of the men got it and kept it. Only one Indian was killed. After they buried the two murdered men we came on and camped by a nice spring and creek in a small valley where snow was plenty [Immigrant Spring.]' On June 30 Nellie Slater's company reached the Sweetwater at Oregon Slough and found that the station, South Pass Station, had been burned. In an abandoned stagecoach at the station they found a 'large piece of meat lying all covered with poison. I suppose it was put there on purpose for the Indians.'

"Ada Millington was traveling the 'old road' and camped at Pacific Springs on the evening of June 29. Here she heard news of the Indian attack from the stagecoach driver who also identified the murdered men, but had the location of the attack wrong. 'The stage came into this station [Pacific Springs Station] this evening and the driver brought the word that two men were killed by the Indians at Warm Springs Station about the same time that we had our fuss. Their names were Mr. Orendorff and Jimmie McGraw, and were from Illinois. Ma, who was

raised in Illinois, was acquainted with their people. They had a sick horse and had got a mile or so behind their train, when the Indians surprised them. A few hours later, another train came on and found their bodies scalped, and their rifled wagon.'

"Word of the death of the two men reached their home county, Logan in Illinois, and in the Lincoln Herald of August 21, 1862, a short notice was printed announcing their death. 'We have the painful intelligence that two of our citizens, James McGraw and Chris. Orendorff, who some months ago left here for Nevada, were killed by the Indians while crossing the plains.'

"William Smedley, July 4, 1862: 'Started early - passed the grave of two men, James McGraw and brother-in-law, of Illinois, who had been murdered by Indians six days before, on June 28, 1862, as reported by the unfortunate horseman...' July 5 : '...In the afternoon I took a stroll up a mountain for a bucket of snow, which shone beautifully in a ravine near its summit - found there a snow bank gradually wasting away in the July sun, forming a delightful little stream of pure, cold water. Camped near the river on a small stream, near which stood a deserted stage coach and the wreck of a trader's wagon which had been plundered by the Indians a few days previous.'" Smedley is camped on the Nature Conservancy ground where the cutoff 'touches' the Sweetwater. July 6. 'A passing stage this morning hitched onto the deserted coach and took it along. About six miles brought us to the junction of the old river road at the last crossing of the Sweetwater, which old road we had left on the morning of the fourth because it was at this time impassable, as it followed the valley of the Sweetwater and crossed that stream at numerous points, which at the present high stage of water was unaffordable. In the afternoon we crossed the dividing line between the waters of the Atlantic and the Pacific.'

"The next day McClung came to the grave of McGraw and Orendorff: 'Tuesday July 10th- The guards brought up the cattle about ten o'clock & we traveled on. Crossed the creek. On top of the hill we passed a grave. The inscription on the headboard reads as follows two persons named McGraw who were Brothers was killed by the Indians on the 28th of June 1862 & we passed July 10th & at the head of their grave lay their favorite dog which was almost starved to death. I tried to coax him to go with me but all in vain. I gave him provision enough to last him several days & then left him still lying by the grave. About two in the afternoon we camped near Antelope Springs [Upper Mormon Spring] by the south pass Post Office. Here is where we mailed the last letters we sent home.' McClung agrees with Wakefield on the presence of the post office at Mormon Spring. Later, McClung talks of crossing Strawberry and Willow Creeks, but he was mistaken in naming the creeks he crossed, since Strawberry and Willow are on the 'old road' north of the Sweetwater. McClung took the Lander Trail to Oregon.

"H. M. Judson, July 16, 1862: 'We water toward noon at the well of a deserted station [Ice Spring Station] and soon stop at what is called the Ice Springs, a kind of slough where ice they say can be found by digging. I don't like to dig except for gold. While in camp some ox teams come up with us which we passed last night and we find with them Wheeler who was formerly Marshall of Omaha. He had his wife and cat with him besides some 20 head of stock. He directs us where to camp for the night and says he will overtake us there - at Warm Springs 10 miles ahead. We roll and by an error of judgment our Capt. permits us to pass the Springs and we make a drive of 15 miles instead of 10 and camp in a deep hollow on the bank of a creek

[Alkali Creek] without grass....' July 17: '... at three we roused the camp and as soon as harnessed and packed begin to climb the hill out of the hollow. Lockwood is dissatisfied with the route and strikes off by himself to find the river road. On top of the hill near a half mile long we find the grave of the two men murdered by the Indians this inscription on both head and foot board - James McGraw & brother-in-law from Ill, were killed by the Indians June 28th 1862 and his wife taken by them. Beware of Indians.' Judson places the grave a half-mile or so west of Alkali Creek 'on top of the hill' past the creek. Here can be found several rock piles, any one of which could be the grave of the two men. The story that one of the wives was captured was just a rumor. McGraw was single, and Orendorff's wife, was home in Illinois..."

Soooo, let this be a lesson to you researchers. Keep posting those queries. Some day they may lead you to the gold nugget of the story. And, Randy, thanks for following up on my post and making my day. Keep up the good work.

### Atlanta Fourth of July

Lincoln Herald, Lincoln, Illinois  
Wednesday, July 6, 1859  
(Contributed by Bill Donath)

The booming of cannon opened the day. A vast crowd from the country thronged the streets early. At 10 o'clock a procession was formed and started for Turner's Grove; one mile distant, and, we are informed, that when the head of the procession had reached the grove, the people were still forming at the rear in Atlanta. The following was the order of the day:

The procession having reached the grove, there was music by the Atlanta Band. Prayer by Rev E. J. Thomas. Music by the Glee Club. Reading of the Declaration of Independence by Dr. Wm. T. Kirk. Oration by Gen. J. H. Matheny. Music. Presentation of a cane by Sylvester Strong and old soldier of the war of 1812, to Hon. A. Lincoln. Dinner. Music, & C.

Perhaps the most interesting feature of the occasion was the cane presentation to Mr. Lincoln. The cane is of South American Orange wood, topped with North American Buck-horn. It has a silver plate on top bearing the words, "Presented by S. Strong." - Strong and Lincoln are said to have become acquainted in early life, when each was breaking prairie somewhere below

Springfield. Upon a silver band below the handle of the cane, is the first letter of Mr. Lincoln's name, and thence downward there is a knot for every other letter of his name, covered with silver plate and inscribed with its appropriate letter. The silver-plate work was executed by Dr. Perkins and the engraving by H. O. Rodgers, both of Atlanta. ## Lincoln's Cane Sold

Historic Relic Brings Fine Price in New York

The following account of the sale of a walking cane which formerly belonged to Abraham Lincoln, published in Friday's Chicago Tribune, is of local interest because the cane was presented to Mr. Lincoln by Mr. Sylvester Strong, who then lived in Atlanta, this county, and who was one of the most picturesque characters who ever resided in the county. He was a great admirer and friend of Lincoln and was a great patriot. On every public occasion it was his custom to dress himself in attire made altogether of flags. This cane was presented to Mr. Lincoln by Mr. Strong in the presence of Mr. J. P. Houser of this city, who still lives here, and a number of our older citizens remember having seen the cane. The Tribune says:

"A walking stick, which until the death of Abraham Lincoln was his cherished possession, sold at public auction in New York last Thursday. From \$25, the first bid, the price advanced to \$145, and it was sold for that sum to H. H. Wibert of 52 Broadway, an ardent admirer of the great president.

"The cane, which is longer than the ordinary ones, on account of Mr. Lincoln's great height, is black with a buckhorn handle. The wood is studded with fourteen knots, each having a top of silver upon which one letter of Lincoln's name is engraved, so that the whole series of letters from the handle to ferrule spell 'Abraham Lincoln.'

"A metal band joins the handle to the stick, and this bears an inscription showing that the cane was presented to the president by his 'Old Chum, S. Strong,' in 1860. On the handle is another plate which shows that the stick was given to the late Frank B. Carpenter, the artist, and personal friend of Lincoln, by Mrs. Lincoln.

"In 1891 Carpenter was penniless, and pledged the stick to his cousin, Fannie Matthewson, in return for a loan of \$500. About two years ago the artist died. He had not redeemed the pledge. Fannie Matthewson, by her attorneys, authorized this sale. The price received is considered to be small, as \$1500 would have been asked for the cane in a private sale."

## When You and I Were Young

Last Thursday was as good a day for an outdoor meeting as if it had been made to order. The citizens of Mt. Pulaski had been making elaborate preparations for some time to accommodate all who might attend and had also taken care that there should be a good attendance and, on the day appointed, they had their reward in a magnificent crowd and the most pleasant meeting by far that the old settlers of this part of the state have ever had. All who settled in Illinois prior to 1840 were considered "old settlers." Two hundred or more of these old settlers were enrolled by the secretary and assistants, part of who were pioneers or "deep snow" men and women, having settled in Illinois prior to the famous winter of the deep snow - 1831. All who were old settlers simply were supplied with a ribbon badge bearing the words: "Pioneers of Illinois State. State organized in 1818. Reunion and barbecue at Mt. Pulaski, Illinois, August 12, 1880." Those who, having been here since

'31, were considered pioneers, were in addition to the badge, presented with a handsome cane. There were doubtless several persons who were entitled to be enrolled upon the list who were accidentally omitted, as the crowd was large and the work of enrolling somewhat slow. Besides these whose names thus appear, there were a great many who have lived in this county for from ten to thirty-nine years, some of them old people, who were not counted "old settlers," it being necessary to draw a line somewhere.

D. Ward Clark, Esq., president of the Association, presided over the meeting. In the absence of the secretary, R. C. Maxwell, who was sick, Chas. S. Capps, of Mt. Pulaski, acted in that capacity and attended to taking names and distributing badges and canes. A committee which attended to making all arrangements consisted of S. Linn Beidler, M. Wemple and W. P. Sawyer. The meeting was held in the park which surrounds the old court

house, opposite the post office, where a large platform and an ample number of seats had been provided.

The exercises of the day began with music by the Mt. Pulaski band. This was followed by prayer by Rev. John Wilson, of Macon County, near Illiopolis. A chorus of young men and ladies of the Mount and the band then sang and played "America." More band music followed, the choir sang "When you and I were Young, Maggie" and Maj. M. Wemple was called upon to deliver the "Address of Welcome," which he did in a brief, pointed and appropriate speech which pleased all.

After singing "Annie Laurie" by the choir, Rev. D. P. Bunn of Decatur, an old resident of Logan county, was introduced and delivered the oration of the day, and though he said he had never attended an old settler's meeting before nor heard an old settler's speech, and for this reason claimed that he did not know what to say, his address was both very appropriate and entertaining, was listened to throughout with the best attention and with evident pleasure. He was born, he said in Ohio and came west in 1836, locating first at Bloomington, going afterward to Iowa City, Iowa, but returning to Illinois soon after. He spoke of the old wooden mold-board plows and how bad they were about "kicking," detailed from personal experience many of the hardships of the pioneer life, and spoke in affectionate terms of the old settlers who have passed away naming several who had been especially well known. He dwelt at some length upon his first impressions of the country and the hearty hospitality of the people of the early times, spoke of the idea of the earliest settlers that the prairies would never be settled but would remain permanently as public pasture lands, of going sixty miles to mill, taking a week to make the trip, of old Brush College, a name given to the school house on Salt Creek in which he used

to teach, it being built of round logs, of its greased paper window and slab, writing desks, and named some of his pupils of the olden time. He spoke of some of the old settlers who are still living, praising their honesty, hospitality and industry and closed with an especially fervent and impressive peroration.

The band then played a selection and it still lacking a little while of dinner time, Rev. Isaac Kretsinger, of Latham was introduced and spoke for about half an hour. He too pleads ignorance of what an old settler's speech should be, but, like his predecessor, made an excellent one. It was largely reminiscent, very humorous at times, exhortative at the close and the whole pervaded by the eloquence of earnestness and experience. The band then played a medley composed of "Shall we Gather at the River," "Sweet By and By," etc., and at its close dinner was announced and the old people were invited to a long table where was spread a variety of good eatables including several roast pigs and sheep. The ox, which was to have been roasted whole, was cooked by steam, and made so tender that it would not hold together for roasting, hence it went in as boiled. The table is said to have been an excellent one for quantity, quality and variety. The general public brought their own dinners in baskets and spread them in the shade.

At the close of the dinner hour, music by the band called the people again about the stand and a great many interesting relics were exhibited of which, we are sorry to say, we obtained only a partial list. There were a pitch fork over one hundred years old, a sickle thirty-nine years old, a pair of pot hooks one hundred years old, a piece of carpet forty-five years old, still in use, a hoe over one hundred years old, a queer little tea pot, dated 1350, being, therefore, 530 years old; it is property of Mrs. William Rankin, who showed a great variety of interesting relics, most of which we

missed. A couple of bunches of hemp were shown which were grown in 1836; 44 years ago, by John Reed, now residing in Lincoln; also a vest forty years old, a little pink thing which was worn by John A. Critchfield of Broadwell, when he was much smaller than he is now; another vest sixty-five years old, still having the original set of buttons made of thread and covered with homespun; a pair of old wool cards, the property of Mrs. Juliet Keys, aged 83, and with a pair of woolen stockings which were carded, spun and knit by Mrs. Keys at 80 years of age, and also a quilt pieced by her at the age of five and quilted at fifteen; it was much worn and was of the pattern known as "nine patch." There was part of another quilt shown which was wadded with tow instead of cotton and contained a piece of a shirt which was worn in the Black Hawk War. A whole buckskin, dressed before the war, was shown; a meat fork eighty years old; a glass tumbler sixty years old; a thumb lancet in use over forty years ago; a baby's dress 71 years old; a rocking chair made in North Carolina over seventy-five years ago, in which four generations of one family have been rocked; and a deed written in a queer hand on parchment, dated May 3d, 1585 (295 years ago) from Lord Baltimore Ruler of the province of Maryland to Edward Day and conveying 1000 acres; a picture was also shown, just for the oddness of the circumstance, of a girl who, by the time she was six years old, had been caressed and fondled by ten grand parents. How this was made possible was not explained. The poor girl died at an early age, which was probably not remarkable, under the circumstances. The relics having been examined, letters were read from James Daugherty of Peoria County, and from John Buckles and Mrs. Mary Buckles of the vicinity of Mt. Pulaski. The reading of John Buckles' letter elicited three cheers from the audience. Afterward there was read also a

communication concerning Jabez Capps, by his son, Chas. S. Capps.

The next thing in order was addresses by old settlers and Rev. John Wilson of Macon County, who came to this state in 1816 made an amusing address of a few minutes. Maj. John F. Miles, who was born near Mammoth Cave, Kentucky, and came to Illinois in 1820, was next called upon and gave some very interesting reminiscences. Judge John J. McGraw, of Clinton, followed with an account of his early experiences in this state. He was born in South Carolina, moved to Alabama, then to Louisiana, afterward to Kentucky and finally to Illinois, coming to the state in 1830. His reminiscences were quite interesting. Among other things he mentioned living with his family in a stable belonging to Martin Scott, near Waynesville the first summer after coming to the state and picking up an old sickle, which was among the relics, he made a strong point by comparing the work of that instrument of less than fifty years ago with the self binder of today.

Mr. E. H. Robb of Waynesville also made a good speech of a few minutes, giving many interesting reminiscences of people, place and incidents of early times. Rev. D. P. Bunn then read from an old copy of the Herald a part of a sketch which was read at the meeting in 1878 and published at that time. D. W. Clark, president of the meeting made a brief speech as did also Samuel McGarvey.

It then being late, the election of officers was preceded with, resulting as follows: D. W. Clark of Mt. Pulaski, president; Col. R. B. Latham, of Lincoln, vice president, and Capt. F. Fisk, also of this city, secretary. To these was left the matter of selecting a place for the next annual meeting. After a vote of thanks to the citizens of Mt. Pulaski, music by the band, singing "Auld Lang Syne" by the audience and handshaking, the meeting adjourned. The crowd in the village during the day is estimated at about five thousand, and among

then were many old settlers from Macon, Sangamon, Menard, Mason, DeWitt, Peoria and other counties.

## Henry Fox, Logan County's Earliest Known Congressional Medal of Honor Recipient

### Captain Hart's Report

The following is the official report of Capt. Harts in relation to the fight in which his men repulsed Forrest's rebel cavalry:

Headquarters  
North Forked Deer,  
3 miles south of Humbolt, Dec. 20, 1862.

Brig. Gen. J. C. Sullivan,  
Com'd'g Forces West Tennessee:  
Sir: My command of Cos'. "H" and "I," of the 106th Regiment Illinois Volunteers, comprising one hundred and nine men, was attacked to-day at fifteen minutes to one p.m. by a force of about four hundred mounted rebels. We fought them until twenty minutes of four when they withdrew with a loss of nine killed and forty wounded. They lost thirty horses in killed, crippled and strayed. The enemy approached our temporary breastwork, which we built yesterday, to within one hundred and fifty yards; but our gallant boys directed their aim so fatally that no charge was made. The enemy had two pieces of artillery which he opened on us after the cavalry had withdrew. But his fire was so badly aimed

that it did us no harm. At four o'clock Co. "K" of our Regiment reinforced us, and still remains in our fort. They came here immediately after being notified by Sergeant Henry Fox, who under a heavy fire crossed the bridge and returned in an hour with reinforcements. During the severest firing a train of soldiers approached us within four or five hundred yards, and fired a round or two at the enemy without effect, as the distance was too great, and then returned until the enemy had retired which was about two hours. We had no men killed nor wounded, had no prisoners, and took none, the bridge is safe and will be so until we are starved out. Which will not occur in less than forty-eight hours; for we confiscated enough this morning to do us that length of time. Our men acted nobly and I am proud of them. Faithfully yours, P. Wilde Harts, Captain Co. H. And Commanding Post.

### Dauntless Bravery

When the Spartan band of Logan heroes, under command of Captain Harts, were attacked at their post, near Humboldt, Tennessee, by a large force of secesh guerillas, it was ascertained that despite their most gallant and desperate resistance, they

would be overpowered by numbers, unless reinforcements were obtained. Sergeant Henry Fox immediately volunteered to go to Jackson on this hazardous mission. The moment he left the fort the secesh saluted him with a volley, and pursued him over a trestle work more than a mile long. The balls from the exasperated foe whistled around him as thick as hail during his perilous journey, but the brave sergeant reached Jackson in spite of them – returned with reinforcements and drove them off like whipped curs. If a pair of “straps” is (or ever should be) laying around loose in the Logan Regiment, they should be made to ornament the shoulders of Sergeant Fox. Bully for Fox!

#### A Soldier's Brave Deed

#### Double Quick Across the Top of a Trestle Bridge Under Fire

Capt. D. H. Harts, of this city, has written the subjoined letter which was published in last Sunday's Inter Ocean:

“In the latter part of December, 1862, when small detachments were scattered along the line of the railroad from Columbus, Ky., to Holly Springs, Miss., guarding the bridges and trestle work, the following incident took place, which for cool courage exceeded anything that came to my attention during my three years of service.

After the capture of Holly Springs, Miss., General Forrest's cavalry made a raid northward upon the line of railroad and

captured every station between Jackson, Tenn., and Columbus, Ky., except a small detachment of some seventy-five men who were guarding the bridge and trestle across the Obion river, about ten miles north of Jackson, Tenn. This detachment was composed of parts of Companies H and I of the One Hundred and Sixth Illinois Infantry, and was commanded by Captain P. W. Harts now of Springfield, Ill., and Captain John Shockey, now of Nevada, Mo.

After the attack on Jackson and the capture of Colonel Ingersoll and part of the Eleventh Illinois Cavalry, a detachment of about 500 men with two pieces of artillery were sent by General Forrest against the handful of men guarding Obion bridge. The Federal guard had hastily built a rude blockhouse directly under the trestle, determined to make the best possible defense. Promptly at 1 o'clock on December 23, the station north of the river was surrounded by some 500 rebel cavalry, who dismounted and made a desperate effort to capture the guard and destroy the bridge and trestle and thus break railroad communication with Jackson. Here the unequal battle raged until the middle of the afternoon. The shrieking shells and swishing shot crashed through the heavy timber surrounding the fort. Capture seemed inevitable. Re-enforcements could only be hoped for from Jackson. It was decided that someone should venture to leave the fort, climb the open trestle some fifteen feet high, and run over the ties for several hundred yards across the trestle and bridge to secure re-enforcements.

This task was solicited by Sergeant Henry Fox, of Company H. Hand over hand he gained the top of the trestle and then with a regular double-quick he ran from tie to tie across this dreadful line. The enemy from both sides of the road shot at him, and while his clothes bore ample evidence of the danger he had run, he was untouched. Fortunately

the fire from the fort was too dangerous to permit the enemy to bring their artillery through the woods within range of the fort, and for the distance the heavy timber obstructed the shot. The station was not captured; the bridge was saved.

Re-enforcements arrived at dark after the enemy had withdrawn. Sergeant Fox was promoted to a captaincy in the United States colored troops, where he served until the close of the war. He now lives as an honored citizen of Dwight, Ill.

### 56 Men and the Declaration of Independence

The first, largest, and most famous signature is that of John Hancock, President of the Continental Congress. The youngest signer was Edward Rutledge (age 26). Benjamin Franklin (age 70) was the oldest. Two future presidents signed: John Adams (second President) and Thomas Jefferson (third President).

Have you heard what happened to the 56 men who signed the Declaration of Independence?

Five were captured by the British as traitors and were tortured before they died.

Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned.

Two lost their sons serving in the Revolutionary Army; and another had two sons captured.

Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or hardships of the Revolutionary War.

They signed and pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor.

What kind of men were they?

Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists.

Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners: men of means and well educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty was death if they were captured.

Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British Navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts and died in rags.

Thomas McKean was so hounded by British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him and poverty was his reward.

Vandals or soldiers looted the properties of Dillery, Hall, Clymer, Walton, Gwinnett, Hey ward, Rutledge and Middleton. At the battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson, JR. noted that the British General Cornwallis had taken over Nelson's home for his headquarters. He quietly urged General George Washington to open fire. The home was destroyed and Nelson died bankrupt. Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife and she died within a few months. John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his gristmill were laid to waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home to find his wife dead and his children vanished.

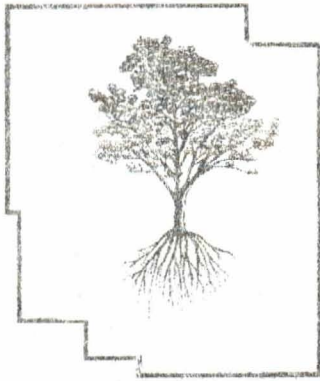

## ALBERT JACKSON UP WHERE GUNS ROAR

Mrs. Charles Jackson of Lincoln, IL, who had four sons in the army, received a letter from her son Ordnance Sergeant Albert H. Jackson. He enclosed a \$25 money order in the letter. Jackson was stationed in France.

The letter read:

"You must buy yourself a Christmas present," he wrote. "Don't buy anything for me, as you will not be allowed to send it to me. I was intending to go to \_\_\_\_\_, France, for a short visit but for military reasons was not given permission. \_\_\_\_\_ is not a very big place, about the size of Springfield, but if I were to go there I would get a chance to get a good bath, which I can not do here. I believe I would not know what to do if I were to get under a real shower bath again."

"Am very close to the big guns, and there are not many joys to be had here, except that one should be thankful that he lives from day to day, living in the hope that some day the Germans will be 'no more'.

"This is quite an active place, the American and German guns firing day and night. I go to sleep with the shells whistling overhead, and some of them drop very near. A few nights ago a German bombing plane dropped quite a few large shells around our camp. Some were so near that the shacks I was sleeping in shook all over, as if a giant hand was trying to push it over."

The letter was written Oct. 26. Jackson was with the 21<sup>st</sup> Field Artillery.
